Whatever the outcome, life will go on and we will have to cope with local matters regardless. One of the issues facing us is the change to our bus services which will come about on 21



July. The good news is that the 103 bus will continue to serve our community, albeit on a reduced schedule and Heyfordian deserve thanks for retaining this. There will however be gaps in the service outside of peak hours and there are a number of options for us to try and plug these. A possible promising initiative is being tested by County Council in a pilot scheme to utilise the council's fleet of mini-buses used for school and old folks transport. This fleet is idle for much of the day and may be made available to county residents on an ad-hoc or even scheduled basis to make up for some lost services following the subsidy cuts in July. We will be watching this trial with interest as, in my opinion, this could well be a viable alternative. Failing this, other options will be looked into in due course.

Thanks to everyone for their support of the village fete which was a great success. The Pimms tent was inundated and eventually ran dry thanks to the thirsty mob!

Whatever happens with the referendum, don't let apathy rule!

Planning Applications

It was RESOLVED to hold a separate planning meeting to review the following applications received from SODC:

P16/S1848/FUL – Heath Farm, Thame Rd, Great Milton OX44 7JD Demolition of tin workshop and erection of barn for hay storage



P16/S1816/FUL – Heath Farm, Thame Rd, Great Milton OX44 7JD Proposed new grain store and demolition of redundant building There were no planning decisions to review.

Correspondence and Public Discussion

Mr Hale (Internal Auditor) presented the Internal Audit Report for the year-ending 31 March 2016 to the council.

Great Milton Parish Council Asset Register Review

It was RESOLVED to approve the asset register.

Parish Clerk and Cllr's update of matters in hand (Action update) Great Milton Website – Transparency Grants for Councils

Update regarding whether GMPC would be eligible to apply for a grant. One of the criteria was if GMPC had limited access or control to post its own information. Carina (website developer) was invited to the meeting and confirmed that the website could upload any document the council so wishes and is not restricted to certain document sizes. Carina also confirmed that the electronic version of the bulletin has now been uploaded to the website. Therefore GMPC are not eligible to apply for a transparency grant.

Great Milton Grass Cutting Contractor

The council were informed of Countrywide Grounds Maintenance decision to give a months' notice to terminate their contract. The councils' view was to ask a contractor to carry out the work on an ad-hoc basis through the rest of this year and put the two year contract out for tender in December 2016/January 2017.

Community Emergency Plan

It was proposed whether Great Milton would like to consider producing a Community Emergency Plan to help prepare for any emergencies that could affect the community. It was RESOLVED not to produce a plan.

Ramblings from the Rectory

That was quite a marathon! Three village events organised by and on behalf of the three village churches. As the only person that has to go to all three (very willingly, I love events like these) I thought that I would therefore reflect on them, at least during my first year here. The Great Haseley Spring Fair came first in May and this year it was a bit of a risky departure, being held as it was in the Village Hall. The risk paid off, it was a lovely occasion with a great village atmosphere. It coincided with an opening of the Windmill, it was wonderful to see people streaming up from the Village to visit it, many, or most of whom also visited the Spring Fair.

The Great Milton Church Fete also turned out to be extraordinarily good, a real traditional village fete. The skies brooded but the rains held off and there was a wonderful English summer carnival spirit. The Watlington Concert Band were brilliant, our dog Dylan won third prize in the agility class at the dog show, and should have won first prize as the loudest and most persistent barker! Little Milton proved to be as good, but different, in the beautiful setting of the Old Vicarage Garden, a real village garden party, it drizzled a bit during the morning setting up, but the weather was kind in the afternoon, and the Watlington Concert band showed up again. Thank You so much George and Joyce Inge for hosting us and for all the work to make the garden look so beautiful. Can I say a big thank you to all who worked so hard to plan and organise these events and the extended network of volunteers who did so much to make them the success they were. Can I also say a big thank you to the all who came and spent your money, which raised vital funds for all three Churches!

What though is the Church about? For me it is very simple, it is primarily about the declaration, and demonstration of the Good News, which of course is what gospel means, of Jesus Christ. It is about the proposition that in our bewildering confused and often very scary world there is a purpose to the universe and that we matter, each one of us. In the life, death and resurrection of Jesus we see a demonstration of the whole involvement of God in our world, right into the very heart of evil, suffering and death, and we see a declaration of overwhelming hope in the resurrection. The Church is a community coming together based on these propositions, and living our lives in the light of them. But the Church is not a closed institution, Jesus called his followers to be salt and light in the world, adding flavour, bringing illumination and guidance in the world. It is about bringing people together to celebrate, and sending them out to serve, 'Go in peace to love and serve the Lord, in the name of Christ, Amen,' we say after our regular gatherings for Holy Communion.

Yes the Churches benefit financially from the giving of all who come to these village

events, but I think they are about so much more. Firstly they are about building good communities, bringing people together. Secondly they are about service, the organisers work extremely hard to plan events which really do enhance the sense of belonging for all who come. Thirdly it is about connection. I wish that more people would 'get it' and see regular worship in their local church as a part of their lives, of course I do. But I have met many people here who, while they might see themselves as being more distant from what lies at the heart of the Church nonetheless want the churches to thrive and are prepared to help and give to make this so. The heart of the matter though came to me following the Great Milton fete. We were invited to a post - fete social. My brother in law is called Chris and he was staying with us. I somehow haven't organised turning off predictive text on my emails and so I sent the response to the invite 'we'd love to come, can we please bring Christ?'

Yes indeed, who better to come along to the party? At the heart of all we do as the Church, whether it is coming to the heart of all things in our worship, demonstrating the truth of the message in our lives or simply enjoying the experience of the Church fete, if all is done in his name, Christ is there.

Advance notice: It will take some planning, so more details to follow next month, but I am delighted that The Christian writer, poet, thinker and humourist Adrian Plass will be coming with his wife Bridget and some members of Searchlight theatre company to St Mary's in Great Milton on Thursday 22 September. View From Views

I think now we can justifiably say summer has arrived what with warmer weather and heavy showers being the order of the day. What an extraordinary year this has been I measured more rain in the first half of May than the whole of April, (116 in May & 56 in April) then it suddenly warmed up, and my how things have grown since, I can't remember seeing so much growth before, especially grass which is smothering everything else. This early



May wet period delayed the planting of all our conservation plots but when things did dry out and the land got to the stage of being ready to plant, everything came right and some seeds after planting were showing green in a matter of days, (usually 2 weeks on average) now looking really quite promising, I guess a flush of weeds will change all this optimism in a week or so. The conservation plots we planted last year, inspite of my being worried that we had got it wrong do look reasonable with a good show of the variety of plants that we wanted, probably not as good as they could have been, and certainly a lot grew than we planted which will add to the diversity.

Now is the time of year when we start to notice all the ills of the season, this is when all the unwanted weeds start to show in the crops, especially what we call Blackgrass, this is evident by the tinges of brown that are showing in a lot of Winter sown Wheat. Blackgrass is a weed that has become resistant to most of our control measures, leaving us with possibly no alternative but to go back to some of the old fashioned less viable methods, such as rotations that we have had to move away from due to the financial pressures we all face. Other than this most crops in this area are looking quite promising, travelling around the country this does not appear to be the same in all areas.

I think this is a wonderful time of year with that the countryside is looking at it's best, having been in Devon for a few days and seeing the roadsides with their variety of wildflowers, makes us realise the beauty that nature can provide on it's own. As an illustration of the way our industry is pushed and pull in one direction or another and expected to respond, and publically criticised if we do not, there has been reports in the media criticising the species we are encouraged to plant in these conservation areas as not being indigenous to the area, and therefore not natural, we can't win! What we did notice whilst in the West Country was how much more attention the Councils are paying to road safety, by keeping the corners cut so as to improve the vision, also the road signs trimmed out so they can actually be seen, rather than leaving them, not to mention the state of the road surface, one would presume to save money. (not that I am in favour of wholesale verge cutting but surely we should take notice of road safety)

By the time this is read we will know if we are in or out, for whatever reason, having been told that we can manage without others, as we are supposed to be one of the 5th richest countries in the world. If this is the case why cannot we keep our roads in good shape, afford to educate our children properly, or give our Health Service the support it needs, leave alone our rural bus services which are vital to many country folk who don't have access to their own transport, I could go on forever on that subject but we have got something wrong somewhere, we really need to pull our socks up and start caring for other things rather than just looking at the financial aspects of life. (Perhaps we should be demanding those on fat salaries take less, or how about asking us if we would rather have a local bus or a free bus pass).

It is now common knowledge that "Amazon" are moving into the food market, this is because it is perceived that it is the most lucrative market to be in. All I can say is it maybe for the retail end of the market, and it will bring price benefits to the consumer, but not to the prime producer who is struggling to make a living. It is likely to create even more pressure for the farming industry to find even cheaper ways of producing the food we eat, not necessarily a good thing for food quality. The other spin off will be even more decimation of the High Street with many more small retailers going out of business, and worst of all many more white vans clogging up out roads, leave alone the pollution this will cause. Add to this that most of these vehicles will be Diesel fuelled, which we are told is the worst fuel for particulate pollution that we now realise creates the worst problem, and any measure that HM Government will take to cure this will be by increasing the cost of fuel, which will in turn increase the delivery costs.

I feel I must just correct a point I made in the past about Broad Band, at some stage I thought I had read that the Government said that they could not afford to roll it out in the country areas, I think I must have been misinformed somewhere along the line as this does not now seem to be the case.

It is devastating to read about Tata Steel and BHS and all those poor souls likely to be out of work I am glad to see that the Government are prepared to help out where they can. This is the same sort of situation where sometimes in the past they have stepped in to help Agriculture. I hope this will dispel the thought that we are the only industry that gets or seeks the help of the taxpayer.

I am constantly reading in the farming press cases of dogs worrying livestock, with some owners it is not my dog he/she is well behaved if off the lead. All I can say to that is maybe, they do a lot of damage to wildlife without any knowledge to the owner/handler, in that they will disturb any ground nesting birds, of which many are at risk, this can be just by a dog sniffing around, it is a real problem as more and more of us are taking to walking in the countryside.

Great Haseley And District Horticultural Society

Last night my other half and I set off in pouring rain to visit Greenfield Farm at Christmas Common where Andrew Ingram was opening his extensive wild flower meadows to the public which he does once a year. I had visited before with our society one wet evening several years ago and so simply checked the date and time on the NGS website. I failed to click the button marked 'more' which would have told me that it was a guided tour starting at 6pm so we were late and only joined the group at about 6.30pm. There were only five visitors including us which I imagine was a result of the weather, but in fact we did not get wet at all!

From my last visit I remember there are about 100 acres of meadow altogether and the project started in 1996 when 10 acres were prepared by removing top soil completely to reduce fertility and by controlling perennial weeds. A custom mix prepared for the chalky area was sown and the result now after 20 years is nothing short of spectacular with a complete carpet of around 100 different species of wild flowers; there is only a very little grass nearly all of which is quaking grass (Briza media). I was amused to discover that the major Christmas tree part of the farm enables Andrew to fund his wild flower habit! It was a thoroughly enjoyable evening and my other half had the rare opportunity to drive off-road which made him very happy! I will be there again next year without doubt; the very sight of the first 10 acres is most definitely food for the soul. Thank you very much, Andrew, for sharing your enthusiasm and passion with us.

I now, of course, have meadow envy! Our meadow (previously written about in this column) which we have worked so hard at for so many years is a very poor copy indeed. We have had a number of obstacles the most significant being the very fertile soil some of which is very deep alluvial loam and really not suited to growing wild flowers; this area also floods in winter. Crucially, we did not strip off the top soil before we started which would have greatly reduced the fertility thus weakening the grasses and allowing the flowers to proliferate; achieving this seemed insurmountable to a pair of amateurs. Initially the ground was about 50% covered in thistles and nettles which we have almost eradicated using some glyphosate, mowing and simply pulling out the thistles just prior to flowering (plenty of nettles remain around the edges for butterflies). During the winter the meadow is grazed by alpacas keeping the grass down, firming the flower seed into the ground and allowing us to identify patches of nettles, docks and thistles for removal after their departure (alpacas are also very appealing animals!). Sadly, the grass remains very strong and the recent very heavy rain has knocked a lot of it flat so it looks rather scruffier than usual. Even a meadow on

Andrew's farm which has had no preparation and has simply been left uncut is many times more floriferous than our meadow, this being a reflection of the underlying soil; however, ours is a labour of love and each year we are seeing improvement. Parasitic yellow rattle has got a grip now (it should have done with the quantity we have sown) and is weakening the very strong course grass so the flower count increases. We now have around 30 different varieties of flower although mostly in only small colonies, but many of these we have not sown so either the seed was already in the soil or it has blown in. Every year we are hopeful that we will see orchids, but they have not arrived yet, but, we learned last night, they should do eventually and this cannot be hurried. We also learned that mowing the stronger patches of grass in the spring will help to give the flowers a head start. In the meantime, we will continue to work at it and enjoy it immensely.






