

Draft Parish Notes - February 2022

Meeting of Great Milton Parish Council, held at the Pavilion on Monday 21st February 2022 at 7.30pm.

The meeting was attended by Cllrs S Harrod (Chair), P Allen, D Harms and M Horsley. Apologies were received in advance from Cllrs W Fox, C Deacon and G Bennet, along with Cllr Caroline Newton (SODC). Tim Darch (Clerk) was in attendance, along with Cllr Freddie Van Mierlo (OCC) and one member of the public. No interests were declared, and business was conducted as prescribed by the agenda.

Matters to Report

Monthly reports were received from Cllr Freddie van Mierlo (County Councillor, Chalgrove division) and Cllr Caroline Newton (District Councillor, Haseley Brook ward). Both are available on the Parish Council website. Cllr Allen asked a question about bus service funding: Cllr Van Mierlo replied that some funding is pending from central government, but probably not all that had been asked for. The bus companies are struggling financially and some service reductions are taking place in light of reduced patronage. Although the County Council has aspirations to increase public transport use the impact of Covid may influence this.

Correspondence and public discussion

No correspondence has been received this month other than that relating to matters dealt with elsewhere on the agenda.

Planning Applications

The following planning applications received from SODC were considered.

P21/S4878/HH (The Old Stable Yard Thame Road Great Milton). Stable buildings and concrete apron to front comprising three stables, tack room and store.

The application was reviewed by the ward councillor, who in his absence provided comments in advance for review and discussion. No issues or significant comments were raised, either by councillors or nearby residents when contacted. As a result the parish council agreed to SUPPORT the application.

The following planning decisions received and outstanding planning matters were considered.

Le Manoir planning application update

It is understood that following objections from Heritage England and SODC's landscape officer, the applicants are reviewing their plans with a view to some amendments.

Tiddington-with-Albury Neighbourhood Plan pre-submission plan

Tiddington-with-Albury's Neighbourhood Plan pre-submission plan has been

received for consideration. Having reviewed the content, Great Milton Parish Council congratulates Tiddington-with-Albury Parish Council on the content of the plan, and shares its concerns over the impact of potential development at Harrington, Chalgrove and the site of Waterstock Golf Course on local infrastructure, particularly with regard to additional traffic generation on the A329.

The minutes of the January meeting of the Parish Council, held on Monday 17th January 2022, were reviewed, approved and signed as a true and accurate record of proceedings.

The latest monthly bank reconciliation, accounts and bank statement were received, considered and approved. The reconciled bank balance as at 7 February 2022 was £46,581.50.

Parish clerk and councillors' update of matters in hand

- Airband appears to have been installing fibre-related infrastructure in the village over the last few weeks. This hopefully means that much of the village will shortly have access to full fibre broadband, though it appears that the houses beyond Oxen Piece on Thame Road and some more isolated properties may not be covered by this project. Clarification on this and on timescales and procedures for accessing services will be sought from Airband, though it appears that domestic access may not be available any time soon.
- A resident of the houses erected recently on London Road in Milton Common has reported incidences of inconsiderate parking, including on the pavement and close to driveways. Residents are politely reminded to ensure that visitors park safely and respectfully, preferably in the allocated parking spaces outside the houses if available, or in the laybys on London Road. The parish council has no powers of enforcement in this area, but the issue has been reported once again to the Neighbourhood Policing team.
- Remedial work to address the drainage issues on Lower End has now got the goahead from OCC, but timings are yet to be determined. Some work was

under way in the problem area on the day of the meeting: it is hoped that this was to address the drainage issues.

COVID-19: update on village response/impacts

No significant local developments were raised with regard to the current pandemic, other than those which are receiving widespread national publicity.

20mph zone

Requests for 20mph speed limits will be fully funded by the county council. Villages and towns that have already put in applications will be bundled into two batches in summer and winter 2022. Further rounds will be planned in 2023 and beyond. There is nothing to indicate which batch Great Milton's application (submitted in January) is included in.

Issues with mail deliveries

It appears that the issues with mail deliveries reported last month have eased.

Security in the village

Security in the village was discussed in light of reports of a number of attempted and successful burglaries in recent months. A resident was in attendance representing the Neighbourhood Watch scheme. CCTV was discussed, though issues with lighting, costs and privacy were raised. It was suggested that the Neighbourhood Watch scheme could take a more prominent role in the village in terms of providing a link between the Parish Council and the police. Cllr Van Mierlo also suggested contacting Matthew Barber (Police and Crime Commissioner for the Thames Valley) to express concerns over the apparent recent increase in crime, and particularly burglary, in the village. The Clerk will pursue this. It was also proposed that the neighbourhood policing team could be approached by the Neighbourhood Watch group with a view to attending a local event where advice could be provided to concerned residents.

Protocol for death of a senior figure: 'Operation London Bridge'

Various organisations (including Oxfordshire County Council) have encouraged local councils to once again revisit their arrangements for the death of a senior figure, and to ensure an element of coordination between parish councils, churches and other elements of the community in marking such an event. After brief discussion it was agreed that the Parish Council's existing protocols were sufficient, having been revisited within the last year.

Parish Clerk's remuneration 2021-22

The Clerk's remuneration for the current financial year was reviewed and discussed. Negotiations are currently ongoing between Local Government employers and the unions on the 2021/22 pay increase. The process has been protracted and there has been no agreement as yet. However, there seems to be little appetite among the union

members for industrial action: as a result it seems probable that agreement will be reached soon: the parish council will keep the situation under review and backdate any pay increment when agreed to April 2021. In the meantime councillors agreed to pay the Clerk a cash bonus of £200 in March to recognise his excellent contribution over the year, particularly during lockdowns and other restrictions.

Date of April meeting/Annual Parish Meeting

To note that April's Annual Parish Meeting and the monthly meeting of the parish council will take place on Tuesday April 19th at 7.30pm in the Pavilion, instead of on the Monday as is usual which is Easter Monday.

The meeting closed at 8.10pm.

The next meeting of Great Milton Parish Council will be held on Monday 21st March 2022 at the Pavilion, starting at 7.30pm.

The Rector's Pint

I haven't written one of these for some time! I am very grateful to Toby Garfitt and Tony Jefferis who have offered their thoughts and insights in my absence.

I don't want to go into the details or circumstances that led me to taking a rather unexpected sabbatical. However, I have been really touched by the many messages of greetings and support I have received. It has also been surprising how many people have told me that they have also had to wrestle with mental health issues, it is far more common than we imagine and I think that it would a good and healthy thing, not least in the Church, if we could be more open and honest about the struggles we face.

I wish I could say that my spiritual life of prayer had taken a leap forward with the time and opportunity to 'go deep'. The truth is it has been sporadic and at times very hard to pray, but I have tried. During our zoom services of 2020 and 2021 we started to engage with the poems of the priest and poet Malcolm Guite. His writings have been very helpful to me, and I particularly recommend his book, David's Crown. This is not a re-writing of the Psalms, rather, he has taken each Psalm and has written a response, each one of five verses with three lines. It is a beautiful and very thoughtful companion to the Psalms. I recently read Psalm 107, and I wish I had come across it earlier as it really spoke to me, it might also speak to one or two of you. It has a personal application and perhaps a bit of a wider reach, reflecting in part the times we have all been through.

Psalm 107: Confitemini Domion (Give thanks to the Lord)

My judge is still my saviour and my friend. Time after time he finds and rescues me, Makes a beginning where I have made an end.

I was astray and yet he came to save me And filled my hungry soul with nourishment. I sat in darkness, bound in misery,

Crushed by depression and discouragement, He brought me out of darkness, broke the chain, The complex links of my imprisonment.

When I was sick and wearied and in pain, Afraid of pestilence in these dark days, He sent his word and raised me up again.

So I will sing this psalm that sings his praise,

Telling of all the wonders he has done,

Whose loving kindness keeps me all my days.

(Malcolm Guite, David's Crown, Sounding the Psalms Canterbury Press 2021)

This is a wonderful book and each one of his reflections is an absolute gem.

I am now greatly looking forward to our upcoming services, and our Lent lunches in March. These have always been very popular and are a valuable experience in which we can all share.

It is good to get back to writing Rector's Pint, but I know that you have really benefited from Toby and Tony's offerings, and perhaps it is also something I can share with others now and again.

The Neighbours' Hall

In February's edition of the Great Milton Bulletin the Parish Notes mentioned an email suggesting the Neighbours' Hall could be sold to the Manoir and the proceeds used to enhance the pavilion.

From many angles this is a sensible suggestion, why does a village with just over 1000 inhabitants need two public buildings, neither of which are used to capacity?

However, it is not as simple as it sounds. The ownership of the Neighbours' Hall is in the hands of the Diocese of Oxford, where it is held in trust for the benefit of the three villages, Great Haseley, Little Milton and Great Milton. If it were to be sold the funds would revert to the Diocese, they might (or might not!) allow the villages to use all or part of the funds. The funds might then be used to support the upkeep of the churches, all of whom need expensive maintenance and none would be available for the pavilion!

In addition, the Neighbours' Hall has recently been given £150,000 from public sources for its very worthwhile refurbishment: these funds have to be returned if there is a change of use of the hall.

So, let us enjoy the hall, use it for village and private occasions and plan for a village commemoration to celebrate its centenary in 2024.

We were all extremely grateful for the support of all those who came out and volunteered their time for the big clear-up.

Tremendous work was carried out cutting back the brambles, clearing the pond, litter picking, as well as many other jobs. Rounded off with a coffee and a chat.

If anyone would like to volunteer on a more regular basis they will be more than welcome to join us. We meet every second Saturday of the month at 10:30am for the general upkeep of Old Field.



View from Views

After a month without any rain, and only 7.5mm by the 6th, on the 14th 12mm, floods out on the 15th something has to be wrong somewhere. We have to put up with this but no one seems to care about it. At least we don't have to suffer the severe sewage pollution other rivers have. This all points to the fact, as I have said many times before, this island of ours is at capacity.



So far this year the weather has been somewhat uninspiring. I think most of our crops think the same as there has been very little movement since I last wrote, certainly no improvement; the only dramatic change is the disappearance of a lot of rape aided by our friendly flock of Pigeons. It is suggested grazing rape with sheep could be a good practice, as this could help control the Flee Beetle, so maybe we should not be worried about pigeon damage. The other crop that has all but disappeared is our companion Clover; I reckon it is only just a winter/frost check. Everything though is looking pretty healthy on the whole, just need a little help now, with some nice clement spring weather, known to us farmers as Dr Green. Owing to the horrendous increase in the price of gas affecting the cost of fertiliser, we have had to make serious calculations of the application rates for this season, which could well have the effect of reducing the country's overall harvest. This has already affected the world price of cereals and all futures are pointing in that direction. This is fine as long as this trend continues but, if these levels decrease, then it could be a problem for us.

As we start our winter wild bird feeding to cover the hungry gap (Feb to May) small birds seem to be collecting in numbers. I get the impression there is a resurgence in Green finches that certainly have declined of late, with Yellow Hammers being more evident, as well as Starlings, all of which we believe are on the decline, along with Sparrows. This fact was disproved in the recent RSPB bird count. Of course I have not mentioned before there seems to be a lot of Sky Larks around and have been all winter. This gives us a little confidence that we are doing some good.

At the recent Oxford Farming Conferences some interesting facts were discussed; The Northern Ireland Farm Minister Edwin Poots, who has hit the headlines lately, stated, contrary to the popular view that cattle were all bad, by pointing out that in the 1950's we had a similar number of cattle as now, but about 4% of the cars and aviation. He said farming is not the problem it's made out to be (so lay off agriculture)! It was also suggested that each person is responsible for 6,000g of emissions or 20 party balloons and, if only 5% of our energy needs were met by solar, it would reduce the personal emissions by 3,000g, and if all peat land was restored to sequester carbon that would equate to a further 3,000g per person/day.

I am not sure if the information I got was correct in that the County Council was proposing that only Vegan food be on the menu at Council functions and meetings plus, possibly, school meals. Do they not represent a rural Agricultural community? As well as urban areas, are they not prepared to support rural & local industry? Do they not realise that most Vegan food is produced using product produced on land that was cleared rain forest and the import of these plants can threaten bringing in their country of origin's diseases with them; just a few points. There was a demonstration

by farmers outside County Hall which no one seemed to know about until the night before, when it took our district councillor Caroline Newton to let me know. Just hope another time, if there is to be another demonstration, we are well informed so we can be there. As it happened I could not attend as I was at a meeting of our Farm Cluster looking at the effects of our various conservation initiatives, as well as other issues we could address to improve what we could do. I doubt the areas where these foods come from take these things so seriously. I now understand from our C Councillor Mr Van Mierlo that the "CC" is promoting a plant based diet.

As I have mentioned many times before how important our food security is, the "Public Accounts Committee" has accepted the fact that, if we are not careful, we are sleep walking into major problems in the delivery of good wholesome home grown foods. This not only applies to food but a lot of other essential goods; these concerns are coming home to roost now, with Russia controlling most of European gas supplies. Putin has got us just where he wants us by making our politicians run around like headless chickens. I bet he is laughing his head off at the moment. I would not like to bet he has no intention of invading, but will milk the situation for as much as he can get. That all remains to be seen, as at the time of writing we do not know. In this day and age how anyone can justify telling another sovereign state what it can and can't do? Still, I am no politician! By the time this is read the situation will have changed. Just hope, if that is the case, politicians will have come to their senses. This just illustrates how vulnerable we can be if we rely on others for our vital supplies.

After you download the app, you will need to set up an NHS login and prove who you are. The app then securely connects to information from your GP surgery.

Collecting Repeat Prescriptions from Wheatley Pharmacy

Several of our patients are now collecting their repeat medication from Wheatley Pharmacy. You too can do the same. Order your repeat medication as you would normally and just let one of the dispensing team know that you wish to collect from the Pharmacy. Turnaround time for medication dispensing at the Pharmacy is currently three days from submission of your repeat medication request. You do not need to wait for a text message to confirm your medication is ready before going to collect.

Blister Pack Recycling

You may be interested to know that there is a Terracycle recycling bin both in the pharmacy and dispensary to receive EMPTY blister packs. These are the foil and plastic bits of the packet left when the pills or capsules are finished. Due to the mix of plastic type, these cannot be put into household recycling. After collection, Terracycle clean and separate the blister packets by polymer type, then the material will in turn make new recyclable products. Thank you for supporting efforts to reduce waste.

John Howell MP writes...

In my newsletter last month I wrote about the need to learn to live with the COVID virus as we move from pandemic to endemic. I know that many people have welcomed the Prime Minister's Statement which was first made on 19th January which set the path for further removal of regulations. We will hear more of later this month, probably by the time this letter is published in some magazines! In January many parents and young people welcomed removing the requirement for secondary school students to wear face masks in classrooms. However, some people were concerned that more widely face masks become advisory rather than mandatory. I understand some of the concerns but do support the view that we need to allow people to make their own judgements. I appreciate that as more regulations are set to be removed some people remain anxious, but we have come along way in the last couple of years. When all of this started, we did not know what we were dealing with. We did not know how to treat the virus and had no medicines at our disposal. Thanks to research we now have effective ways

to treat the virus and a range of drugs at our disposal to relieve symptoms. We do, of course, also have the vaccines and it is good news that at last the Novavax vaccine has been approved in the UK too. I am aware of a number of constituents who volunteered to take part in this trial and of the difficulties that some have faced as a result of the delays to the approval. I am grateful to those who have taken part in trials without whom we would not have effective vaccines and trust that all are relieved that it is now among the approved vaccines. Moving forward with Covid we need to learn to manage it in the same was as we have always managed seasonal viruses and I trust that we will see some measures coming forward to respond to this.

In our move to live more normal lives we are seeing the economy open up again and people returning to some of the activities that have been prohibited or curtailed for many months. Alongside this inevitably there has to be an end to special funding that has been made available to try to mitigate for the negative impact of Covid. Among these is a support grant for bus companies to help bridge the gap in fare income with reduced passenger numbers. Although I fully support the gradual withdrawal of the specific Covid funding I am concerned that use of public transport has not yet reached pre-covid levels and that the removal of this grant may adversely affect our bus services. To this end I have written to the Secretary of State for Transport to raise my concerns on this and to seek continued funding to ensure that we can keep our bus services running. I appreciate that it is especially difficult in rural areas where the volume of passengers on individual routes is just not at the level of urban areas and thus the journey cost per head is prohibitive. In such cases where there is a key route for a community it has long been within the remit of county councils to budget for appropriate subsidies. It is, of course, a political decision where any administration allocates its funds. In response to both the Covid impact and in support of climate initiatives I would like to see our local council make this a budget priority especially in light of the generous Local Government Settlement this year which has given substantial increases to our local councils.

On the world stage there is great concern at what is going on to stop war between Russia and the Ukraine. This is not just a distant issue but could have a significant impact on the UK. It is a particular concern to me as a senior Vice-Chairman of the Parliamentary Assembly of the Council of Europe. Both Russia and Ukraine are members of this Assembly - although how serious Russia is may be doubted when one senior Russian fell asleep publicly when moving an objection to an amendment in a debate I was chairing! The Council is doing all it can to help bring about peace between

the two countries and I have personally worked closely with my opposite number in the Organisation for Security and Co-operation in Europe.

The role of the Council of Europe is often overlooked in Britain but all members of the Delegation that I lead share my concerns. It is often derided as just a human rights organisation. But while human rights are crucially important, it is much more than this and has had a key role to play in maintaining the peace in Europe since the late 1940s.

I am always interested to know the views of constituents even if we agree to differ. If there is an issue that concerns you please do share your thoughts.
