As you are all probably aware by now, the 103 bus service is being shut down as of 2 December 2016 because it is not financially viable for Heyfordian.

This is indeed a sad and sorry situation, but there is a possible light at the end of this particular tunnel. Your Parish Council is looking into the possibility of arranging a regular service to and from Thame and Wheatley, utilising the Comet



service being offered by Oxfordshire County Council. This is a welcome initiative from Little Milton Parish Council which we are keen to explore. In essence, we could see a regular service on weekday mornings which would be underwritten by the Parish Councils and could be funded from the Parish precept at a cost of around 33p per household per month – in my opinion, not a massively significant figure! We will be discussing this further at the 21st November PC meeting, if anyone is interested in taking part. It's early days yet but watch this space...

In other news, the planning application for a travellers' camp on London Road near Tetsworth has raised its head again and is going to appeal, having been rejected earlier.

To end on a happy note, Tash Keal has now officially taken on the lease for the Bull and started trading on Monday 24 October. I am sure you will all join me in wishing her the best of luck in this exciting venture. Please give her all the support you can.

103 bus service

GMPC were informed by Heyfordian that they were to withdrawal the 103 bus service from 2nd December 2016. Heyfordian have been analysing the fares on a weekly basis and reviewed these after 3 months. Their review clearly showed that the number of passengers required to keep the service going had steadily fallen (especially during September). Heyfordian reported that they have now reached the stage whereby their costs were not being covered.

A transport meeting is scheduled on 26th October. All Parishes affected by the withdrawal of the 103 bus service will be attending. Cllr Peter Fewell will be representing Great Milton Parish.

Ramblings from the Rectory

It was a delight to see the Church so full for the Adrian and Bridget Plass 'Heroes' evening at the end of September. Adrian and Bridget brought along the singer songwriter Rob Halligan (his album 'Love come down' is wonderful) and the actor David Robinson.

One of the pieces I found particularly moving was about Woodbine Willie. David has a special interest and has researched about this remarkable man. Woodbine Willie, whose real name was Geoffrey Studdert Kennedy, was an Anglican vicar in Worcester at the outbreak of the Great War. He volunteered as an army chaplain on the Western front and was horrified by what he saw and experienced. "War is only glorious when you buy it in the Daily Mail and enjoy it at the breakfast table. It goes splendidly with bacon and eggs. Real war is the final limit of damnable brutality, and that's all there is in it." he wrote. He became established as a firm favourite with his men. He gained his name because he would give to each man in his spiritual charge a gospel and a packet of Woodbine cigarettes. He was with the men, going up to the Front line with them and sharing their risks. He was awarded the Military Cross at Messines Ridge having run into no man's land to help the wounded of both sides during an attack on the German front line. He hated the war and saw no glory in it whatsoever, but he loved the men

and would do anything to ease their situation. The war caused him to question how God could stand by and watch the creation tearing itself to shreds? His answer was that this God was to be seen at the heart of the suffering. As he wrote in one of his poems:

Only in Him can I find home to hide me,

Who on the Cross was slain to rise again;

Only with Him, my Comrade God, beside me,

Can I go forth to war with sin and pain.



This year, once again has seen anniversaries from that terrible conflict of 100 years ago. We have remembered the hell that was Verdun, and the enormous loss of life on the Somme. The first day of the Somme stands as the greatest catastrophe in British military history, 60,000 casualties, killed wounded or missing on July 1st.

The poppies we wear of course originate from the Great War. I really do support the wearing of the poppy as an act of respect and remembrance, to be worn with sadness for the conflicts of the past, and the ongoing conflicts of the present. It is a tragedy that we have not endured a lasting peace since the end of the Second World War, that names continue to be added to our war memorials. We are bewildered by Syria and Iraq, Afghanistan, North Africa, Darfur, the Yemen. There is so much conflict and there is so little any of us seem to be able to do about it.

And we get bewildered at prayer. 'Lord, we pray for peace,' I hear myself uttering Sunday by Sunday. I recently said in a sermon that this can feel like the prayer equivalent of spitting into the wind. Jesus in the Sermon on the Mount proclaimed 'blessed are peacemakers'. I think though, as with everything this must begin with us. As we look at the big issues in the world, bewildered that we seem to be powerless to do anything, we can yet pray, 'Lord, may there be peace on earth, and may it begin with me'. That is a prayer we can all pray.

And so, yes I will wear the Poppy, a visual symbol of the tragedy and folly of man that makes war such a present inevitability. I will sing the Hymn, adapted from St. Francis' lovely prayer 'make me a channel of your peace'. The emphasis is the peace of God beginning in and with each of us, challenging the petty prejudices that sow the seeds of division, the words said out of turn that result in misunderstanding or hurt, the email written in haste and anger without a pause before we press 'send' and the attitudes of the human heart, which unchecked can give rise to so much damage.

Looking after Our Churchyard

We have a beautiful churchyard at St Mary's. This has been cared for through the ages and we are those entrusted to look after it now.

The Church of England gives us rules for the care of churchyards. We need your help in looking after the churchyard in the way that we are charged. We all want it to be a place of beauty, peace and calm for our loved ones and for those of us who may also rest there one day.

The rules are designed to make the environment pleasant for all. We would love your help in implementing these.

- Headstones need permission and a written agreement.
- They should be made of natural stone and a non-reflecting or polished surface, preferably local stone, or hardwood.
- Portraits, images, lights, sounds, curbs, fencing, chains, and chippings are not permitted.
- Only cut flowers or wreaths may be left at the graveside (not trees or shrubs), and these need to be removed when withered or decaying.
- Plastic or artificial flowers are not permitted, (apart from silk flowers appropriate to the season, and these need to be removed when they become faded).
- Toys or other ornaments may be left at the graveside for 12 months, and then need to be removed.

So, whether you are tending the grave of a loved one, looking to erect a memorial or headstone, anticipating the churchyard as a resting place for a loved one or for yourself one day, or if you enjoy walks through the churchyard, please help us to look after it now and for the future.

Views from Views

Unlike the north of the country the weather of late has been uncommonly dry helping us enormously, I cannot believe it will continue for too much longer, bur while it does we will have to take as much advantage of it as we can. Apart from the land work, which I shall mention later we seem to have had time to get a lot of those little jobs that are always left until later "when we have time", by no means all will be done that's asking



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too much but it is nice to get some done. On a couple of walks lately around the farm it was good to see Hares, nearly stepping one once, by the beginning of October we still had Swallows and Swifts about, all gone now, and the Jackdaws I reported also seem to have disappeared, after only making an appearance for about a week.

Harvest 2016, as I have suggested before the crops we planted last autumn did not fare too well but the spring planted ones did produce some useful yields. Just the illustrate that nothing in our business is straight forward, because of this weed (Black Grass) mentioned many times before, we have decided to alter our cropping introducing a spring crop into our rotation, problem, as the spring crops harvest is later it means that it being followed by Oil Seed Rape (OSR) the planting of which is late. the problem is that it is longer before the crop is established, leaving it vulnerable to attack by pests that we are not now able to control. Then followed by the late cold spring the OSR only flowered for a short period which will have lowered the yield. The Winter Wheat (WW) suffered from the early wet and cold, I was always told beware March Yellows in other words WW looking pale or yellow in March not a good sign, this is caused by cold and wet. Whereas the spring Barley (SB) started the grow slowly putting down roots rather than top growth which did not get exposed to too much cold, and as it was not growing that fast was not in a position to take up much moisture that would cause it to suffer in the same way as WW. Then the comparative long dry period between May and now helped the ripening and quality aspect but of course by then the yield was set. (B)

Unlike our colleagues up north we had a harvest without hardly a weather stop, everything being safely gathered in without any fuss, or the need to dry any grain, it was very different in the north some only finishing in late September. Having got the harvest in in such good time has given us time to get the next crop planted in good conditions. I think the OSR could look better as alluded to above other people's crops being planted that little earlier than ours look better, just hope ours catches up. The WW has gone in the ground in exceptional conditions, the ground has worked well and has the right moisture in it, the only trouble with this is that the moisture is further down at the moment and unless we get some rain soon we might get a situation where the plants will Start to grow (chit) then not be able to grow enough to reach the moisture, in other words it would as we say malt or dry up then die, have known this happen before, could be quite a problem. The area that we have allocated for SB next year has been planted with stubble turnips to feed sheep through the winter, a system we adopted some 20 years ago, and although these were planted in good conditions we find that the same bugs that are affecting the OSR have eaten a fair proportion of them, otherwise they are looking good.

Slowly the financial situation following the Brexit vote is having it's effect on the Farming industry, much as I suspected some good and some not so good, on the plus side what we sell is increasing in value, on the minus side most of our costs will rise. In theory this should be a positive for us, as our aim as in any sensible industry to sell more than we buy. (Not always the case in Agriculture.) Another plus for us this year is that our annual subsidy payment will be increased almost more than ever before as it is calculated in Euros (at the moment), so with the £ about as low as it can be our payment will be more. Of course this is only a flash in the pan as we do not know if or how we will be supported in the future, and as most readers will be aware there is some debate as to whether Agriculture should be supported at all, all I can say is if it is not a lot of genuine Farmers will go out of business, unless the price of our produce increases some 25%, and that means food which will affect us all. Where the iniquity comes in this system is where city money buys land as an investment or for sport that land is still eligible for subsidy payments, not sure how this could be overcome. The effect of the lowering in the value of the pound will increase the value of our sales unfortunately this will to some extent be mitigated by the fact that the world Harvest is up this year by some 11m tonnes which will depress the world price.

STOP PRESS; Rain 16th Oct, my birthday – a good present, and saved the day for our WW, I hope looking better already.

Haseley Brook Action Group Update

Further to the comments in last months bulletin with regards to the proposed residential development sites for South Oxfordshire District Council, representatives from the local villages of Little and Great Haseley and Little and Great Milton have grouped together to form the Haseley Brook Action Group.

The hundreds of individual responses to SODC's consultation, alongside the Parish Council(s) and Haseley Brook Action Group responses, have sent a clear message that whilst we recognise the need for more housing, the current SODC proposals are flawed.

Our ongoing campaigning must focus on the better suited sites next to Oxford, close to infrastructure and jobs with public transport benefits compared to the flawed plans for Harrington or Chalgrove.

The important thing for us all to be aware of is that the campaign has not finished; it has only just begun. The Council will need to consult again and we expect that next year, likely late 2017, there will be a Public Inquiry.

The Haseley Brook Action Group has been established to help coordinate our work through this period. We are coordinating with other communities across the area and using expertise amongst local people on planning, legal issues and PR.

We should feel very positive about the way in which the villages have come together over the last month to challenge the Council's Development Plan, and following the HBAG challenge to the District Council process and County Council opposition to proposals, all proposed development sites have been asked to come and present to the Council. This demonstrates the impact our campaigning is having.

Great Haseley and District Horticultural Society

I'm writing this in late October (apologies to the editors) and looking out of the window into the autumn sunshine while doing the washing up I can still see lots of colour brightening decaying foliage. When planning your garden, it is important not to simply buy what is in flower when you visit the garden centre on a lovely spring day. If you do you will have a garden that is dull from midsummer. Our garden was a blank canvas when we moved in 24 years ago and I was

desperate to get started. The result was poorly prepared beds with large populations of perennial weeds and simply too many mismatched occupants.

Over the years quite a number of beds have been replanted, but still I put in too many plants. This is not too serious if these are perennials as they can be easily moved or split and given away, but if they are shrubs it can be a big mistake; shrubs are more expensive and many don't respond as well to being moved, not to mention the hard physical work of digging up large shrubs. In general, less is more and gaps can be filled with low growing annuals while you wait for plantings to fill out (I would not recommend larger annuals as when they grow and lean they can damage the growth of shrubby plants as I have learned to my cost). Fewer plants may mean your beds look 'mean' at first, but they will fill out given time and care and also cost less to plant. Quite a lot of what is in my garden has been purchased at the church fete as I never come home empty handed! I would encourage you to look at plants which are not in flower on that day as you will get good value; those of us who have been growing plants for the stall for many years know that it is very difficult to sell plants which are not in flower. I often wonder if most gardens in Great Milton peak on the second Saturday in June! Do purchase plants in flower right around the year to help your garden look fresh and floriferous (if, like me, flowers are what you want).

This summer I planted out a pot of a hardy Nerine called Isabel which I admit to having bought last autumn in flower and left by the greenhouse ever since (so it is definitely hardy as it did not succumb despite being in a plastic pot, a state which renders plants more vulnerable to cold). Isabel is now in full flower with very bright pink flowers and I have been prompted to buy two more pots; unfortunately, one of them is a pale pink which is not so much to my taste and will have to be planted somewhere else as I have lost the receipt and so cannot exchange it. This experience yet again illustrates the importance of buying plants in flower so you know what you are getting. These bulbs need to be planted in a sunny spot, preferably against a warm wall so their bulbs are baked in the summer sun. I can assure you, from bitter experience, they do disappear if you allow them to be covered.

Other plants in flower now are hardy Fuchsias which I love, but which do take a while to get going in the spring, although I think they are worth the wait with their beautiful flowers and arching growth. Propagation from cuttings is easy so they are easy to share. I also have quite a collection of tender Fuchsias which need protection over the winter, but give us so much late season pleasure. Roses are still blooming and pots of Rudbeckia and Zinnia are still performing well; I especially like Rudbeckia 'Prairie Sun' with its beautiful yellow flowers with green centres and seems to flower rather later than other annual Rudbeckias. The first flowers are opening on my Coronilla glauca 'Citrina'; these will continue throughout the winter giving off a lovely fragrance on mild sunny days, helping brighten the winter months.

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
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
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
