

Parish Council News

These are the minutes of the Great Milton Parish Council meeting held at The Pavilion on Monday, March 18th, 2024, at 7:30 p.m. Present: Cllrs S Harrod (chair), B Fox (Vice-chair), D Harms, S MacMahon and S Illingworth. In attendance: Chris Ashworth (Clerk), Amy Williams (Clerk) and 2 members of the public.

27/24 Apologies for absence

Apologies for absence were received from Cllrs P Allen, M Horsley, Cllr G Heritage (SODC) and Cllr F Van Mierlo (OCC)

28/24 Variation of order of business

There was no variation to the order of business.

29/24 Declarations of members' interest

No declarations of interest in matters on the agenda were received.

30/24 Matters to report

The County and District Councillors' reports were received and reviewed and are available on the Parish Council website.

31/24 Correspondence and public discussion

There was no correspondence or public discussion.

32/24 Planning applications

A The following planning applications were received from SODC and reviewed:

P24/S0675/FUL (Brimpton Grange Access To Hotel From A40 Milton Common) Erection of six detached dwellings, creation of vehicular and pedestrian access and associated infrastructure and works. The Parish Council discussed the above application and has no strong views.

24/S0073/FUL (Common Cottage London Road Milton Common OX9 2NU) Single dwelling.

A member of the public raised concerns regarding planning applications in the village and the way SODC processes them. The Parish Council discussed the application, and all voted in full support of it.

B The following planning decisions were received and reviewed.

P24/S0154/HH (2 Thame Road Great Milton) Demolition of existing outbuilding and construction of new outbuilding. SODC has approved this planning application.

P23/S3459/FUL (White Ash London Road Milton Common) Erection of two semi-detached properties on land adjacent to White Ash. (As amended by plan ref 21092302-3 1c which shows the air source heat pump and as amplified by noise impact assessment receive 13 December 2023 and as amplified by Car Swept Paths Plan received 14 December 2023). SODC has refused this planning application.

P24/S0029/LDE (Brimpton Grange Access To Hotel From A40 Milton Common) Confirmation that a material operation contained within the development in the form of a section of strip foundation was carried out before the expiration of the permission (dated 23rd May 2017) and the permission therefore remains extant in perpetuity. SODC has approved this planning application.

P24/S0031/LDE (Brimpton Grange Access To Hotel From A40 Milton Common) Confirmation that a material operation contained within the development in the form of a section of strip foundation was carried out before the expiration of the permission (dated19th May 2017) and the permission therefore remains extant in perpetuity. SODC has approved this planning application

35/24 Parish clerk and councillors' update of matters in hand

- The spring clean was a success with a small turnout, but a determined group cleared a good amount of rubbish.
- The grass-cutting tenure has been signed with Tactical, who completed their first cut on Friday, 9th March. This is on a 3-month trial period, which will move to a 2-year contract with Tactical if all goes well.

36/24 Security in the village

Residents are encouraged to continue to report any incidents they witness or experience to the police via the 101 telephone service or online via the police.co.uk website.

37/24 Speed indicator devices

New quotes have not been received. To continue this process, the Parish Council has agreed to purchase one mobile speed sign and two solar panels for the poles on Church Road and Thame Road. A further quote will be gathered for a permanent SID in Lower End.

38/24 Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) Grant Fund

The Parish Council discussed the CIL fund, and there are no projects in the village that are suitable for this fund.

39/24 Grass cutting in the playpark at the Recreation ground

Tactical attended on Friday, 8th March, to complete their first cut of the village. While completing this, they found that the grass within the play area should be cut more often than monthly, as stated in our contract. They believe the grass cut at the recreation ground should include the children's play park in the fenced-off area. Due to the access restrictions, this has to be cut with a push mower. The grass should be kept lower with the involvement of health and safety in a children's playpark. The cost for this would be £37 + VAT a cut.

The Parish Council fully supported the above. The Parish Clerk will update the contract with Tactical.

40/24 Community emergency co-ordinator

The Parish's community emergency plan needs updating, and we need a volunteer to take over from Cllr Allen as the community emergency coordinator. Cllr Harms volunteered to take over the role.

41/24 Future litter picks in the Village

The Parish Council agreed we should look into another litter pick this spring. The Parish Clerk will contact the waste team at SODC to enquire about rubbish collection and use of equipment.

42/24 Parking on the verges in the Village

The Parish Council discussed the issues raised by cars parking on green verges in the village. Residents are reminded that the green spaces are not for parking but can be used for access.

The Rector's Pint

March ended, literally with Easter Sunday, it was the last day of the month, and the clocks went forward an hour. This may well have tested the mettle of anyone who went to a sunrise service on Easter morning. I know what I am like in the early morning!

The Sundays following Easter give us a glimpse into the mindset of the early disciples and not least, Thomas, who we call 'doubting Thomas'. He is in fact my favourite disciple because he's the one who asks the awkward questions. I think that his doubts are to his credit; he wasn't going to believe in a story or a rumour without evidence. On the Sunday after Easter, his story, recorded in John's Gospel (Chapter 20) tells us that he refused to believe that Jesus had risen from the dead without evidence: "Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands, and put my finger in the mark of the nails and my hand in his side, I will not believe".

We read that Thomas had to wait a week for the evidence to present itself. We don't often get what we want when we want it! "Although the doors to the room they were in were shut, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you".

Then he said to Thomas, "Put your finger here and see my hands, reach out your hand and put it in my side. Do not doubt but believe". Thomas answered him," My Lord and my God".

I love that story, and that Thomas, who we accuse of being the doubting one, was, in fact, the first among the disciples to declare that Jesus was Lord and God.

Anyone who has ever been at a baptism that I have conducted, will know that I always tell the visitors and guests that I do what I do essentially because I believe this to be true, that Jesus was raised from the dead on the third day. I believe in the truth of resurrection from the dead because of Him. I have had plenty of times of doubt over the years, about how it all works in the face of the world's complexities and sorrows, but I can't get round this, that those who wrote these accounts down believed them to be true, and that conviction has stayed with me for many years now.

I rarely recommend films that try and tell us this story, but I am very happy to do so with Risen which stars Joseph Fiennes as the Roman Tribute who oversaw Jesus' crucifixion and who is then tasked with finding his body when rumours circulated that Jesus had been seen alive. It takes a different and unique view on the resurrection story. It can still be found on Netflix, and I think it is encouraging and uplifting.

Christ is risen.

The Winter Cross-Country Season

The 2024 Oxfordshire cross-country championships took place at Shotover on a bitterly cold day in January, and Great Milton AC athletes came away with mud and medals. The course was water-logged and boggy, with energy-sapping mud, and was amazingly testing. This was the hardest course we have experienced in over 10 years in the league, and the athletes did incredibly well to all finish, and to finish with two shoes still on their feet!



Hugo Szekely ran 1500m in his under-9s race and was third under-9 boy in the county. Yes, the county! His end-of-race grimace was immediately replaced by a huge smile when a bronze medal was hung around his neck (photo).

The under-11s also ran 1500m, and Alice Mosely was 25th in the girls' race, whilst for the boys Leo Powell finished 18th in the boys race, and Tommy Wilson 22nd.

Further glory came in the 3,000m under-13 girls' race, with Great Milton winning

their first ever team silver medals (photo). They were led home by Dora Twycross 5th, followed by Abby Kirkman 11th and Grace Mosley 15th. This was a wonderful achievement – second team in Oxfordshire. Wow!

The league season finished in March with the fifth and final race at Henley. Hugo, Tommy and Alice all won participation medals from the league, whilst the U13s had club participation medals to compete for – Rufus Blanche won bronze, Dora silver, and Grace gold. The trophy for the top-xc runner (based on overall points irrespective of age group) went to Hugo.

Dora's fine performances over the winter and in the county-championships saw her selected to



represent Oxfordshire in the UK Inter-counties Championships in Nottingham. She won her first Oxfordshire vest, and it was a great honour to witness her racing with 300 of the best under-13 girls in the country at Wollaton Park. Dora came 224th and Oxfordshire were 32nd team, and her magnificent achievement was a thrilling and fitting end to a wonderful season. Now, with the arrival of spring, we now turn

our attention to the outdoor track and field season.

GMAC are grateful to all the parents and friends who serve on the committee and help at training, to Le Manoir for the use of their field for xc training, and the Sheppard Trust for their support over the years.

Great Milton Primary School News

Welcome to the 5th School Governors' News Bites

As many know school had an OFSTED inspection early in February, (the previous one was in October 2018). We are delighted to share the report result with you now. "Great Milton C of E Primary School continues to be a good school." Of course, we knew this already, but it is a wonderful, official affirmation of the hard work put in by Ms Frost, the head and her team of whom we continue to be very proud. You can read the full report on the OFSTED site. Here are a few salient points about the process:

- This was the first routine inspection the school received since the COVID-19 pandemic began. The inspector discussed the impact of the pandemic with the school and has taken that into account in this evaluation of the school.
- Meetings were held with the headteacher, deputy headteacher, SENCo and pastoral lead. The inspector also had discussions with the early years team, members of the governing body and representatives from the local authority and diocese.
- The inspector carried out deep dives in these subjects: early reading, mathematics and art and design. For each deep dive, they held discussions about the curriculum, visited lessons, spoke to teachers, talked to some pupils about their learning and looked at samples of pupils' work. They also listened to some pupils read to a familiar adult. The inspector considered the school's curriculum in some other subjects by looking at curriculum maps with leaders and talking to pupils.
- The views of staff, parents and pupils were gathered using Ofsted's surveys. The
 inspector also talked to pupils around school and at breaktime, and with staff as
 they went about their work.
- To evaluate the effectiveness of safeguarding, the inspector reviewed the single central record; took account of the views of leaders, staff and pupils; and considered the extent to which the school has created an open and positive culture around safeguarding that puts pupils' interests first.

The report contains many positive comments about the school, too many to include here so here's just one: "The way that the school embraced the arrival of refugees and their families a couple of years ago is impressive. While they have all moved on now, the legacy of empathy and the depth of pupils' understanding about what they experienced is inspirational ".

The next inspection, will be ungraded & will happen in about 4 years.

On behalf of our parents the Governors would like to congratulate the whole school team on the outcome of the inspection. We are all aware that this can be a stressful and taxing process. The whole team has worked extremely hard. We can all take satisfaction knowing that our children are receiving the standard of education they are due.

View from Views

There is an old saying that mentions "February Fill Dike" certainly true this year, looking at my monthly rainfall records covering the last 10 years or so, we have exceeded our average of 50mm, by 100%, having recorded 101. This is interesting as it seems the February average can vary from 4mm last year to 99.5



in 2020. Never known it as wet as at present, we can speculate as to the reason, Global Warming, but more likely the intensive development along the Thame valley. It is this over development that is causing not only this flooding but also the pollution of all water courses. If we are to stop this unacceptable situation, we must halt all development until proper mitigation action is taken. I have seen pictures of the chalk streams (the Test) in Hampshire, having sewage pumped into it this must stop, enough is enough, and to note the state of our flooded meadows when the floods recede, is beyond belief. Moreover I note that Southern Water have stated that they are to continue to extract water from these streams, during dry periods, probably until 2035

having agreed to 2027. These are just more examples of us human pressure on nature.

By the end of the first week of March, at last it looked as if we might soon be able to do some field work, first operation was to put on the first dose of fertiliser, which we did manage, now that could well be in the river. The next task will need to be attack weeds which do not seem too bad, I guess due to the inclement weather, then of course disease will be the next problem just beginning to show. The condition of the crops is still presenting us with conundrums, we are still not sure what we should do with the Barley, much more of it looks as if it could produce a half decent crop, than it did this time last month. The Wheat is fine, if readers can remember one field we planted straight into a standing crop that had been killed the day before and, was still standing at 18" tall, this is a much better looking piece than the crop in the adjacent field planted on the same day. Now with more rain everything is back on hold.

Needless to say many water birds have benefitted from the floods, being constant visitors mostly gulls but, also Egrets. March is the month of the "Mad march Hare" luckily, I can report that the population of this wonderful creature is on a path to recovery. Grey/English Partridge continue to increase here, although they are thought of as a game bird and this many would think of little importance, nearly become extinct due to the introduction of the "Red legged/French Partridge" as they are more prolific therefore, better bet to introduce for game shooting. The "Greys", I am told are not so savvy as the "Reds" so need more nurturing, so it is somewhat of an achievement to be hosting them. The traditional Blackthorn Winter has seemed never ending, with it flowering over a very extended period this spring.

There is a debate around food security and, use of homegrown crops to produce green energy, this is an argument which is difficult to answer. How about years ago we used to grow oats to feed draught horses which gave us the power to plough, so what is different to now producing fuel from crops to power our tractors.

The PM recently attended the NFU annual conference, very rare for a PM to do this but, of course it is an election year. He did though make some very reassuring noises leading us to believe that he understood our problems, it remains to be seen what happens as we have heard it all before. Recent news on the subsidy schemes makes us believe that they are not only becoming more user friendly but also set at more realistic rates all very encouraging. Having said that there did not seem much for us in the budget. Not that anyone could expect much as the country is on it's knees financially, as we cannot, repair the roads, support the NHS, or the Police, Railways are in disarray, and Education, all needing more investment, to mention just a few. The country has to recover financially somehow from being devasted by covid and, now Ukraine.

Last month I mentioned the M & S building in London, where quite

rightly Michael Gove said it should not be pulled down, for all sorts of very good reasons one being the waste of perfectly usable materials, but he has been overruled, by someone or system that has no regard for our valuable raw materials. Whilst on the political front, I understand that our previous district councillor is to stand as an MP for this constituency, all I can say that if she looks after us in the way she did as a councillor, then we will have an excellent MP.

Next Month sees us yet again partaking in the "Chiltern Vintage Tractor run", 19th June in aid of the "Air Ambulance", and this year we are fielding 4 tractors between us. Last year we collected £1782.50, which of course does not include those who donated to a communal "Just Giving" fund. John Howell MP writes...

Issues around the environment are never far away as there are so many important issues to pay attention to. As I write this month it's The Big Plastic Count. From 11th-17th March I'm joining lots of people across the country counting the single use plastic that I use this week. It will be interesting to see the data for this year to see how we are doing in moving away from single use plastics.



It does take time to change our habits and indeed the manufacture of products. Since the introduction of the Resources and Waste Strategy for England in 2018

significant progress has been made to address plastic pollution, including a ban on microbeads and restricting the supply of plastic straws, plastic drink stirrers, plastic-stemmed cotton buds, plastic plates, trays, bowls, cutlery, balloon sticks and certain types of polystyrene cups and food containers. The figures that lead to these bans are staggering. I understand that in England 2.7 billion items of single-use cutlery and over 700 million single-use plates used to be used in a year with only about 10 per cent being recycled!

Many of the things that we seek to tackle are on issues where we have become more aware of practices that used to be unknown. Just as the need to reduce our plastic has become more commonly known, and action taken towards it, so too are concerns on the testing on animals of chemicals used as ingredients in cosmetics. The Government has recognised the public concern around this and has recently introduced measures to ensure that no new licences will be granted for animal testing of chemicals that are exclusively intended to be used as ingredients in cosmetics products. This is more good news. The Government does need to look at these things over time. It is always important when introducing new measures that relevant industries are able to respond without undue detriment. Hence the Government is actively committed to supporting and funding the development and dissemination of techniques that replace, reduce, and refine the use of animals in research.

As Spring arrives we are all more aware of our gardens and the countryside around us. Another concern raised with me recently is for our hedgerows which are an important part of our farmed landscape; a landscape with which we are very familiar. The Department for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs (Defra) is moving forward on several fronts on this. There are schemes to encourage farmers, for example through the Countryside Stewardship schemes, where Ministers are supporting farmers to maintain and restore existing hedgerows and also to plant more across the country. Defra is also supporting farmers in assessing the condition of hedgerows, and to manage them in a way that will work for wildlife and improve biodiversity. However, it's not all about business. There are also plans in progress for domestic hedgerow regulations which will, among other things protect nesting birds in the season.

Another area which I know is of interest to constituents is the growing dependence on new technology and the risk of alienation that this can lead to for some people, especially older people. We live in an increasingly online world and, although for some this is a regret, it is not going to change. This means that digital skills are important from the basics that people need to make the most of online connectivity, to the skills needed in every job, to the high-level skills for the growing number of specialist jobs in the economy. The Government is committed to helping those who need support to acquire basic digital skills. The Government is also working to remove barriers, and to ensure that online services are as inclusive as possible by making public sector websites accessible to as many people as possible. This is all part of its broader strategy to reduce digital exclusion and very welcome.
