#### Draft Parish Notes - September 2021

Meeting of Great Milton Parish Council, held at the Pavilion on Monday 20th September 2021 at 7.30pm. The meeting was attended by Cllrs Steve Harrod (Chair), P Allen, G Bennet, C Deacon, M Horsley and D Harms. Apologies were received in advance from Cllr W Fox. Tim Darch (Clerk) was in attendance, along with Cllr Caroline Newton (SODC) and two members of the public.

No declarations of interest were received in matters on the agenda.

#### Matters to Report

Reports were received from Cllr Freddie van Mierlo (County Councillor, Chalgrove division) and Cllr Caroline Newton (District Councillor, Haseley Brook Ward). These are available on the parish council website.

#### **Public discussion**

A complaint has been received from a resident of Fullers Field about repeated dog fouling on their property. Dog owners are reminded to keep their pets away from private property, and to use a bag to clear up any mess that they generate, wherever this happens.

A resident has requested that the road markings at the junction of A329 and Thame Road should be reviewed by the County Council with a view to the consideration of double white lines (or a suitable alternative which prevents overtaking but allows turning right to and from Thame Road), backed up by 'no overtaking' signage. This is after several near misses while turning into and out of Thame Road at this location, with vehicles either approaching unexpectedly from the left on the A329 or overtaking when about to turn right into Thame Road from the A329. The correspondent reported the example of double white lines in the centre of the road (for example on the A418 at Tiddington) adjacent to a right turn, with a small passing place provided on the left for people to pass. It was agreed that double white lines present a far clearer visual deterrent to overtaking than the current markings: this is not helped by the sign marking the turn lying in the verge for several months since it was demolished. The Clerk will arrange a site visit with OCC's local highways representative to discuss the matter, put forward proposals and receive suggestions.

Steve Partington from Shield Solutions in Milton Common briefly attended to introduce himself and give a short presentation with a view to a potential multi-village dog waste collection arrangement. The Shield Group is a long-established family business focusing on local work and with a belief in community support, and who are already collecting dog waste for a number of nearby villages with further similar arrangements forthcoming. Although the waste is currently dealt with as standard

commercial waste, in the long-term the aim is to dispose of it using green methods. After brief discussion and agreement that Shield Group represent an opportunity for long-term stability after a period of considerable disruption to Great Milton's dog waste collection arrangements, councillors unanimously agreed that Shield Group should be approached to provide an initial three-month trial with a view to a two-year agreement should this prove successful.

#### **Planning Applications**

The following planning applications received from SODC were considered:

P21/S3530/HH (Maranta Thame Road Great Milton). Hip to gable extension. Rear dormer & single storey rear extension. Cllr Fox submitted his review of this application in his absence. Cllr Fox visited the property and consulted nearby residents, one of whom was supportive while another felt that the proposed rear extension would obscure light to their property and create a feeling of being 'hemmed in'. Cllr Fox recommended support of the application, but with the proviso that the rear extension should be reduced in depth by 1 metre. Councillors agreed with this suggestion and to SUPPORT the application subject to this condition.

P21/S3680/HH and P21/S3681/LB (Milton Lodge Lower End Great Milton).

To raise the boundary walls and piers on the east and southern side of the property, to the same height as the existing piers and wall on the eastern boundary and install wooden gates.

Cllr Horsley reviewed this application. Following local consultation, one comment was received remarking on the potential visual and physical impact of the taller walls, in the context of the application site falling within in a conservation area. Councillors felt that any impact on the conservation area would be flagged up by the conservation officer, and as a result agreed to respond to the application reiterating this opinion but to flag up no additional concerns.

The following planning decisions received were considered alongside outstanding planning matters:

P21/S2278/HH (The Glass Onion Lower End Great Milton). Erection of Car Port with Solar PV Roof. Planning permission is GRANTED for the development described above.

P21/S2397/HH (Yew Cottage Lower End Great Milton Oxford). New first floor extension to replace current box dormer + two storey in fill extension. Replace all windows and doors.

Planning permission is GRANTED for the development described above.

P21/S2838/LB, P21/S2858/HH and P21/S2859/LB (Honeysuckle Cottage Lower End Great Milton). Replace existing paving with new paving, repaint

all existing windows, side and rear doors and repaint external walls of a Grade II listed building. Demolition of existing conservatory and replacing it with orangery, widening of existing doorway to original size and lowering of cill to create new doorway to a Grade II listed building. Planning permission is GRANTED for the developments described above.

#### Le Manoir Aux Quat' Saisons: planning application update

A consultation is open on an amended scheme for the proposed redevelopment of Le Manoir Aux Quat' Saisons. Discussions are ongoing with Belmond Group regarding methods of engagement with the community. Residents are encouraged to respond individually via the SODC website: however, you will also be able to have your say in person at the next meeting of Great Milton Parish Council, which will take place at the Neighbours' Hall instead of the Pavilion on Monday 18th October starting at 7.30pm.

The deadline for responses is Friday 22 October: please note that if you have received a consultation letter from SODC with a quoted deadline of 4 October, the extension to 22 October is also valid.

Advice regarding further developments and any further meetings or other events that are arranged will be communicated as soon as possible via the usual local channels.

The latest bank reconciliations, accounts and bank statements were received, reviewed, signed and approved. The bank balance as at 2 September was £43,075.15.

#### Parish Clerk and Councillors' update of matters in hand

• The trip hazard from tree roots raising tarmac on the path from The Green to Fullers Field has been dealt with.

- The brambles on Fullers Field which were encroaching into the road have been trimmed by SOHA: however, they could have been more aggressive with their approach. It is hoped that SOHA will return and further reduce their mass.
- The hedges and foliage adjacent to the path on the Fullers Field side of the Rec have been cut back.
- Blocked gullies close to the school have been partially dealt with but there are significant obstructions caused by tree roots. It is hoped that Oxfordshire County Council will return soon to clear the blockages.

#### COVID-19: update on village response/impacts

No significant local developments were raised with regard to the current pandemic.

#### Milton Common speed mitigation scheme

The installation team are reportedly awaiting delivery of materials. Road markings were being painted as of Monday 20th September: gateways should be received relatively soon, but the steel poles for the signage may have a longer lead time.

#### Milton Common parking issues: London Road

A complaint has been received regarding inconsiderate parking outside the new houses on London Road, including pavement parking. This has been reported to the County Council (as the highway authority) and to Thames Valley Police (as the enforcement authority). A member of the local policing team reports that they will keep an eye on things and enforce when possible, on a proportionate basis initially with a view to a more long-term approach if persistent issues are observed. The officer also observed that although there may be vehicles parked on the road which may be an inconvenience, the parking is not necessarily illegal.

#### Queen's Platinum Jubilee celebrations, 2nd to 5th June 2022

Discussion regarding plans for the Queen's Platinum Jubilee celebrations in June 2022 was deferred until a later date to enable consideration alongside other community events scheduled for a similar time (e.g the Church Fete).

#### Consultations on 'Ox-Cam Arc' and the

#### SODC/VoWH Statement of Community Involvement

The current consultation exercises on the Ox-Cam Arc and JSIC were discussed.

The Ox-Cam Arc consultation seeks views from the public on their vision for the area, and their priorities for the Arc in the years ahead. This consultation marks the first of a three-stage process for the development of the Spatial Framework, as outlined by the Government. There will be two further consultations and other opportunities to liaise with central Government on the future of the Arc across the two-year project.

South Oxfordshire and Vale of White Horse district councils are preparing a joint Statement of Community Involvement (SCI), that sets out how they will

consult on planning applications and planning policy, including the joint Local Plan. Comments are invited from the public and from local councils.

On the basis that the Expressway plans have been cancelled, it is understood that the proposals for the Ox-Cam Arc are of significantly less concern to Great Milton, and as such councillors expressed no strong views on the Ox-Cam Arc consultation, nor the SCI exercise. However, residents are encouraged to express their own views via the consultation websites at https://placebuilder.io/futureofthearc and Statement of Community Involvement - South Oxfordshire District Council (southoxon.gov.uk).

#### Grass cutting

Discussion took place regarding the standard of grass cutting since the contract was re-awarded, in light of comments regarding cut length along with other issues such as plants being strimmed and allotment paths not being mowed. Following feedback sent to the contractor in August, those present were pleased to observe that standard of mowing seems much improved based on the latest visit on the day of the meeting.

The meeting concluded at 8.50pm.

The next meeting of Great Milton Parish Council will be held on Monday 18th October 2021 at the Neighbours' Hall, starting at 7.30pm.

#### The Rector's Pint

I was at the hospital a few weeks ago for my monthly check on the Achilles tendon. All was going well, but the standout moment came between my appointments with the Trauma team and the Physiotherapist, whilst I was taking in a moment of sun outside the hospital's main entrance. There was a man in a wheelchair nearby. He must have been about my age, and he was a double amputee, each leg having been removed just below the knee. It looked as if this had been a recent operation. He was on the phone, and I could not help overhearing what he was saying. He was obviously asked how he was, and this was his reply: "How am I? given the circumstances I would say nine out of ten." My goodness, the man had just had two legs amputated and he gave things a nine out of ten! I was humbled and impressed. I really wanted to know his story, but of course British reserve and a desire not to offend held me back. I wondered if this had been a lifesaving operation, and so for him, it had given a sense of perspective?

The discipline of thanksgiving, counting our blessings, is such an important one. We know from psychologists that those who do this are happier people. In Paul's letter to the Thessalonians in the New Testament, we are encouraged to 'give thanks in every circumstance' as a spiritual discipline, 'for this is God's will for you in Jesus Christ'. In

We last held this service two years ago and many said that it was helpful to them as they remembered loved ones. Please do come if you can. The service will be followed by tea and cake!

#### New Pattern of Services from Sunday 3rd October

There will be two services every Sunday, at 9.00am and 10.30am. The 9.00 will be a Holy Communion, and the 10.30 am service will be a service without communion, such as we are using now.

The review group believed that the fourth Sunday of each month should be a more whole-heartedly Benefice Sunday, with a Zoom service at 9.00am, a Benefice Communion service at 10.30am (which will rotate between the churches, as now), and a Benefice-wide 'family service gathering' which will also rotate. This will be at 4.00pm on Sunday afternoon and it will be short, about half an hour. We will of course follow this with tea-time refreshments!

Whilst there will be no 8.00am Book of Common Prayer (BCP) Holy Communion on a Sunday, there will be a monthly Wednesday BCP at 12.00 noon, taking place in the church that would not have had a service on the previous 'Benefice Sunday.' A nice idea is to encourage people to bring their own lunch as we continue to share time together following the service. I hope that all will be clear to you in the pattern set out below!

This new pattern will be reviewed in six months to see if any small changes need to be made, and then there will be a full assessment in a year, when it will be decided whether this pattern should continue.

Should anyone want more information and a more detailed explanation than the space here allows, I would be delighted to send it to you.

#### **Church Development Project Update**

You may remember that we put an information leaflet through the door of every house in the village just before the pandemic, outlining our plans for a Church

Development Project.

We need to restore and repair the medieval church tower stonework to make it safe. As well as this, the historically significant Dormer Monument will be conserved and returned to its original setting and, in its place, a much needed kitchen and WC will be installed. We're also planning to remove some pews immediately in front of the tower so that a flexible communal space will be created. We hope these changes will help make our church more comfortable for generations to come. Further details can be found on the village website.

With the recent pandemic lockdowns, we haven't been able to make quite as much progress as we'd hoped, but the small fundraising group has recently met again to get things underway once more. The village has raised £42k but we are still a long way off the £400k+ required. As grants are scarcer now, we have broken the work into three separate projects: 1) external tower repair, 2) monument conservation and move to a more suitable location in the church and 3) the kitchen and WC, so that we can focus our fundraising on specific aspects of the work to be done. You may have spotted that the thermometer board outside the church states a target of £200k but this is just the amount needed for the external tower repairs, and prices are rising all the time!.

We have now commissioned a laser scan of the church from which our architects can draw up detailed plans and specifications. We also hope to place grant applications shortly. The fundraising activities will continue.

If any of you have expertise in writing grant applications, can offer advice or would like to be involved in any other way, we would love to hear from you.

#### Ride & Stride - Cyclists Nearer to God

Ride & Stride is an annual one-day event organised by the Oxfordshire Historic Churches Trust (OHCT), whereby walkers and cyclists seek sponsorship to visit as many churches as possible, thus raising vital funds for their upkeep. Ever since its inception in 2004, the Gt Milton Cycling Association (GMCA) has supported this event, and 2021 was to be no exception.



Our cohort this year comprised the estimable figures of Tony and Jane Jefferis, Helga Dowie, Paul Wakefield, Clare B-P, Malcolm Horsley, and your correspondent, augmented (in more senses than one) by the venerable presence of one Allan Smith, a stalwart of GMCA's Denton chapter.

The first part of the ride took in churches in Gt Haseley, Chalgrove, Brightwell Baldwin (where the fashion designer and Mountbatten descendant, India Hicks had got married the day before), Cuxham and Watlington. The group then headed north to Pyrton, Shirburn, Lewknor, Aston Rowant, Sydenham and Towersey, before stopping to demolish their packed lunches in Thame's Memorial Gardens (see photo).

What a roller coaster this year has been for farming, this time last year we witnessed the worst flooding I can remember, followed by a late spring hot and dry April a cold and wet May, then June and July Summer suddenly appeared with some very hot days, until we were ready to harvest when we had several deluges. This



meant that what looked very promising crop of Barley had a very medico yield as we left so much on the ground. No sooner had we finish cutting the barley the weather turned good again so that we were able to plant our rape in good conditions then a day or so later we had a further downpour, which set it off well. We then had day after day a period of dull dry weather just when we wanted to cut the wheat with the crop just not dry enough for us to cut, getting a little desperate we decided we just had to get on and cut it, and surprise, surprise the day after we finished the sun came out and we had a very fine few days, making us think we should have been patient and waited a day. Our problem is that we have no way now of drying our crops, which is not nowadays reckoned to be a problem as the harvesting operation is so quick, unfortunately you get caught out occasionally. I should explain that that week or so of dull but dry weather nothing really dried in the field, when we did finally cut the wheat it had a 15% moisture content, this is not usually a problem for storage as it can be stored at 16%, we always use to use that as a benchmark, but now our buyers insist that it is 14% just to complicate things. Anyway "All is Safely Gathered In". But the year is not finished with us yet!

To return to the weather/year it seems as I have mentioned before it seems in spite of a cold late spring that a wet May seems to suit our farm, as once the weather warmed in June everything seemed to take off, and I thought looked really promising but of course that was not the case. Some of the effect of the late spring I think could account for shrivelled grains and with the rapid growth made the barley straw weaker meaning that the heavy rain at the end of July pushed it down to the ground so that the combine could not get under it and pick it up hence leaving a lot on the ground, probably as much as ½ a tonne to the acre and over 200 aces that is no laughing matter. It has though suited our experimental companion crop so much so that it did rather hamper the harvesting, looks good now it's cut and, I think the yield off that small area is was good as any plus we did not leave so much in the field.

What a terrible situation we have found ourselves in with reference to being let down by the Americans, over Afghanistan, mainly due to the decisions made by our old friend Mr Trump, it does though make one wonder why on earth are we falling over ourselves to make trade deals with the US, and allowing their conglomerates take over some of our prized companies. (Notably in the retail food sector shows whose making money out of food) Of course we must make every effort to save those around the world who are in trouble, and it is great to think we welcome these poor people with open arms, can't think why they want to come to UK, it takes all sorts. But when we think 20,000 souls from Afghanistan will represent 7,000 houses it just makes you think where are they going to live? This not to mention other extra pressure on our landscape, already we are polluting our rivers with sewage as the water companies cannot cope. Now we farmers are likely to be restricted even more, and unfortunately for good reason, as to how and when we can apply waste organic products on to our land. I have said many times before this country of ours just cannot cope with this sort population growth and something has to be done about it, as the EX revolution says, "now".

We do live in a time of great contradictions and are being pulled in all sorts of different directions, sometimes for no real scientific reasoning, by those who don't really understand the whole or practical picture, or act responsibly themselves. On the same news bulletin in early September, we saw pictures of the rubbish left after the Reading Festival and XR demonstrators closing the Aylesbury Milk factory, are not these the same sort of people. Do they not realise the carbon that is used to create tents and most of their litter, or that it takes some 158 litres of water to produce plant based milk, which many are advocating as part of the solution, as opposed to 8lt for cow's milk. Another anomaly a recent report by the IPCC states that methane is not the problem we all make it out to be. Somehow we have to get some realism into this discussion and quickly, as the clock is ticking faster by the day on Climate Change, and we are in danger of sleep walking into a big problem, this will only be achieved by rational well informed discussion. Will not the authorities listen to the balanced view rather than the emotional one?

#### **Internet Upgrade Opportunity**

Dear Villagers,

We have an opportunity to upgrade the quality of the internet in the village. Most of the village has Superfast internet capability which means that we have optical fibre connectivity to the grey cabinets dotted around the village. This is called Fibre To The Cabinet (FTTC). Unfortunately we all have the old wiring from the cabinet to our houses. The current internet speeds are probably ok for what we all use it for

now, however the need for more speed will come, and it will come more rapidly. More and more of us are going to spend more time working from home in the future, and the demands created by our devices will increase as we move to Ultra High Definition streaming, and immersive 3D video gaming.

The government is running a scheme where we can apply as a group to receive a voucher of £1500 per household towards the cost of having our households wired up for the future. This is called Fibre To The Property (FTTP). We do need to apply as a group. Our village qualifies for the vouchers as our speeds are typically considerably less than 100MBPS. The new speeds will be around 1000MBPS which, on average, is 20x faster than what most of us have now.

The more people we have signed up, the more likely that sum total of all the vouchers, are of covering the cost of installing fibre to our households. The two key benefits of this will be future-proofing your internet connection and saleability of your house.

Things to be considered are as follows:

- We have to apply as a village group
- We have to pledge the voucher to one supplier who will do the cabling
- After the cabling is installed we will have to sign up a contract for the internet from that supplier for a minimum of one year
- We will have to pay for a minimum of double the speed we have now (the more speed you want the more you have to pay). It will be more expensive than what you pay for the internet currently
- You may have to pay to exit your current contract if you are with a different supplier. If you are interested, please email me, Malcolm.horsley1@btinternet.com, with your address. If I can gauge enough interest, I will start the application process.

#### **Great Haseley and District Horticultural Society**

Last week we welcomed a few days of very warm sunny weather and this week we received some much needed rain. The rain had the welcome results that the water butts are full again and the plants all perked up and looked very happy!

I heard that the met office had announced a drier than usual summer when I was sure that the opposite was true here as, for the first time in the 29 years we have lived here, the lawn has remained green and lush. In all previous years the lawn becomes crisp and brown during early summer and doesn't really perk up until the autumn rains arrive. Mowing the lawn is something of a rarity in that situation and only occurs when the wild flowers in it become tall and brown or the clover gets too aggressive. I

have a number of plants of which I am fond enough to make carrying cans of water worth the effort; these plants include Phlox and my other half's tree fern. The latter plant requires regular watering and luckily it is surrounded by Helianthus Lemon Queen which is in full flower just now. When this plant looks a bit wilted, I throw a couple of cans of water over the tree fern and the Helianthus gets water too. This year the rain was enough for virtually all the summer for everything else.

Today has been another beautiful day after a foggy start. Now we are without any help whatsoever, I have begun the autumn clear up to get things tidy where areas of the garden have gone over. Fortunately, we still have enough colour to give interest in much of the garden, but I did appreciated the conditions today which allowed easy clearing to take place. There is something very satisfying about starting to put the garden to bed for the winter that I just don't get from doing house work!

I used to feel very sad in autumn at the thought of winter, but now I see autumn as the start of the gardening year. There are already signs of spring such as new buds and, on sedums, the swellings at the base of the plant which will become the shoots and flowers for next year. It is also time to plant bulbs with much anticipation. The best thing about this time of year are the Cyclamen hederifolium which are so pretty and petite and last for such a long time. In my ignorance, when I started gardening, I planted these mixed with Cyclamen coum which is a spring flowering bulb and equally pretty. Unfortunately, the flowers on coum are easily swamped by the leaves of hederifolium which persist through the winter into spring. Coum looks at its best carpeting ground under deciduous trees, particularly cherries, before they start to open. The dense canopy means little is able to grow there in high summer. On a sunny spring day they are breathtaking en-mass. Cyclamens seed very readily and only a few plants are required to produce a good effect in only a few years. I would advise buying the bulbs as growing flowering plants as, like snowdrops they are not very happy being dried out before planting; another advantage is seeing what colour your bulbs are.
