Due to insufficient usage, I am sad to say that we will not be continuing the Comet Bus service on Wednesdays from December onwards. The service has unfortunately been poorly patronised with no more than four users on any one day, and usually one to three users. It is not financially responsible to use public money to subsidise this usage and we are therefore cancelling the contract at the end of November.

The Parish Clerk has, however, made contact with Red Rose Travel with a view to them possibly diverting their 275 service through Milton Common via Great Milton and we await the outcome of this approach.

In the meantime, the County Council is in the process of setting up a Cabinet Advisory Group to look into rural bus services and other County travel issues, including the routes of proposed new roads, though this will take some time to investigate and report back to Cabinet with recommendations.

On a happier note, remember that the village Carols on The Green will take place at 6pm (18h00) on Tuesday 19th December, led by Rev Simon Cronk, and followed by mince pies and mulled wine in the Bull. Please give this traditional family occasion your support.

The reconciled bank balance as at 4th November 2017 was £27,412.99.

A request for a grant of £600 towards the cost of grass-cutting at St Mary's Church was received. It was RESOLVED to grant the sum requested: a cheque will be written at the December meeting.

Parish Clerk and Councillors' update of matters in hand

The Clerk reported that following discussions with a local IT consultant a budget of £500 was recommended to enable the purchase of a suitable laptop. It was RESOLVED to approve expenditure to a maximum of £500, which will be paid for from the Transparency Fund grant.

The hedge between the rear of the houses on Fullers Field and the Recreation Ground has been trimmed, and the bus shelter in Milton Common tidied up. The Chairman reported that the 'grips' enabling drainage of water from the road through the verge into the ditches at Lower End and on The Forties need clearing out: it was RESOLVED to seek a quotation for this work.

The Clerk reported that the area under discussion is highway land. It was RESOLVED to report the issue of parking on this land to the County Council as the landowner, and to seek its initial view on potential action.

Charles Peers has asked if the Parish Council wishes to make a contribution towards the cost of remedial works carried out on the bridge. It was RESOLVED to defer a decision on a contribution pending further investigation and discussion with the landowner.

The Parish Council agreed to meet to purchase the Christmas tree on the afternoon of Friday 8th December.

Main agenda items

The Chairman reported that the Wednesday bus service has continued to be poorly patronised despite significant efforts with publicity, a revised timetable to give more journey options to Wheatley and no fares being charged. There are three regular users, supplemented by 3 or 4 occasional users and the odd 'supporter'. There have been no more than 4 users on any one day, but more usually 1 to 3. As a result the Parish Council is not in a position to fund provision going forward given the inequity of any contribution benefiting such a small sample of the village's population. It was therefore RESOLVED to request that Oxfordshire County Council terminate the current arrangement after Wednesday 29th November. This position was understood by those present, who thanked the Parish Council for their efforts up to now and advised that there would probably be no passengers using the bus on Wednesday 29th as a coach outing was scheduled, so the Parish Council could save money by terminating the service before then if it wished to.

The Chairman went on to report that the Parish Clerk has written to Red Rose Travel seeking their view on the potential diversion of the 275 service via Great Milton. No response has yet been received but this will be followed up. Antony and Carol Ayton have written to OCC to suggest that bus provision in the county is revisited: the Cabinet Member for Transport has responded to say that a meeting will be held with the bus companies to discuss the issue. The Chairman stated that the effects of bus service withdrawals were not only being felt in Oxfordshire but across the whole country, and that a return to the old funding model was highly unlikely. It was suggested by a member of the public that the Comet 'dial-a-ride' service could

potentially be expanded to cater for demand, but the Chairman responded by stating that there was no funding available for the necessary vehicles or staff to facilitate this.

The District Council has reported that operatives will be visiting its villages for routine maintenance work and has asked for information on locations that may need a more thorough clean. It was suggested that the verges and hedges on Sworford Lane and on Thame Road between the A329 and the 90 degree bend would benefit from litter-picking. This will be reported to SODC by the Clerk, along with a suggestion that the pavements on Church Road are also attended to.

The Clerk and Councillor Peter Allen have looked at income and expenses and will look to present a budget requiring no more than a 6% increase in the precept. The Bulletin has been identified as a significant cost which may need to be reduced (possibly by increasing emphasis on its online presence). Costs for grass cutting have increased with new areas of coverage being added and milder wetter weather stimulating growth and necessitating an additional cut this growing season. It may therefore be necessary to increase the budget for this area of expenditure. Other minor adjustments are being considered and a further iteration of the draft budget and Precept request will be presented at the next meeting.

Following discussion it was RESOLVED to request one further cut of the village's verges and common land from the contractor.

The Chairman will submit comments on the Local Plan on behalf of the Parish Council before the publicity period closes on 30 November.

It was reported by the Chairman that Oxfordshire County Council has no official position on the Oxford-Cambridge Expressway, and that he has supported the Expressway Action Group in his role as County Councillor. The National Infrastructure Commission's view as an advisory body is that the Expressway should follow the route of the proposed 'East West Rail' link. The County Council is talking to Highways England to get the best outcome for the people of Oxfordshire, with the main objective to relieve pressure on the A34. An announcement on the preferred corridor is expected July 2018. It was RESOLVED to support and endorse the activities and position of the Expressway Action Group, which the Chairman will action.

The meeting concluded at 9.05pm. The next meeting of Great Milton Parish Council will be held on Monday 18th December 2017, starting at 7.30pm in The Pavilion.

Ramblings From the Rectory

I called this piece 'ramblings' because I don't always stick to an obvious theme. This month is typical of that. December is the month of Advent and Christmas, and yes I will get to that shortly. Last Month, whilst I focussed on the state of the world and

remembrance I could have talked about Martin Luther so I will do that now!

On 31 October 1517, Martin Luther a German Roman catholic monk, scholar and theologian at Wittenburg university published his 95 theses. These propounded two central beliefs, that the Bible is the central religious authority and that humans may reach salvation only by their faith and not by their deeds. In my own christian journey this discovery was key, after years of church observance, often more off than on! it was the discovery that true faith began with the acceptance that something had happened, had been done, for me, and not something that I could do for myself, it led me to Jesus Christ. One of the issues that particularly fired Martin Luther was his german contemporary, the preacher Johann Tetzel who was selling indulgences. These were documents prepared by the catholic church and bought by individuals either for themselves or on behalf of the dead that would release them from the punishment, due to their sins, in purgatory. As Tetzel famously preached, 'As soon as the gold in the casket rings, the rescued soul to heaven springs.' This was horrible stuff and absolutely contrary to the biblical truths that were emerging for Martin Luther.

31 October 1517, All Hallows Eve, is now historically understood to be the beginning of the reformation. (We know 31 October as halloween - I far prefer All Hallow Eve - the eve of the holy one's - All Saints being the following day - there I go again, rambling off!). The reformation didn't simply result in a new spiritual understanding, it was a religious, intellectual and political upheaval that splintered catholic Europe, setting in place structures and beliefs that still define the continent today. The disruption triggered wars, persecutions and the so-called counter reformation. It was a bloody time for which neither side, catholic or protestant (which came to be the collective name of the reformation movement) emerge unblemished. It also of course led to the change in direction of English and subsequently British history.

A key emphasis of the reformation was a conviction of the Bible as the word of God. In a newly reformed church of England the Bible was seen, and indeed remains, as authoritative in all matters of faith and doctrine. We declare it at our services 'This is the Word of the Lord.' perhaps though not entirely sure what we mean by that? The Bible as the word of God is however central to Christian belief. That doesn't deny the gift of reason, we are not called to be rampant fundamentalists, nor does it deny the discipline of seeking to rightly interpret it anew for each generation.

This 'word of God' is of course central in our Christmas celebrations. At our carol services I as vicar (or rector as I am known here) often have the privilege of reading the final lesson from the first chapter of John 'In the beginning was the word and the word was with God and the word was God.' This is taking the understanding of 'the word' to a wholly different level. This is not simply (if it could ever be described as

simple!) about a collection of writings. This puts a whole new meaning on this word of God, that which is communicated of God to humankind, this 'word' who has now taken on human flesh; 'And the word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth'. It is not for nothing that the heading for this lesson is: 'St John unfold's the great mystery of the incarnation'. It is no good arguing, as I have heard some do, 'Oh well then, if Jesus is God's word made flesh, the Bible is of no importance.' Well yes it is, it is in this Bible that we see the revelation set out for us to examine, of Jesus as God's incarnate word, Immanuel, God with us.

So this year, the 500th anniversary of the beginning of the reformation, for all that resulted that was not of the spirit of that renewal, for these truths I am grateful; that the Bible is the central authority in all matters of faith and conduct. It can be hard to understand but it remains God's word to me, and I lose it's impact from my life at my peril. Also, the Bible points to this truth, that my ability to come before the living God is not in any way dependent upon who I am, my gifts, moral character or virtues. Rather knowing myself to be a fallen and flawed human being, indeed as a 'sinner', I come before God with faith in what he has done for me, and not for what I could ever possibly do for God. The heart of the Christmas story 'the word made flesh' is a central part of the story of the greatest of God's gifts to our fallen human race, Jesus Christ, Immanuel, God with us.

And of course we would love for you to come and celebrate with us this greatest of gifts at our carol services and our various services on Christmas Eve and Christmas day itself.

For January, I sometimes take a welcome month off from trying to come up with another inspirational piece, what with Christmas and all that to focus on! There will therefore be no ramblings in January. Can I take the opportunity now of wishing you, whatever your circumstances and whatever joys and sorrows you will face in 2018 a truly very blessed New Year. May you come to know the God who knows you and loves you so very dearly.

Social Clubs at The Bull

Following on from the recent AGM of The Bull Community Pub, I thought it an apt time to give an update on the social side of the pub.

At the time we acquired the pub, in April 2013, only one Aunt Sally team remained; the second team, together with the Darts team, having left for an alternative venue some years previous because of difficulties encountered at the pub. The aim was to get htese teams back, and this has been achieved – the Darts team returning in 2013 and the Aunt Sally team in 2014.

Over the period since 2013, all the teams have enjoyed success. The Darts team won the runners-up trophies in the Pairs league in 2014/15. Both Aunt Sally teams won their respective leagues in 2015 with a third trophy being won by Ronnie Wade for the highest number of dolls scored in the league. In 2016, the 'A' team won the Team Knockout Competition and two of their players – Ronnie Wade and Robert Taylor – this year won the league Pairs Competition, thus keeping the name of The Bull in the forefront of the Aunt Sally world!

In 2014 we formed a Cribbage Club. We have recently gone into our fourth season. The Blakeston Survey of Great Milton 1967

New Edition for the 50th Anniversary

In 1967 The Blakeston Survey was a snapshot of village life. Agriculture was still important, and in Great Milton there were shops, four pubs and buses. The Historical Society have just published a new edition in the form of a book, to celebrate and remember the importance of continuity to village life.

Many superb photographs, taken by Michael Dudley, show both the continuity and the changes: houses, personalities, groups and the many activities are all included. The Survey was quite comprehensive: Harvest Festival in one of the pubs, for instance was a regular annual event then – as it still is; there were 65 children on the

village school roll, medical services are all recorded here; farms within the parish were worked by 10 farmers and 14 others employed on the land using 35 tractors between them. Craftsmen, shopkeepers, pub keepers, a 14-year-old newspaper delivery girl and a 95-year-old market gardener – they are all there.

There are interesting statistics which the survey found. Did you know, for instance, that there were 73 telephones (landlines) in the village – that is one telephone to every 2.4 houses? Compare that with the growth of mobile phones today: thirty years later (in 1996) only 16% of households nationally had a mobile, while last year this had risen to 95%. In 1967 the first and last bus service to Oxford left the village at 8.15 and 20.15 respectively, with the last bus from Oxford on Saturday night was at 22.00.

This is a fascinating glimpse into the village's social history, which many residents, old and new, whether local historians or not, will enjoy hugely.

View from Views

Still the weather is hardly seasonable, very mild and inspite of it appearing to have been wet it is in fact still very dry as has this year on the whole. This has given all the autumn sown crops a very good start in life, having said that we are just beginning to suffer from pigeon attack on the rape ours having been planted a little late means that any areas that did not come too well are the areas that these pests are concentrating



on. We have managed to stave off the slugs, and the cabbage stem eelworm. This we now cannot control as the chemical we used has been temporally banned, and looks as if it is likely to be a permanent ban, for reasons I quite understand, hopefully we may be on the cusp of finding cultural ways of controlling this veracious pest. All in all the crops do look very well, which is more than can be said for some I have seen further north where it has obviously been much wetter then here. Whatever we have to put up with, it is nothing like the devastation in the US caused by the recent Hurricanes where whole crops at whatever stage have been completely destroyed, luckily this sort of event very rarely occurs in the UK thank goodness.

I recently received an email from a contact in Germany making the comment on how many more wild birds there seemed to be in this country, as opposed to Germany. To me a very satisfying comment, as it would indicate that some of the measures we are taking to conserve this wildlife is working. That said the movement to re-wild the country by introducing animals like Wolves and Lynxes does worry me somewhat, I realize these animals were once natives, but the population density now is such that they are not compatible to our modern way of life. Sheep farmers have expressed concerns over the risk to their flocks, I read not long ago that the milk supply from sheep for making of Roquefort cheese is at risk from Wolf attacks. The other side of this coin is that although, as I have already mentioned, times have changed since these animals were indigenous, in those days the average human being did not walk in open country like we expect to do so nowadays. This would put the average walker, if there is such a thing, at great risk of attack by these wild animals. The lynx that escaped from a Zoo in Wales did attack at least one flock of sheep, so it is not as simple as all that. Recently I attended a seminar at the Game & Wildlife Conservation Trust (GWCT), which is considered to be one of the more reliable conservation trusts, whose opinion is sort by the government over and above all others purporting to do the same work who certain, the decline in populations of certain birds is due to the prevalence of predators, and the lack of their control due to the fact most predators are now protected.

Another conundrum for our community to ponder is that there is quite a pressure for another assurance scheme, this is for pasture fed ruminants with a demand for grass feed beef, lamb, and milk, giving the public another logo to look for on the labelling of food products, (PFLA Pasture fed Livestock Association) an Organic organisation that I am associated has been ask to carry out this inspection and Certification. This is all very well, and of course we will carry this out if required as it is another income stream for us but it will cost the farmer, may increase the value of his produce, but we are told that the grazing animal is contributing to the production of Green House gases, so whose right, and we have to decide which way to jump!

We are being bombarded at the moment with consultations on local plans using lengthy explanations as to why and where we should or should not have development, making us all confused and unable to understand the whys and wherefores. I am sure I am not alone in feeling that not only do we not need all these houses, but also that whatever we say no one will take a bit of notice of our comments meaning all these exhibitions and consultations around the district mean nothing as the authorities will do what they want whether we like it or not, just in the same way as they did over the HS2 railway where most people I have talked to agree that the money would be far better spent on the existing network, but no, they know best how to spend our money, and we have very little say. No mention has been made as to where all the domestic water is going to come from or how we think all the waste generated can be absorbed let alone how our creaking infrastructure will cope. Not long ago because of Road works in Stadhampton and Chiselhampton it took me 1 hour to get back to Great Milton from "The Golden Balls" this can only get worse. The answer to this is an Express way cut right through our countryside, if this is the case which will come first?

As my next month's offering will not be read before the New Year I would like to wish all readers all the best for the festive season and for next year

Great Haseley and District Horticultural Society

Over the last couple of months, we seem to have been under attack from all kinds of wildlife. The green woodpeckers are endlessly digging holes in the lawn in their quest for grubs; I guess that is providing some aeration and removing pests and they are pretty birds, but they do make quite a mess. One morning we woke to find several larger holes in the lawn and were puzzled as to their origin. They were too big for the woodpeckers, way too small for badgers and didn't really look like rabbit damage. In the end we concluded, given that the quantity of fox droppings around, this must be fox damage. We frequently see foxes in the garden and the meadow and they are very healthy-looking. This is in direct contrast to the foxes we see in North London around where our children live; those are mangy and look in terrible condition; it does seem to be better to be a fox in the countryside.

Talking about North London, when our son and his wife moved into their

home, I described the major job of clearing the tiny garden which clearly hadn't been entered for some years. This gave our son the growing-things bug and he applied for an allotment only to be told that the waiting list was 37 years! In due course, he and his wife became friends with another young couple along the road who not only had an allotment, but also found it too much and allowed him to tend part of it. This small area has given the young family fruit and vegetables grown in raised beds for several years now. This summer I was admiring his completely unprotected sprouting broccoli and asked why the birds had not destroyed the plants; the reply was that there are so many cats around them that there are virtually no birds! Amazingly, they don't seem to have much of a problem with caterpillars, either; perhaps the green spaces for growing are too far apart in urban areas for the butterflies to move around much? Suddenly, the council decided to rearrange the allotment system, evicted those not caring for them and halving the size of the resulting vacant plots. Our son has chosen the least weed-infested plot available, which is almost directly behind his garden, and started work; he even has inherited a shed which contains furniture for sitting out! There is much excitement and his three-year-old has insisted on a sign which says "Daddy and Tom's allotment'.

The squirrels have finally finished their nut picking for the year. Neither of us are very fond of walnuts, but my other half sees the theft of his nuts as a personal thing and spends much time thinking up new anti-squirrel measures, none of which have worked so far. Who knew that squirrels could run at electric fencing and simply pass through without so much as a second's hesitation? The saga no doubt will continue next autumn.

We have been very fortunate with our November weather with quite a lot of sun and fewer dark, miserable days than usual. Even though we have had frosts, there are a lot of plants still flowering which means winter will, hopefully, seem shorter this year!

To Be Winter Ready, you should:

- Know your free emergency numbers in a power cut dial 105 or, for a gas emergency, dial 0800 111999.
- Prepare your home keep a torch handy and get your appliances serviced by a Gas Safe registered engineer to prevent carbon monoxide poisoning. Vulnerable households can get extra support by signing up to the Priority Services Register. Contact your gas or electricity network to find out more. Visit www.energynetworks.org to find out who your network operator is.
- Keep your eyes open keep an eye on the weather forecast and, if you have a power cut or a gas emergency, check on your neighbours.

In recent years the chances of unplanned problems with electricity and gas supply have reduced dramatically. Since 1990, network companies have invested £80bn in improving the reliability of local energy networks in the UK. As a result,

on average, electricity customers have a power cut just once every two years and gas distribution customers will have their gas supply interrupted without advance notice just once every 40 years.

Despite this, our gas and electricity networks can be affected by natural events, with severe winter weather potentially causing significant damage. The gas and electricity network operators are urging the public to Be Winter Ready. Make sure you're prepared in case you have a power cut or gas emergency.






