

Minutes of the Great Milton Parish Council meeting held at The Pavilion on Monday, 19th February 2024 at 7:30 pm. Present: Cllrs S Harrod (chair), M Horsley, S MacMahon, S Illingworth and Cllr G Heritage (SODC). In attendance: Chris Ashworth (Clerk), Amy Williams (Future Clerk) and 5 members of the public.

13/24 Apologies for absence

Apologies for absence were received from B Fox (Vice-chair), P Allen, D Harms and Cllr F Van Mierlo (OCC)

14/24 Variation of order of business

Item 26/24 was spoken about before item 15/24.

Item 23/24 was spoken about before item 19/24.

15/24 Declarations of members' interest

No declarations of interest in matters on the agenda were received.

16/24 Matters to report

The County and District Councillors' reports were received and reviewed and are available on the Parish Council website.

Cllr G Heritage raised the new grant scheme: The community levy grant fund. For town and parish councils that have infrastructure projects, the grants range from £75k to £250k.

Cllr Horsley asked whether it could be applied for broadband to areas of the village that haven't yet been connected.

Cllr Heritage also raised that there will be financial support available for flood victims with SODC at this time, collating a list of details for those who need to apply.

17/24 Correspondence and public discussion

Neighbourhood Watch raised the recent issues of what happened during a discussion on the village WhatsApp. Cllr Harrod went on to explain an overview of the details of what happened to inform Councillors who were unaware.

We had a member of the Recreation Ground Committee attend the meeting, and they said that recently, some members of the Committee had been approached about the fact that some dogs have been seen off lead within the Recreation Grounds. The long-standing rules are that dogs are to be kept on leads at all times while on the Recreation Grounds. A member of the Recreation Ground Committee reiterated the above rules in the village WhatsApp. The Recreation Ground Committee is reliant on the dog-walking community to adhere to these rules.

Cllr Horsley stated that the rules can be enforced as with more recent laws regarding Public spaces. It is now law that dogs must be kept on leads at all times (Public Spaces Protection Orders).

Cllr Harrod wanted to ensure the main outcome of this discussion was to ensure

that antisocial behaviour in the Village is dealt with and doesn't become a long term issue. Along with the profanities used during the WhatsApp discussion, there was a recent incident of three white roses stolen from a grave in the Church Graveyard. Cllr Harrod questioned where this recent behaviour is coming from.

Cllr Harrod then read out a statement he had drafted for the Parish Council to discuss for publication in the Bulletin. Following further discussion, it was agreed that Cllr Harrod would redraft the statement and send it to all Councillors for approval before it was issued.

Cllr Illingworth suggested that any issues such as the above raised on the Village WhatsApp should be redirected to the relevant forum from the WhatsApp chat. The Recreation Ground Committee member in attendance told the Parish Council that the signs stating these rules will be moved to more visual places and at eye level, and the Recreation Ground Committee will reiterate these rules within the Village.

18/24 Planning applications

A The following planning applications were received from SODC and reviewed:

P24/S0313/FUL (The Bull The Green Great Milton OX44 7NS) Alterations to existing car park. All Councillors fully support the proposal.

P23/S2616/FUL (Land adjacent to The Yard Thame Road Great Milton)

Erection of a new dwelling. This application was responded to in September 2023. There are now amended plans and additional information.

Cllr MacMahon reviewed this planning proposal and spoke to some local residents who raised concerns regarding lights from cars.

B The following planning decisions were received and reviewed.

P23/S3048/FUL (The Bull The Green Great Milton) Demolition of existing single and two-storey extensions, erection of single-storey side extension, single and two-storey rear extension, internal alterations, dormer window to rear, with alterations to existing parking layout (Bat roost assessment, tree protection, and plan to make changes to car park layout received 13 December 2023). Refusal of Planning Permission.

P23/S3051/LB (The Bull The Green Great Milton) Demolition of existing single and two-storey extensions, erection of single-storey side extension, single and two-storey rear extension, internal alterations, dormer window to rear, with alterations to existing parking layout. Refusal of Planning Permission.

19/24 Minutes of the previous meeting

21/24 Parish clerk and councillors' update of matters in hand

• The annual spring clean litter pick will take place on Saturday, 16th March 2024, and will be advertised in the March bulletin, online and within the Parish.

22/24 Security in the village

Recent antisocial behaviour as raised in item 17/24.

Neighbourhood Watch also raised one more incident regarding graffiti in the village, which was reported to Thames Valley Police. Several councillors questioned if the youth club is still running and is successful as it seems to be a good way to help combat the recent antisocial behaviour. The Parish Clerk will find out about the youth club and report back at the next Parish Council meeting.

23/24 Grass-cutting contract 2024/25

The three quotes given for the grass-cutting tenure for the forthcoming season were reviewed by the Councillors. At the meeting, Henry Matthews from Tactical spoke about what his company can offer the Parish Council in regard to grass cutting. He recommended that the frequency of the cuts be increased during the growing season (March – November) compared to what the Parish Council had previously sought. With 18 cuts during the growing season in any areas that are used such as the Recreation ground. Verges are to be cut Monthly during the growing season.

Cllr Illingworth asked whether the days the grass cutting would be completed could be communicated to the village. Mr Matthews noted that they always give one week's notice to the Village before attending; this way, if any events are happening, they can work around these and ensure the village is in the best condition possible. The Parish Clerk will ensure that once a cutting day is advised, it is advertised on the Village website and WhatsApp to ensure villagers are aware and can take any precautions

needed. Mr Matthews also confirmed that if the Parish Council feel more or less cuts are needed, Tactical will be able to adapt to our requests.

The Parish Council voted in favour of going ahead with Tactical for the grasscutting tenure.

This will be on an initial 3-month trial basis, which will give both the Parish Council and

Tactical time to work out any queries. The Parish Clerk will be in contact with Tactical to arrange the contract.

24/24 Parking issues in the village

The Parish Council discussed parking within the Village, especially down Thame Road, which is becoming more of a problem. Cllr Horsley noted that the parking has recently improved after the issue was spoken about on the Village WhatsApp. Cllr Harrod also spoke to Le Manoir, who will ensure staff are aware of parking safely and considerately in the village.

25/24 Speed indicator devices

The Parish Council reviewed the two quotes given for the purchase of the SID for use in the Village, and now the poles have been erected. It was unanimously agreed that the Parish Council would go with the quote from Elancity, with one extra solar panel unit ordered on top of the two in the quote. The Parish Clerk will begin the arrangements to get the units ordered.

26/24 New Clerk/RFO

The Parish Council is delighted to welcome Amy Williams to the role of Clerk/Responsible Finance Officer starting 01/03/2024. The current Clerk will be employed until the end of April 2024 to allow time for a full hand-over. Amy's contact details will be updated in the Bulletin and other local information sources in due course.

Anti-social Behaviour in the Village

Two recent incidents of extreme anti-social behaviour in the village warrant a formal response, namely the theft of flowers from a grave in the churchyard the day before Valentine's day, and the appalling diatribe of profanities witnessed on the village WhatsApp group during a (heated!) discussion on the pros and cons of allowing dogs off the lead on the Recreation ground.

In our opinion, this sort of behaviour cannot be tolerated or tacitly condoned and is unacceptable within our community, or any other for that matter.

Firstly, the theft of the three white roses from the grave is quite simply despicable. It is tragic that we have to consider installing CCTV in the churchyard to protect the sanctity of the graves of our loved ones. There is a vague hope that the perpetrator may read this and feel a twinge of remorse at the additional grief they caused to the family of the deceased from whom those roses were so thoughtlessly taken.

As for the outrageous string of obscenities inflicted on the 162 members of the village WhatsApp group, what can be said? We believe we speak for the majority of the members of this community in saying that we will not tolerate this in our society. There need to be consequences in order to discourage this sort of behaviour, or this incident will simply repeat itself, and we understand that the individuals concerned have been removed from this group forum.

Mutual respect is a prerequisite for harmonious co-existence, and should be evident in all our interactions, in public, in private and on social media.

Your Parish Council does not wish to see this community descend into a morass of uncontrolled anti-social behaviour such as we have witnessed in the past week, and we call upon all like-minded residents to join us in the public condemnation of these acts and a point-blank refusal meekly to accept their commission.

The Rector's Pint

Easter this year may coincide well with the Spring daffodils, and that is because Easter is relatively early, on March 31st. The dating of Easter is taken from the Gregorian calendar, and it can occur on any Sunday between March 22nd and April 25th, a wide parameter. The Eastern Orthodox Church has a different dating system, taken from the Julian calendar. Here, I'm confining myself to the Western Gregorian dating. Over a 500-year period (from 1600 to 2099) Easter will most often be celebrated on either March 31st or April 16th, so we are spot on this year!

Easter Sunday always occurs on the first Sunday after the Paschal full moon, the full moon that occurs after the Spring Equinox. In the Christian story, the Last Supper, the final meal Jesus shared with his disciples on the night before his crucifixion was a Passover feast, itself one of the principal festivals that was always celebrated on, or near, the time of a full moon. That is the theory at least, that the dating of Easter links us to the Jewish lunar calendar, but there are plenty of well-qualified commentators

who say that in practice it has not always worked that way!

Whatever its origins, there have been many calls to standardise the date of Easter over the years, not least from within the Church. In 2016, our present Archbishop of Canterbury, Justin Welby said he believed that the date would be fixed by 2026 to either the second or third Sunday in April.

For many, perhaps most people, the significance of Easter has primarily become linked to cute bunnies, fluffy chicks and chocolate eggs. But for Christians, Easter Sunday is a celebration of the claim of the actual and physical resurrection from the dead of a man whom his followers very quickly came to believe was God. I do the job I do because I believe that claim to be true.

I suppose it might make practical sense and would be convenient for us all to fix the date of Easter as a part of the school holiday and as the centrepiece of a set bank holiday weekend. However, in a world in which everything is directed towards our own convenience, and in where so much is standardised, I think it is wonderful, however impractical, that we have held onto a tradition which is not simply for our convenience and there is nothing standardised about Easter! It is a reminder that God does not follow our agenda, but that we are invited to follow his, however 'inconvenient' that might be.

In this, I remain a traditionalist, although in the event of change I wouldn't fight too hard against it. The meaning, not the date is the most important thing, and every Sunday is a 'Little Easter,' the Commemoration of the Resurrection.

Alleluia, Christ is risen!

The latest proposals from South Oxfordshire District Council for housing in our area is very good news for those who support Haseley Brook Action Group.

The draft Local Plan both:

- Removes Chalgrove airfield from the list of possible sites; and
- Does not include 'Harrington' on the list of possible sites.

The Emerging Joint Local Plan which aims to identify sites for housing in our area for the next 20 years is open for feedback via a consultation until 21st February.

To help ensure that this Draft Plan progresses to an Agreed Plan for South Oxfordshire we all need to go online and express support.

- 3. In Chapter 8 Strongly Agree with deliverable sites such as Grenoble Road, Culham and Berinsfield;
- 4. Also in Chapter 8 (AS10) Strongly Agree with removing Chalgrove airfield from the Plan and using your own words reference:
 - Unsuitability of the airfield site
 - A 'New Town' in Chalgrove being undeliverable
 - Location not being adjacent to the housing need in Oxford
 - Poor transport provision for accessing Oxford.
- 5. Contribute to other questions and topics of personal interest and using you own words consider referencing:
 - Support for developments adjacent to Oxford that will serve the city;
 - Strong commitment to carbon reduction principles within the Plan;

- Need for affordable housing as part of the Plan.
- 6. Submit your response by pressing "FINISH" having also added your contact details.

This 5 minutes of your time will have a meaningful impact in supporting HBAG and protecting our beautiful rural area of Oxfordshire.

View from Views

Typical/sods law we have just participated in the "Big Farmland Bird Count" parking ourselves on 3 successive days in a spot that ,whenever we walk past, 2 to 3 times a week, there are usually birds of all species flying around (Greenfinches, Yellow Hammers, Jays, woodpeckers, fieldfares, to name but a few) but on the 3 days nothing except the



normal birds we see every day, Blue & Great Tits, Dunnock and Chaffinch, and not really many of these. I mention 3 successive days as the first day it was late in the day, usually more bird activity in the morning. The second day dull and, the third day as it was really nice and sunny, we thought this would be the day, but no. The only redeeming factor was that on the third day, a Yellow Hammer decided to perch not 10 yards from us and, stayed for at least 10 minutes just resting or just doing things that a yellow Hammer does. Of course, by siting ourselves by a hedge we missed the many Skylarks and Buntings that, are most found in open fields, of which we seem to have a plenty.

Last month I stated I would not mention the weather well, this month I feel I must, as a lot of happenings/decisions had to be made and, previous decisions altered for the coming season, due to crop failure, as we thought. After a long period of rain over the winter towards the end of January we were beginning to feel the worst was now over and we began to make plans for the spring then, once again on the 6th/7th/& 8th February the heavens opened once again dumping a further 40mm of rain over already saturated land. I have never in all my life known such flooding, our river meadows have been more or less underwater since the beginning of November, save a respite of two periods amounting to about 10 days in all. It seems that the Wheat crop is surviving except in the odd places where it has been under water for a period, the Rape has all but disappeared, and the Barley that we thought had also disappeared, actually looking as if most will recover, so plans we had made may now have to be rethought.

I think the reason that this flooding has been so bad this season, is because, after a wettish late summer followed by at least 100mm more rainfall between November and the end of January, than the same period last season. Our main issue this winter, has been to find the drains that obviously were not running as they should, to cope with all this extra moisture. These were laid by our predecessor in the 60's, to take water from the various springs that are plentiful hear. Anyone who knew dear old Gilbert Pickett will have heard him say Gt Milton was built on springs. One particular area of the farm has been extra wet and, on examination of the above drains it was evident they were not running as they should, were found to be full of matted roots, which would have let some water flow but not this year, in some instances we extracted a sausage of these some meters long. It seems odd as to why these roots get into the drains in this particular area, I think there could be two reasons, one we have planted trees and a

hedge over them, two I reckon that during the very dry periods we have had these plants would be searching for moisture and the obvious place is a drain, as drains in other areas don't seem to suffer in the same way.

We are participating in one of the first initiatives to be involved with as a farm cluster member, in conjunction with the "River Thame Conservation Trust", to monitor the river for mink prior to the introduction of the native Vole, who have been forced out of existence by foreign Mink, emanating from the release of the animals from Fur farms many years ago, by activists against the trade and, irresponsible individuals. The fur trade has now been banned.

On the brighter side of things, we learn that Michael Gove has announced that there will be encouragement to build on greenfield sites, and redundant Offices and shops for housing. Interestingly this initiative is now holding up the planning on a M & S store in London, there is good reason for this as, it seems to me to be a scandalous waste of materials to continue to pull down perfectly good buildings and, throw the debris away, all the carbon used to build etc. Like our own Council in Oxford now want to move the county office and presumably do the same with the existing buildings to be replaced by some other useless buildings that will add to the destruction of our lovely city centre. Another sanctioned expenditure is the electrifying of the buses, a worthy cause, but is it necessary in one hit. They can afford to spend money on these, but not on the upgrading of our "jerry" built schools, or provision of school minibuses to the extent that disabled children cannot access our study centre, when we are expected to provide disabled facilities.

If anyone is interested, it is worth accessing Rick Stiens programme BBC 2 14/2/24 and see the way agriculture may be going.






