Ramblings from the Rectory

I sometimes write something topical on these pages. I have just encountered a couple of people and in frustration exclaimed that I had been staring at an empty computer screen for a couple of hours wondering what on earth I was to write for the monthly local village magazines? ‘There’s always the election’ I said. ‘Oh please no’ was the response. We have also seen some terrible things over the past few weeks which disrupted the election, and then horrifically and dramatically with took the focus away from the outcome following with the fire in West London. Thoughts and prayers remain with all those who have suffered as a result. But this time I will take the advice and for my main piece avoid the immediately topical and write about something completely different. There is however a response following to something John Howell wrote in the May Bulletin about one of my ramblings.

It was a real pleasure to connect with Adrian and Bridget Plass whilst at Spring Harvest in April, Adrian had been entertaining us at one of the evening after hours events. Some will remember when they came to Great Milton last September. It was lovely to take them out to a full English breakfast at a cafe at Blue Anchor Bay.

I am reminded of another encounter with Adrian Plass when he came to speak in High Wycombe. He told a true story that struck a chord with me.

It concerned a woman that he had met in his travels. When she was a girl she used to sing in the choir of a church in the North of England. It was a large and successful choir presided over by a very strict director of music. If members of the choir missed three choir practices, then they were asked to leave the choir. This girl had been ill one week, and so had missed a practice. She was then so scared the next week that she missed another practice. On the third week, having by now missed two practices she was so terrified at meeting the choir master that though by now she was perfectly well, she missed a third. She knew that her chances of being in the choir were scuppered and so she sat at home feeling very miserable when she heard a knock at the door. When she opened the door she saw one of the older members of the choir. He simply looked at her with great concern and said “Ee lass, we have missed thee”. For this girl it was a life changing experience of grace that eventually led to her being ordained to share this message of grace with others.

I wonder what people’s view of God is like? Is it actually ‘three strikes and you’re out.’ A view sadly, it has to be said, helped by the ways they might have been treated by his church. And yet alongside this we must remember the message of Jesus who told a story, a parable about two sons, one of who cashed in his inheritance and squandered it in wild living, you will find the story in Luke chapter 15 vss 11- 31. In that 

story when the boy comes to his senses and seeks to return home, but only as a hired hand, feeling that he had lost the right to come back as a son, he was welcomed back by his Father who had obviously been longing and watching for his return and when he saw this sorry figure in the distance rushed out to meet him and smothered him with hugs.

God doesn't say to us 'there there it doesn't matter' when we act or think in ways which we know to be wrong. It does matter, the Christian answer is to look at the Cross to see just how much. But neither does God say, 'three strikes and you're out'. It is easy for us to get into situations where we put God to one side, or to simply drift away from God. I've actually had communications from people who wonder if I will mind if they can come to church because they have not done so for a long time, will they be accepted? I'm staggered that they think they won't be. I like Adrian's story, I can almost hear God saying, "Eee Lass, Ee Lad, I've missed thee." His church of course should say no less.

Great Milton Athletics Club (GMAC)

Cross Country season 2016/17

The cross country (xc) season finished in March with a number of successes. Esther Merlin won a medal in the U11 girls competition and Phoebe Coleman went on to race in the Oxfordshire county championships where she came 11th in the U13 girls' event. Great Milton girl power also helped Wheatley Park School girls' xc team to a team silver in the South Oxfordshire schools xc final. Congratulations to Phoebe Coleman, Esther Davies, Emma Lamont and Lucy Block.

Track & field competitions

The track and field season is now well underway, with many fine performances and personal bests so far this summer. The county championships taking place in May saw Jack Spencer win gold in 100m, hurdles, long jump, pole vault, 300m, and a 

silver in the high-jump. His 300m time of 38.88 seconds was a championship record. It was a splendid sight to see two GMAC U15 boys, Jack along with Magnus Pridmore in the county 100m final. Magnus obtained a coveted 100m personal best in that final. Freddie Cunningham won his first county gold in the 800m in a personal best time of 2:13 following an assertive run from the front. For the girls, Esther Davies collected her first county medal, a bronze in the pole vault. In other competitions, Maya Roach won a gold medal for her sprint in an U9s Quadkids event and Esther Merlin was GMAC's top points scorer in the U11 Quadkids with personal bests in all four events. Congratulations go out to Esther Davies and Jack Spencer who have been selected to represent Oxfordshire Schools in the U15 Midlands Pentathlon Championships in late June. They will compete in hurdles, long jump, shot, high jump, and the 800m.

Training

Training away days have been enjoyed with national coaches at Lee Valley, Leamington Spa, Brunel Indoor centre and Millfield School for a mixture of pole vault, high-jump and long jump. Some of our athletes were also hugely privileged to train at Loughborough University to receive guidance from the Great Britain hurdles coach Benke Blomkvist.

During the winter, extra training was shared with the talented Aldershot (AFD) squad and their generous sprinkling of international athletes such as Steph Twell.

Other news

Earlier in the year, all the children benefitted from a generous donation of British 2012 Olympic kit from local girl Mara Yamauchi, a 2008 and 2012 Olympian. Children adorned in team GB kit were a regular sight in the village and at Horspath track after her visit. Mara has a long history with Great Milton, visiting the school in 2009 a few days after coming second in the London Marathon, and taking Class 6 for a training session.

GMAC are the powerhouse behind the local primary schools' Area Sports, which takes place on 14th July and delights and inspires hundreds of local children. Many of the older children and young adults who will be helping organise Area Sports are former Great Milton school pupils, and current or former athletes with GMAC. The GMAC training squad is currently at full capacity, but priority to join is always given to children from Great Milton who are aged year 4 upwards. Children from further afield aged year 5 upwards are welcome when there is space. We have an open invitation to young teenagers who enjoy 1500m and xc to join the squad. Later in the Summer, the Oxfordshire Families team will be recording the gravestones in the churchyard, and at the same time, we hope to undertake the registration of the floor memorials in the Church.

Buses

Dear All,

It was nice to have a good response to my previous letter in the magazine and hopefully we shall be able to get a committee together to do something about the bus situation that the council seems to be completely incompetent to deal with. A lot of you signed the petition that I took around at the Church Fete last week and Patrick and Christine very kindly let me leave it in the Great Milton PO – so if you haven't yet signed there is still a chance to do so.

We now know:

1. People are unable to get to work and some have given up their jobs as a result.
2. Those who no longer own cars or do not have driving licences cannot get to the medical treatment centres they may need without considerable difficulty and inconvenience.
3. Youngsters are unable to take themselves off to events/matches/parties in nearby towns/villages.

4. Both old and young are undertaking dangerous walks along busy roads where there is no footpath and the verges are completely neglected and unsown. Cars do drive at dangerous speeds along these roads and as I said before it is only a matter of time before there will be a nasty accident.

5. Property prices may well be affected – I gather there have been moves away from the village because of the withdrawal of the bus service

People really do not want the inconvenience and cost of arranging private transport for all these things and, although one is grateful to all those who offer these services, it is up to the local authority to get its act together and reorganise the ridiculously inefficient bus services in the county. During the day there are dozens of double deckers driving all over the place with two or three people aboard. There should be some way of redistributing the drivers and vehicles on certain routes on certain days so that there is an efficient and timetabled service for all – not just the lucky few.

A Response to John Howell

I don't want to get into a lengthy dialogue with our MP John Howell in these pages but I just want to say that I have noted his response in the GM Bulletin to one of my ramblings. Can I firstly say that it is impressive that Mr Howell obviously reads the various magazines from around his constituency, or at least has them brought to his attention.

My comment was specifically about the so called Dubs amendment to do with unaccompanied refugee children from Europe. Mr Howell is absolutely right to draw to my attention the fact that 3000 was a target figure. I was mistaken, I had not appreciated that detail. Mr Howell states that some local authorities had been struggling to place the children in their care. I don't doubt this. However, the Guardian reported on 4th March: 'freedom of information responses collated from the Observer from dozens of UK councils paint a very different picture. There are at least 368 more spaces available for unaccompanied minors in the UK, under the national transfer scheme for asylum-seeking children'. In that article the claim was also made that several authorities confirmed they had capacity for more child refugees and had communicated this to the Home Office and that the offers had been ignored. If this is true it does indicate that though difficult there was a will to take more child refugees. Again, if this assessment is correct 368 more spaces, though well short of the 3000 target figure, is double the 350 that were finally to be allowed in with this scheme. Target or not, 


there was a deep sense of dismay about this decision as indicated in the comments and quotes that I used. Lord Dubs claimed that at the beginning the government accepted the letter and the spirit of the amendment, and maintained that they had gone back on their word. (BBC news 9 Feb 2017) Also, according to the BBC news, the Immigration minister Robert Goodwill was quoted as saying that the 350 would “meet the intention and spirit” of Lord Dubs’s amendment. There was clearly a strong difference of opinion whether just over a tenth of the original target figure did in fact meet the intention and spirit of the amendment. My own archbishop Justin Welby and many other people obviously felt not.

Finally, on a more personal note. Whilst it is not necessary to always agree with a particular political party’s standpoint or outlook, it is still possible to support our local MP’s in the work that they do. At this difficult time politically I wish John Howell every success in being a good and conscientious local MP as he represents his constituency.

View From Views

It is at this time of year that we can begin to get an idea of what our crops will produce, on a recent walk through our crops, I got the impression that the Winter Wheat appears to have fared the rigours of the weather reasonably well, I don’t think it will break any records but will produce a very respectable yield. The Spring Barley on the other hand has had a very difficult time, being so dry soon after planting seems to me to be slightly below average, other than in the wet areas, funnily enough, where it is very thin and at least a week behind the rest of the field. The reason that these wet areas to have suffered in a dry time is due to the difficulty in getting a seed bed, the ground being wet and claggy meant it would not breakup into a fine seed bed thus becoming very knobbly providing little soil seed contact, one could argue if we had postponed planting a few days the soil would have worked into a better seed bed, but then it could well have been too dry for the rest of the field to germinate at all, all part of the joys of farming! Oil Seed Rape is now impassable, even the footpath we have cleared is now practically impassable and not sure what we can do about it, so really have no great idea of its potential yield, except on last inspection looked a very reasonable crop.



Whilst on my crop yield estimation walks, I have been gladdened by being deafened

by the Farmland bird song especially the Sky Larks, the Sparrows outside our bedroom window serenade us whilst waking at four or so in the morning, it's the sort of scenario that makes us appreciate being alive, and living where we are, when we hear and read what terrible things are happening in our towns and cities. Most trees and shrubs have finished flowering its now down to the roses and wildflowers to give us colour and the smells just wonderful! It is also heartening to see our field margins beginning to show colours, indicating that our floristic enhancement, as it is called, is now baring fruits after a very difficult start due to dry conditions at planting two years ago. Soon the birds will go into their quite mode, and with the passing of the longest day you could say it is the start of the run down to Christmas. It hardly seems yesterday that we were lighting fires and turning the heating down to save energy and realise it is all going to happen again, anyway lets enjoy the rest of the summer weather hoping that we do not get too much of anything.

What A surprise we have a new Environment minister in the words of Guy Smith (deputy president of the National Farmers Union) “only the fourth in five years”, I can remember that it was not very long ago the same scenario happened before. It is the same old story the Countryside and environment are of no importance, forgetting completely that in fact it produces the food we and wildlife eat, the air we breathe, and the beautiful country we all like to see and enjoy. At the moment I cannot comment on Mr Gove but his original sound bites seem to be favourable, except for a worrying comment he made when asked about the trampling of crops, “people should have free access to enjoy the countryside”. Does he not, along with George Monbiot, (who has just announced that the public should have free access to the countryside where ever) understand free access not only damages Farmers income, but adds great pressure to wildlife, which is having its space restricted by the human being, which cannot be allowed to continue.

On a completely different subject which is of personal worry to me that I just need to get off my chest, this is in regards to the unfairness of our society. Most readers will be aware of the “Jack Peers Centre” which was set up in memory of my father Jack Peers as an extra resource for the youngsters of East Oxford, and students of “Peers School” now “The Oxford Academy” (TOA) in the early 80's, when there was a problem of direction for these youngsters, trying to show them amongst other things what the countryside has to offer. Now owing to cuts etc, without going into boring details, curtailing its activities, under the present head, a very innovative programme has been devised to cater for the problems of some very disadvantaged children. This has been a very successful programme, which has reformed the youngsters' lives, and their behaviour, is now almost impossible to afford, the alternative is that these 

youngsters have to attend expensive independent special schools, which needless to say are run as a business, at vast expense with profits lining the pockets of executives of the businesses running them. "TOA" has now come up with the idea of running these courses at the centre as a separate business, just so that they can hold on to the members of staff that have made this project so successful, but do not have the money to do so. My gripe is that these schools have to struggle with very difficult individuals without extra funding. Yes more money is going to schools, but there are also proportionally more pupils, the "TOA" being one of the 16 or so top schools in the country, after a recent Ofsted inspection, has become very popular. Whereas private schools that don't on the whole have the same problem, get millions donated by the wealthy, this does not seem fair to me. Obviously there is more to this story that this column allows space for and I am really trying to write about Farming and the countryside, so should not really mention this injustice but it is my own hobby horse.

Great Haseley and District Horticultural Society

We have just returned from a short walking holiday in Burgundy to find the UK in the midst of a heatwave with very high temperatures. We rarely go away in summer because the garden is so demanding, but close friends wanted to do this walking holiday with us because the men, who are old school friends, walked Hadrian's Wall last spring in mostly pouring rain and around 30 miles a day. The women decided that was too much, so the plan to enjoy sun with shorter walking was hatched. Burgundy was also in the middle of a heat wave, but after some rain it actually felt cooler there than here.

Much of our walking was through vineyards and countryside. The wild flowers were spectacular with masses of orchids which we enjoyed with slightly less envy because, just before we left Great Milton, my other half had spotted our first orchid in the meadow when he nearly mowed it off; we were so excited about it and protected it with a chicken wire cage so it wasn't munched by the first passing deer. Deer are a real problem for gardens around here as they are particularly fond of flowers especially roses, but seem to be frightened off when the alpacas are in residence. The knock-on effect has been that Tulips have reappeared in the garden which I planted more than 20 years ago before I discovered they got eaten. I had always assumed the culprits were rabbits, but that cannot be the case as we still have rabbits in the garden with the alpacas so it must be that deer are responsible.

Following the fete, there were far fewer plants in pots and Sally kindly agreed to water in our absence. Little did she know how hard that task would be in the heat! A splendid job was done and pretty much everything survived for which I am very grateful. I really will put less in pots next year. I say that every year, but I get tempted in garden centres and before I know where I am the pots are back again. This is not helped by each year already having plants growing on for the fete next year.

Watering must continue each day until we get some decent rain, but even then, pots of bedding and hanging baskets will require daily watering. If your pots do dry out completely you need to put them in trays and allow them to soak up water to resaturate the compost; water poured on

top will simply run through if there is no tray to provide a reservoir. It is important to remove the pots when it rains or the roots will become waterlogged and the plants will suffer. The appearance may suggest they are wilting and short of water; the application of yet more water may well result in death. However, death in the garden is always an opportunity to acquire yet another plant!

Do keep vegetables well-watered especially peas and beans when they are flowering and setting pods. The addition of good compost (preferably home-made which takes longer to rot down than shop bought) before any planting helps the soil maintain moisture and nutrients. However, too much water can be a bad thing as we have found with our asparagus bed which is on the flood plain and not raised enough. I fear we will need to start again....

I am, of course, grateful to those who supported me on polling day, however once polling day is over successful candidate is the MP for everyone who lives in the Constituency. Strictly speaking MPs are there to help with matters in their own constituency for which Parliament is responsible although sometimes I can help beyond this. Concerns relating to the NHS, HM Revenue and Customs, the Borders Agency, and the Department of Work and Pensions are examples of issues that I can directly take up. However many of the issues that are raised with me are matters for our local councils and you have elected representatives to these council who are often best placed to help. For example matters such as planning, refuse collection, housing benefit and council tax are dealt with by the district council, whilst issues relating to highways, social services, school transport and trading standards come under the remit of the county council. Full details of the responsibilities of the different councils can be found on their websites and my office is always willing to try to direct you to the best point of contact for help should you need it.

I do hold surgeries and as the constituency is geographically large I move them around to try to be nearer to different communities at different times. However with the use of technology many issues can be addressed more promptly using phone and email. In my experience over the last 9 years as your MP, I have found more and more

issues have been dealt with in this way. It enables much more prompt action to get the ball rolling to resolve issues. Individual case issues are usually dealt with through my constituency office so in the first instance please call there if you would like help or advice.

I look forward to meeting many of you in the coming months and hearing from many more on the various issues that will no doubt arise.

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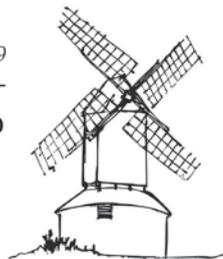
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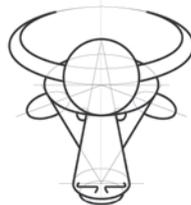
