

Ramblings from the Rectory

As I write, I have visions of angrily worded letters from parents from Great Milton School.

I was taking part in an RE session for year 6 pupils, I repeat year 6, not reception, year 1, 2, 3, 4, or 5 but year 6. Please hold that in mind before you judge me too harshly dear reader! They were looking at the life and person of Jesus and who various people believed he was. I was roped in as a bona fide vicar who might be able to say what I thought.

It was an excellent session. I was really impressed with how robust the thinking of the Children was. They looked at Jesus from all angles, including whether in fact he might have been mad?

One girl did make the comment that small children would possibly have a particular view of Jesus as a good person and teacher but only when growing older might they begin to discover that there could be more. I did respond that sometimes small children often have no problem with the more wonderful and extraordinary ideas surrounding Jesus and that Jesus himself welcomed children, indeed he said that in our approach to him we all need to be child-like. Then it happened, lulled into a false sense of security by the robustness of the questions and the nature of the discussion I started to say that for some people as they grow older the difficulty comes when they look at Jesus alongside their belief in father christmas and the tooth fairy. Remember (for the third time) these were year 6 children who had engaged with some very deep questions. I have to confess that as parents perhaps we were rather brutal with our own children who I think by the age of 7 had probably got sorted out that looking at evidence for Jesus and evidence for the other two might be of a very different order. Anyway, a loud 'no' from a teaching assistant alerted me not to go down that line of discussion any further. I immediately attempted a recovery to say something like 'and as we begin to question these things we need to go back and look at the evidence of where it all might have come from.' I had talked about the writings of the New Testament and my belief that whatever conclusion we come to, the writers of these documents clearly believed some remarkable things had happened.

But I am hoping that it will not turn out to be a misguided Basil Fawlty moment, 'don't mention the war, I did just now but I think I got away with it.'

If I have any defence, it could be that by year 6, children might have understood that we are not on the same playing field when it comes to evidence for father christmas, the tooth fairy and Jesus. Some things are obviously just plain myth or fairy tale but others, like faith perhaps, need to be examined and looked at in a different way. If not, it could lead to what the man on one of the vox pops shown at our Lent group cheerfully stated, 'I gave up believing in Jesus or God alongside Father Christmas and the Tooth fairy'. If my comment inadvertently caused one or two children in the class to have a major existential crisis, I am very sorry of course.

I do however come back to the evidence. I don't think faith can simply to be dismissed alongside obvious myths and fairy tales. I return to the evidence of the New Testament, that these writers clearly believed what they were writing about this extraordinary and mysterious man. On Good Friday we will be remembering that Jesus really and actually died on the Cross. Muslims for instance don't believe

this, Jesus as one of God's holy prophets would never be allowed to suffer such an ignominious end. Quite why he died is complicated and many facetted. The New Testament approaches the question from different angles, He died for our sins, He died to overthrow the powers of evil, He died to demonstrate the nature and depth of God's love for us, he died to identify with the plight of the suffering and fallen. All of these I think are valid and fit together to make a whole, and yet still leave us grappling with the mystery; 'Tis mystery all the immortal dies' Charles Wesley wrote in his great Hymn 'And can it be'. On Easter Sunday we will be remembering that the New Testament is also clear that Jesus really and actually rose from the dead. 'The Lord is risen, he is risen indeed, Alleluia' is the great cry of Easter Sunday morning, and the New Testament points to a whole body of evidence to counter those of that day who suggested 'oh no he didn't'. I don't think it will do to dismiss the claim as myth or metaphor, when we read the accounts we have to ask if those who wrote them down believed them to be true? I think there can be only one answer, and we then have to make our choice. Do I believe all of this? Well, I wrestle and wonder about how it all works but essentially, yes I do. Do I believe in father christmas or the tooth fairy? no I don't. I don't want to spoil an innocent sense of wonder and magic, but sooner of later children have to sort this out. I just hope right now that I don't get into a whole heap of trouble for foolishly starting down that particular path with a bunch of year six pupils!

The Lord is risen, He is risen indeed, Alleluia!

Holy Week and Easter.

Our Holy Communion service on Maundy Thursday, commemorating the events of the Last Supper will take place at 7.30 pm on Thursday April 13th at St Peter's Great Haseley. Tim Suter is organising a choir especially to support this service.

Our Good Friday service of reflections and Hymns will by at 11.00 am at St Mary's Great Milton.

In the afternoon, by popular demand, there will once again be a 'pilgrimage' walk around the Benefice, beginning at 2.30pm outside the Plough at Great Haseley with a brief reading and a prayer. The route will then go across the fields, through the Wells Farm nature reserve to the triangle at the top of Haseley road in Little Milton, where there will be a second brief reading and a prayer. The walk will move back to Great Milton, with a stop on the Green for a third reading and prayer. The walk will then pass the Windmill with its great views and end back at the Plough at Great Haseley which should then be open for refreshments! The walk is of course open to all, including those with dogs, we had a really good number of our canine friends join us last year. This might appeal to those who want to mark Good Friday in some way but

for whom a more formal service in church is not their thing, or for those who simply want to have a good walk!

8.00am: St Mary's Great Milton, BCP Said Communion. 9.30am: St Peter's Great Haseley, Holy Communion with Easter Hymns.

11.00am: St James Great Haseley, Easter Day Family Communion.

View From Views

April who would have thought we would be here already, and at last it seems that spring is actually here. After we have had what I would call a fairly uneventful winter in this area, although we did have a long period of cold with the lowest temperature -8c, which is not really startling. Without excessive rainfall, February only recorded some 32 mm of rainfall, very little for a month like February. This long period



of cold has made everything a bit later this year, not a bad thing on the whole, giving things a chance to relax, now at last it's all waking up, let's hope we have a wonderful spring and summer. This has meant that our crops have "wintered well" as they say, of course our Oil Seed Rape (OSR) has suffered severely from Pigeons, with a bit of luck they have not done too much damage. I cannot understand why they seem to only have targeted certain crops barely touching some, even in adjacent fields something I find inexplicable.

It's remarkable how quickly things start to grow, I reckon the OSR has grown some 18 inches in the last 2 weeks, now even showing flower buds, by the time this is read may well be showing the glorious yellow flowers, Pigeons permitting. The bird song and the dawn chorus at this time of year, after the quiet of the winter months is a sure sign that spring is coming, instilling great optimism for the coming summer. Also, on several occasions I have seen, Snipe rising up from the OSR, to me this is quite unique as I always thought they preferred wet lands which this really is not. Always a surprise in nature!

After a fairly dry February the first few weeks of March, just when we want to get on to the land planting our spring crops, it's wet! Now everything is on hold, if we had not grown some turnips, and then grazed them with sheep, to help the soil structure, we could have ploughed and planted that area of the Farm a month earlier "sods law" just another thing we have to put up with in farming.

As you will all have observed reading my monthly missives I have a keen interest in wildlife and all things natural, well this is all very well as it has it's disadvantages. Some years ago we planted an area of Hazel for coppicing, I have been doing just that in the hopes of getting some nice straight sticks for Bean Poles and for making some hurdles which I do as a past time. To my dismay due to damage by Deer and Squirrels (wildlife) there is very little of use in this plantation of course we could have protected it from the Deer, but without trapping and slaughter there is no control of the pesky Squirrels. We have been suffering a deal of Mole damage in the garden, managing to catch one in the end, now this damage seems to have stopped, I cannot believe one Mole could do so much damage.

One of the topics hitting the headlines at the moment is Fly Tipping, at last it has been publicised that any rubbish tipped on a Farmers land, is the Farmers responsibility, of course I feel this is grossly unfair, as it can be very expensive to get rid of. We are lucky in this area as most of the accessible fly tipping is cleared in double quick time by SODC. It must be a very small proportion of the population, and no one who reads these pages. The real problem is the organised fly tippers, who are difficult to catch as they are organised business activities, and make a lot of money out of clearing peoples rubbish at a much lesser rate than the official channels. I feel the situation is not helped by the government imposing, for very good reasons, the land fill tax making it expensive to get rid of rubbish, needless to say we all go for the cheapest option without understanding the implications. This situation is compounded by the rules, and operatives at waste sites interpretation of the rules, making it difficult for ordinary people to take the right action. An instance comes to mind recently when we took some household waste to the Redbridge tip, because we took it in a double cab Land Rover it was termed trade waste, which could not be left without the proper paperwork, this could not be completed on site as we had to be registered first, all right and proper but a great incentive to find the nearest gateway and someone else's problem.

Whilst on this wonderful subject I think we have to be proud of our local Council in the way they deal with our rubbish, as we are lead to believe, not only are they one of the leading Councils in this respect as they recycle or use 90% of what we throw away. As I see it this is all very well but it is not made obvious to most people which bin each item should go. Although the literature from the council is pretty good, there

are still many grey areas that could be made plainer. I am happy to put anything that I am not sure about in the grey bin (looks more black to me) as I understand it goes for incineration at Ardley. By the way, The neighbours club are organising a visit to the Ardley "Energy Reclamation Unit" (ERU) where our rubbish is incinerated, on the 18th October I would recommend anyone who can make it, to see if there are any free spaces to go on this trip. This is fascinating and helps us all to understand what actually happens to our waste. Great Haselev and District Horticultural Society

We have had very varied weather over the last few weeks. I went to SE Spain to join one of my sisters in her holiday apartment for a few days during the last week in February expecting at least a little sun and warmth, but it really was cool, damp and dull much of the time; this did not stop my Scottish brother-in-law from sporting his

usual attire of kilt and a shirt whereas the girls were wearing multiple layers including fleece and waterproof. I can certainly understand why there have been vegetable and salad shortages! The poor weather did at least give us Malaga Botanic gardens largely to ourselves. These gardens have only been in council ownership for about 25 years, but have splendid collections of trees and shrubs collected by a family over many decades. The gardens lie on a steep slope so at the top there are magnificent views to be enjoyed over the tree canopy and there is a lovely little café serving homemade food. Entry was the princely sum of 3 Euros and 10 cents for concessions.

On my return home I found much damage caused by the storm. Our meadow used to be two separate fields separated by an old fence and the remains of an ancient hedge. This consisted of three very, very old hawthorns with huge girths and much dieback. We lost one in December 2013 when it simply fell over in a storm which left two. One became completely dead a couple of years ago and, of course, it was the one our son, Paul, and his wife had chosen to plant a rambling rose 'Paul's Himalayan Musk' several years ago. The rose was doing rather well and I was looking forward to a wonderful show this year, but it was not to be. Around 90% of the tree simply fell over and broke up. We managed to rescue some of the rose and propped it back over the remains of the tree. We are hopeful that the last little part will survive a few more years now it is so slim. My other half has planted a young oak next to it which we hope will take over in due course. Despite being a keen chainsaw wielder, he has declared the high broken branches in a large ash to be too dangerous and has called in a tree surgeon (so they must be really dangerous if he is not prepared to tackle them!).

Last week brought some beautiful weather with warmth and sunshine. Spring definitely seems to be on its way! Keep on top of cutting back and weeding and enjoy all the beautiful spring bulbs while they last.

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



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
