#### **Draft Parish Notes**

Meeting of Great Milton Parish Council, held at the Pavilion on Monday 13th December 2021 at 7.30pm.

The meeting was attended by Cllrs W Fox (Vice-Chair), G Bennet, P Allen and D Harms. Apologies were received in advance from Cllrs S Harrod (Chair), C Deacon and M Horsley. Tim Darch (Clerk) was in attendance, along with 1 member of the public. No interests were declared, and business was conducted as prescribed by the agenda.

## Matters to Report

Monthly reports were received from Cllr Freddie van Mierlo (County Councillor, Chalgrove division) and Cllr Caroline Newton (District Councillor, Haseley Brook ward). Both are available on the Parish Council website.

# Correspondence and public discussion

No correspondence has been received since the last meeting which is not covered elsewhere on the agenda.

# **Planning Applications**

P21/S4645/HH (The Penn Thame Road Great Milton OX447HX). Extension and conversion of roof to create habitable room within roof void. Local consultation by the ward councillor yielded no objections, and Cllr Bennet in reviewing the application raised no concerns. After brief discussion it was AGREED to support the application.

The following outstanding planning matter was reviewed.

Cllr Caroline Newton reports that SODC is changing its policy with regard to planning enforcement. In brief, assuming the policy is agreed by SODC's Cabinet, the administration is proposing to 'triage' enforcement cases so that the Council will only investigate those which are particularly egregious; the District Council will also no longer update parish councils or residents on the progress of an enforcement investigation. Cllr Newton feels that this change may be disappointing to residents and is also anxious that it will serve as a green light to people tempted to exploit the planning system.

The minutes of the November meeting of the Parish Council, held on Monday 15th November 2021, were reviewed, approved and signed as a true and accurate record of proceedings.

The latest monthly bank reconciliation, accounts and bank statement were received, approved and signed. The reconciled bank balance as of 6th December was £47,916.73.

# **Budget for 2022-23**

The second draft of the budget was reviewed. Since the draft budget was discussed at the Council's November meeting, the forecast number of households in the village paying Council Tax in 2022/23 has been received. This forecast shows that the number will rise by about 3.5%, which means that in order to achieve the aim of keeping the Precept flat year-on- year, the total needs to be increased by £700. This amount has been added to Sundry Expenditure.

Forecast expenses for 2022-23 total £25,930, an increase of 11.1% relative to the current financial year. Income from sources other than the precept is anticipated to be £5,750 compared with £3,750 in the current year, while the precept is forecast to rise 3.6% from £19,480 to £20,180. It was noted that the General Reserve stood at approximately £33,567: reserves have increased from £29,664 in 2020-21, largely as a consequence of reduced expenditure due to the impact of the Covid pandemic.

After discussion it was RESOLVED that the draft budget for 2022-23 should be accepted, approved and adopted.

## Precept for 2022-23

In the light of the agreed budget for 2022-23 and after discussion, it was RESOLVED that the precept for 2022-23 should be set at £20,180. The precept request form was approved and signed as required.

# Parish clerk and councillors' update of matters in hand

The demolished sign at the junction of the A329 and Thame Road has been reinstated.

# COVID-19: update on village response/impacts

There were no significant local developments to report with regard to the current pandemic, other than those which have been publicised nationally.

## 20mph zone

Results from a survey of village residents indicate around 80% support for a 20mph zone in the village centre. Messages of support have been received from Freddie Van Mierlo (County Councillor) and Alyson Frost, Head Teacher of Great Milton Primary School. After brief discussion it was AGREED that the Clerk would now formally submit an application for a 20mph zone to OCC.

# School pick-up and drop-off parking

Issues surrounding school parking were discussed at a meeting on Wednesday 1st December involving representatives of the Parish Council, Great Milton Primary School and the Recreation Ground Management Committee. Various potential solutions were put forward including:

- Using the Recreation Ground for parent parking or staff parking (the latter potentially freeing up the school drive and parking area for drop-off purposes)
- Using some existing school land to create additional parking
- Using The Bull car park for parent parking
- Putting down lines on the narrowest section of road between the school and just beyond the shop to deter parking on both sides of the road
- Seeking improved transport
- Encouraging car sharing from Wheatley.

It is likely that a combination of measures will be required to improve the situation. All parties will investigate potential opportunities and continue to work together to find a long-term solution that works for the school, parents that drive and residents of the village. The note of the meeting is available on the Parish Council website.

# Community Governance Review

South Oxfordshire District Council will be undertaking a Community Governance Review (CGR) during 2022 with any agreed changes implemented for the 2023 elections. The council's Community Governance and Electoral Issues Committee will undertake the review and make the final decision on any alterations. The review will cover:

- Altering the existing boundary of a parish.
- Creating, merging or abolishing parishes.
- Changing the name of existing parishes.
- The electoral arrangements for parishes (e.g. how many parish councillors are required and parish warding).
- Grouping parishes under a common parish council, or de-grouping parishes.
- The "style" of a parish (enabling an area to be known as a town, community, neighbourhood or village rather than a parish).

SODC has agreed to undertake a community governance review every four years with changes agreed for implementation at the next scheduled parish elections – in this case 2023. The Community Governance and Electoral Issues Committee will meet in early February to consider any requests and agree the terms of reference for the review: any requests for matters to be considered should be submitted with supporting evidence by 21 January 2022.

Great Milton Parish Council wonders if Milton Common as a whole might be better

served by inclusion within a single parish, rather than three as at present, which for example can lead to those on London Road being 'forgotten' in SODC's planning consultations. Any thoughts from residents on the south side of the A40 (who are currently residents of Great Milton parish) would be welcomed to help to inform a response to SODC's consultation. It was AGREED to contact Tiddington with Albury Parish Council (in whose area much of the housing west of the A329 is already included) to seek their views, and to submit a brief response to SODC making the above point.

## Proposed '3 Villages' newsletter

The current producers of 'The Haseleys' magazine have announced that they will not continue beyond December 2022. They have suggested that Little Milton, Great Milton and the Haseleys might combine to produce a monthly magazine covering all three parishes. After discussion it was suggested that should 'The Haseleys' magazine fold, Great Milton Parish Council may consider offering a few pages for Haseley news, with material to be supplied, additional production costs met and delivery arranged by Great Haseley Parish Council or another representative body. Financial and logistical complexities coupled with the creation of a publication that may contain a significant amount of information that may not be of interest to many readers (for example three sets of parish council meeting notes) were considered the major deterrents to a joint magazine for all three communities.

# **Notes from Near the Rectory**

January and February are the traditional months for hedging and ditching, when plant growth has stopped for the winter. Before the mechanisation of agriculture, farmworkers had spare time at this season to get on with these routine maintenance tasks. Hedges needed to be kept not only tidy but stockproof, as any gaps would encourage livestock to stray and run the risk of injury or death.

These days hedges are appreciated more for their amenity value, and also for the cover they provide for wildlife. Most of our hedges are kept well-trimmed on the top and sides, but the base is often thin and bare. While it is no longer vital to keep a hedge stockproof (barbed or electrified wire serves that purpose), the traditional craft of hedge-laying, which ensures good, thick, even growth, is enjoying a revival. In the middle of Great Haseley you can see a fine hedge that was laid only last year. With a friend from the village, I recently spent a day at a hands-on course, in the sleet and snow. We learned how to clear unnecessary material from an old overgrown hedge, cut

and bend the live stems at an angle, and hold them together with vertical stakes and horizontal woven binders (both made of pliable hazel rods). Vigorous new shoots will quickly grow from the base and the angled stems.

Whether or not we make New Year's resolutions (I'm afraid I don't), the period after Christmas is a pretty good time to take stock. Think of our life as a hedge. There will certainly be untidy bits that need trimming (physically and psychologically), and there may well be broken, even dead bits that need clearing out. Then how about the ragged gaps that will have appeared? This may be the time to address broken relationships, failed aspirations, a sense of emptiness.

There will certainly be plenty of vigorous life in our hedge, but it may not all be in the right place. A little judicious cutting, bending, reshaping, may be all it takes to promote new growth in those barren areas. And there will be friends who can act as stakes and binders, helping us to hold together and thrive.

January is in any case a time for new beginnings. The Church celebrates the Sunday after Epiphany (January 9th this year) as Plough Sunday, the traditional start of the agricultural year; and the Collect for the following Sunday says this:

Almighty God,

in Christ you make all things new:

transform the poverty of our nature by the riches of your grace,

and in the renewal of our lives make known your heavenly glory.

My daughter in Wiltshire has asked me to come over and lay a 50-metre hedge for her. It will be the first time I have tackled something like that on my own, and I'm sure I shall make mistakes. But new beginnings need courage! So as the French would say, "Bonne année, et bon courage (Happy New Year, and good courage)!"

## **View from Views**

Our late planted Wheat is just showing a nice neat row so let's hope this continues. All other crops seem to be fairing fairly well, a spot of disease in the Barley now looks to be recovering after a small dose of chemical. It is now evident that the pigeons have exhausted the food we left for them at harvest time and have



just moved to feeding on our Rape; we would have preferred they had not however that's life. The resident Herons still seem to like us, as well as the Hares. Walking around there now appear to be many small birds everywhere. Also there seems to be more Starlings as they had reduced dramatically in the last year or two; we see small murmurations of 20-30 birds, maybe one day there will be thousands as of years ago.

It was good to see in the press some interesting figures which show 70% of the public trusted the UK food standards & 84% trust our assurance schemes, whereas trust in government regulation was 64% and the trust in other nations food standards were from Ireland and NZ the highest, followed by most EU countries, but only 28% trusted USA, 11% China, and other countries like Canada and Australia even less. This illustrates the need for the "Trade and Agriculture Commission" (TAC) which was set up to monitor and oversee any trade deals. Funny this was only officially inaugurated once the NZ deal had been struck.

The Badger cull figures show that TB cases are the lowest since 2007 and that 2020

was the third year in succession to have seen an overall fall. Currently more than 55% of infections in higher risk areas, and 48.9% in adjoining areas, can be attributed to Badgers. Now we learn Oxfordshire has become a Higher Risk Area this is a little worrying for those with livestock; luckily it does not affect us.

Recently Prince Charles wrote in the Country Life about his obvious concerns with reference to the planet & climate change, with agricultures' effect on all this, and rightly says we have to take these things seriously. I would like to assure him that most of us do, and certainly we do at Views Farm. However it is not as simple as it seems having to follow Government guidelines and public demand. He advocates a more balanced agriculture with the introduction of livestock. This is somewhat difficult when the public is suggesting we should eat less meat; we cannot satisfy both. We have to, and are doing, find other means of naturally creating the nutrients needed to grow our crops. We also have to produce food at an acceptable price for the consumer. All these issues are exercising our minds at the moment.

What I believe he is also saying, which I have advocated for some time, is that planting any old tree anywhere we please is not a good idea; the right trees in the right places, yes. Particularly he is advocating the planting of hedgerows; this is something I was especially pleased to read as I have always thought that a good idea. We have planted many meters over the last 20 years; in fact there are many more hedges on Views farm than are evident on maps I have of the 1700s.

We learn that the courts are to be stricter on Water companies over pollution. About time, as readers will be aware this is one of my pet concerns. However it is a little unfair. Many years ago, when the water companies were privatised, it occurred to me at the time that the then Government could foresee that the sewage systems would need a lot of expenditure; thus, this would be better to come out of private pockets, not the public purse, and any blame could be laid at their door. The planning rules to a certain extent don't help as, as far as I am aware, there is no legal necessity for developers to liaise with the water company concerned or, indeed, any other local service provider. In my humble opinion developers, who after all are the ones who gain the most out of any development, should be made to contribute to the local infrastructure. It is simply not financially fair to expect others to pick up the bill for their gain. I think I am right in saying that in Stadhampton something like 100 houses were built but with no expansion of the sewage system. Also most of these houses are built down wind of said sewage works; who is going to be responsible for the smells emitted?




