
### In My Opinion...

Also present were Helen Cherry (Clerk) and one member of the public. Apologies were received from Bill Fox, Rosalind Deacon and Gwen Harris.

The next meeting will be held on Monday 21st March at 7.30pm in the Pavilion.

### **Planning Applications**

There were no planning applications to consider.

### Correspondence and Public Discussion

Councillors welcomed Jan-Paul Kroese to the meeting. Jan-Paul Kroese was appointed General Manager at Belmond Le Manoir aux Quat'Saisons in December 2015.

Her Majesty the Queen's 90th Birthday is the weekend of 11th and 12th

June 2016. As the Church Fete is scheduled the same weekend it was suggested to combine some sort of celebration then. Cllr Peter Allen agreed to talk to the Fete Committee about this.

The concrete around the BT Green Cabinet by the green has now been fixed and the grass area around the cabinet re-seeded.

Councillor Peter Farrell attended a transport meeting at Wheatley Merry Bells to discuss the subsidised bus service 103/104. A spokesperson from Heyfordian attended as did over 100 members of the public and neighbouring Parish Councillors.

Complaints were received about Sykes Van Sales at Milton Common parking vans on the grass verge and obstructing the view at the road junction. Councillor Peter Allen notified Sykes Van Sales of complaints the council have received and asked them to move the vans accordingly so not to obstruct the view for motorists.

The Council was notified that Jenks are to carry-out relevant tree work, on 7th March. They are due to arrive around 8:00/8:30am to carry out work along the High Street and in the recreation ground.

A meeting was held on 8th February at The Merry Bells in Wheatley between Hayfordian and representatives of eight Parish Councils as well as the public.

Without the subsidies the cost to Hayfordian is £450K per year on existing routes. They are proposing to run a reduced service, without subsidies, as per the timetable shown on the following page. However there will be some changes to ensure the first bus reaches Oxford ten minutes earlier.

Fares will increase between 10 and 20 percent and will start in early June.

A review meeting will be held on Monday 11th July at 6:30 pm at The Merry Bells.

It is up to councils and users to help stimulate awareness of the services to drive up usage, otherwise the service may be lost.

### From the Rectory March 2016

'But he (Thomas) said to them, "Unless I see the nail marks in his hands and put my finger in where the nails marks in his hands and put my finger where the nails were, and put my hand into his side, I will not believe it". (John 21:25)

I thank God for Thomas and his doubts. Please don't be fooled by the little white ring of theological confidence that vicars wear around their throats, we are human too and we have our doubts just like anyone else. I spend a good deal of my time preparing sermons, and then preaching them, but there are times when I ask myself the fundamental question, can this really be true? I vividly remember when training for the ministry being taken by the Vicar I was shadowing to visit an old lady just before she died. She was given the last rights and Holy Communion, which she just managed to receive. The next day she died. On the following day I was taken to see her body. I had never seen a dead body before and the experience pulled me up short. My training vicar knew that I would be preaching about resurrection, but also knew that to do so I had to face the reality of death. This was also the day after I had been present at the birth of our first daughter Eleanor, I had witnessed the birth of a new life and now I was experiencing the static, cold lifeless reality of death, and it worried me deeply. I asked myself a fundamental question could what I believed in about resurrection and eternity simply be a hollow hope?

So I thank God for Thomas, he too knew that feeling. He and the other disciples had to deal with the death of their Lord, and it had been the most horrible of deaths. And then came all those reports of Jesus being seen alive three days after he was taken down, broken and lifeless from the place of his execution. It was not surprising that Thomas thought this was all nonsense. But then Thomas experienced the risen Jesus for himself. I thank God for Jesus' response, he did not condemn Thomas, but he did challenge the root of his doubt and Thomas was transformed from a hard headed skeptic to a true worshipper.

Easter is a time when we are challenged again to look at our own beliefs about death and resurrection and ask ourselves the question 'can it really be true?' The reality of death is beyond doubt. But there is other evidence that death is not the end. A man who died upon a Cross, but who was seen very much alive days later, a man who confronted the worst fears and doubts of those who had deserted him at the end and transformed their doubts into faith. I do not fully understand it, but when I find myself doubting, it is the evidence for the Resurrection of Jesus brings me back. 'Alleluia Christ is risen, he is risen indeed Alleluia'. Please look at the Benefice calendar for details of our Good Friday and Easter Services.

Apologies about the misprint in the last village bulletins and newsletters (no fault of the Editors). The Special Mothering Sunday Family Service will be held at St Peter's Great Haseley on 6th March at 10.00am, not at St Mary's as was published in the February editions.

### Good Friday Walk.

There will be a service at Great Haseley at 11.00am on Good Friday. In the afternoon I am arranging a 'pilrimage' walk around the Benefice, beginning at 2.30am outside the Plough at Great Haseley with a brief reading and a prayer. The route will then go across the fields, through the Wells Farm nature reserve to the triangle at the top of Haseley road in Little Milton, where there will be a second brief reading and a prayer. The walk will then move back across the fields to Great Milton, with a stop on the Green for a third reading and prayer. The walk will then pass the Windmill with its great views and end back at the plough at Great Haseley which should then be open for refreshments! The walk is of course open to all, including those with dogs, we will be taking Dylan! This might appeal to those who want to mark Good Friday in some way but for whom a more formal service in church is not their thing, or for those who simply want to have a good walk!

Although Jean, my dear wife, died on April 18th 2015 and her friends will have many, sometimes unique, memories of her there is one of which I am probably the only custodian. Over the years Jean developed a special interest in individual trees all of which held special memories for her, usually connected with the family. I feel the need to record some of these of which I became a witness and feel that family and friends would like to know more about them.

### Tree Number 1 – The Silver Birch


First and foremost amongst Jean's trees was her favourite silver birch which she could see from her chair in the window. As you can see from the photograph it is a handsome tree. It was pulled up by me as a six-inch seedling from the pavement in front of the house in which our daughter Jennifer and her family lived in Brussels about 19 years ago. When planted in Great Milton it suddenly decided just to grow and never stopped and as with all her tree friends a relationship seemed to develop which was rather unique. Many, many, times I have seen her look out of the window and give the tree a very special enigmatic smile which



always reminded me of the portrait of the Mona Lisa. Even when the dreaded dementia was overtaking her I realised there was still some happiness in her life provided by The Silver Birch.

## Tree Number 2 Peter's Horse Chestnut

Peter grew this from a conker; it started in a jam jar, then in a plastic pot and was finally planted by the stream on the then boundary of our property but in view of the house. It loved its' position and grew very fast and in no time Jean was noticing that it carried a few blooms. Every year she waited for the blooms to appear until



about 20 years ago it was a well grown tree and absolutely covered in blooms every spring. Jean then suggested we lopped off the bottom branches so that the cows could lie under it in hot weather. ### **View From Views**

Another month gone already, to start with I must explain to Great Miltonians why I did not appear in last month's bulletin, not having heard anything to the contrary, after reading our Chairman's comments in the January issue of the Great Milton Bulletin. I assumed there was not to be a Bulletin in February, only to find later, when the editorial date had past, that was not the case, at least you did not have



to read my twaddle. I would also apologise to Readers from all three parishes that read these notes, for mentioning Rural Buses. I have to admit to not having done much about the impending cuts to Rural Services as I was lead to believe from local information that our buses would not be affected, who ever gave this hugely incorrect information needs taking to task. I make these comments as I recently attended a meeting organised by the Wheatley PC (I think) only to find out that not only was our bus being cancelled but that we were to suffer a savage cut in the number of busses per day. Of course I understand a service has to be viable but it would be good to know just what is going on, in cases like this it is vital that there is good lines of communication within the villages. The other problem is that in many cases the people who get the information and have to make decisions on it, like me, do not have to rely on public transport and would not have a clue as to how difficult it might be for some to just go to the Drs. We were told at the meeting that Heyfordian needs £45,000 per year to make our buses pay their way. I guess now it is down to us to find ways to make it do so, I have always had the idea that it could be better to use the Park & Ride terminuses as local Hubs with a series of smaller buses doing more runs from a smaller area direct to the Park & Rides having more city bus routes terminating etc to & from there. Perhaps there is a place to use these buses (Minibuses) to deliver parcels and groceries to lessen the number of courier vans on our narrow country lanes, whose condition is getting diabolical through over use by ever bigger vehicles. This all needs a (3)

lot of thought but I reckon it is up to us to take the initiative to come up with some worthwhile ideas and encourage our Parish Councils to give it some thought, and involve the public more by keeping us more informed.

Sorry about the above I just thought that perhaps we all needed to have a jolt. Right now! down on the Farm our Oil Seed Rape is suffering badly from pigeon damage, one piece being so poor that you never see a bird on it as I think they all swoop first thing in the morning have a 5 minute feed being what grew the previous day then on to more luscious feeding grounds next door. I am not sure what to say about the weather it has been a bit blowy has it not, this winter seems to have been one storm or another caused by the jet stream if you listen to some, or an el-nino (not sure of the correct spelling) effect in the Pacific from others, which ever it is, is not very pleasant. We have been very lucky in our area, having said that the ground is extremely wet. One of our springs that used to supply the farm with it's water was not running when I last looked at it at the end of January, a fact I find very strange, especially as the drain that runs from that area is running practically full bore.

As part of our environmental scheme, we are now feeding small farmland birds on a regular basis, 3 days a week, and have certainly noticed an increase in bird activity in that area. What I cannot tell for reasons of eyesight and knowledge what species we are encouraging, what we don't know is how this sort of support will be affected by "Brexit", as indeed we do not know how it will affect us all in Agriculture, I heard only very recently that a journalist from the "Independent" (I think) said that he thought the EU environment schemes had done a lot of good, and that if we come out we are in danger of losing this great step forward. Now I am not in any position to clarify this as I and we the farming community just do not know.

We are all aware that daffodils have been in bloom since November, and at the time wondered what would become of them, I think at the time or soon after, I thought that perhaps they would flower right the way through until their normal time of flowering well now it looks rather as if they might. Most extraordinary seeing as how the Snow Drops are about on time, inspite of the fact most other flowers are out of cinque now, I believe they will all compensate in their own way as well.

It can't have escaped anyone that fact that the dairy industry is on it's knees, at least this is the case for those unfortunate not to have a contract to supply one of the big supermarkets. To make things worse Tesco have now decided only to draw their milk from Muller-Wiseman currently they draw from Arla as well, this means that those supplying other processors without a contract will be more at risk as there will be an even smaller market for them to supply. Net result mitigating against the smaller Farmer in favour of the bigger, so as in everything else the big get bigger and the small

go to the wall, should we care? I have just heard that pork is now under pressure being imported from China, upsetting our market and driving down the prices, when only a few years ago we were heralding the first Jumbo Jets loads of breading pigs being sent out to this expanding market, expanding alright. At the moment, as most will know all Agricultural products are suffering from low end price, largely due to the world market being over supplied, yet there is a famine in Ethiopia, doesn't make sense really.

### **Great Haseley and District Horticultural Society**

The days are getting noticeably longer and when the sun shines there is warmth in it. Even the most reluctant of gardeners start to venture out into the garden on warm, sunny spring days. It is encouraging to see new growth at the bases of perennials and, if you have not yet done so, do complete your cutting back so that you don't damage the emerging shoots.

It is a relief to me, with my gardener hat on, to have had some frosts at last to help reduce overwintering pests, but I really do not enjoy defrosting the car. We seem to have had so much variety in the weather over the last couple of weeks with sun, frost, heavy rain and very strong winds. Our vegetable patch is under water (it is separated by fencing and hedging from the water meadow) so no work has been done there for a few weeks now. Despite this the ground there is never ending alluvial loam and is lovely to grow things in. Our garden, on the other hand, is the opposite being free draining and very sandy even though we have added a lot of organic matter over the years; you cannot change the soil you have, but you can improve its structure by adding organic matter or, on heavy clay, adding gravel will help with drainage. Plants here have a tough start and require much water in their first year. Things have improved markedly since we made the decision to always plant with our own homemade compost which has good moisture-holding properties. Plants seem to establish more quickly and require less water. I have also stopped introducing plants which require the damp conditions I cannot provide.

I have a confession to make. After all these years of being the sole gardener, assisted by my husband when he had time, I have been fortunate enough to acquire the occasional help (about once a month) of a gardener who is highly knowledgeable and works much, much faster than I do. This has resulted in things being much more in control than is usually the case and I am delighted with the result. It was a blow to my pride to share control even a little, but I am so relieved to have done so. I now

have more time for other things. Thank you, Tamsin!

It is time to complete rose pruning and to prune most Clematis as I have noted that mine are growing rapidly. The current cold snap will slow things down and sadly damage early blossom, but some things will give pleasure for longer such as the snowdrops we are currently enjoying. The scent of winter box has been a delight over the last few weeks especially on mild days. I needed to prune a Chaenomeles (flowering quince) and I brought the completely dead-looking stems into the house and put them in water. Now, some two weeks later the flowers are beginning to open; I so nearly missed out when I almost threw them away after 10 days!

### **John Howell MP**

Last month my newsletter explained more of the role of an MP particularly in relation to the work in Westminster and the Constituency. I mentioned that MPs divide their time between working in Parliament or representing parliament elsewhere and working in their constituency. This month I will expand a little on the part of the role that involves representing parliament elsewhere.

In many cases it is the Government that attends key international meetings. In addition to this there are times when other MPs represent the Government and also many different ways in which British MPs across the political parties represent our views. The underlying purpose for all of this work is to ensure that British interests are represented and that we play our part in global issues.

The negotiations with the EU and representation at the Paris Climate Change Conference are two recent examples of the Prime Minister working abroad. Last autumn the Chancellor spent time in China seeking to strengthen UK-China relations which was a concerted effort to strengthen ties with the one of the world's largest economies. Beyond these very public meetings many MPs are also engaged in international affairs.

For my part I am part of the UK delegation to the Parliamentary Assembly of the Council of Europe (PACE). This delegation is made up of representatives of different political parties. It debates current social problems and aspects of international politics and makes recommendations to governments for action. One of its key roles is to appoint judges to the International Court of Human Rights. PACE meets for a week four times a year in Strasbourg.

Another example of international work is that of Trade Envoys. These are a network of MPs appointed by the Prime Minster from across the political spectrum. Trade Envoys engage with emerging markets where UK Trade and Investment (UKTI) has identified substantial opportunities to promote British trade and investment. The work supports the drive for economic growth by building relations with these markets and generating long term benefits for the UK. There are currently 24 Trade Envoys covering around 50 markets. I have been appointed as the Prime Minsters Trade Envoy to Nigeria which is the largest market in Africa. This will involve working with UKTI in the UK and in Nigeria working to ensure that the Government is on track to develop policies to grow their own economy and to promote two-way investment with the UK.

There are many different roles that MPs undertake on behalf of the government and, as mentioned, many are cross party. All of the work contributes to the whole in making sure that British interests are represented on the world stage in a whole variety of ways. In fulfilling these roles MPs are working for everyone in the UK. This work augments the work in Parliament and has to be worked into the overall schedule of work in Westminster and in the constituency.






