#### **Draft Parish Notes**

Present at the Parish Council meeting held on Monday 17 December were Cllrs. S Harrod (Chairman), W Fox (Vice Chairman), P Allen, G Harris, C Deacon and P Fewell, plus Tim Darch (Clerk). Apologies were received in advance from Cllr G Bennet.

The minutes of the meeting of the Parish Council held on Monday 19th November 2018 were signed and approved as an accurate record of proceedings. The County Councillor's monthly report was received and is reproduced after these notes.

#### Planning applications

The following planning applications were considered:

P18/S3757/LDE: Certificate of lawful development for storage and ancillary use in connection with existing vehicle repairs business (Bentley House London Road Milton Common OX9 2NU). For reference only: comments on planning merits of site not required.

P18/S2996/FUL (Lobb Farm, Tetsworth, Oxon OX9 7BE). The proposed development is for a Gas Fired Electricity Generating Facility with the ability to generate up to 49.99 MW of electricity. A low carbon flexible generating facility

using gas reciprocating engines. The facility will generate electricity principally for the regional distribution network in times of generation shortfall and/or high demand.

The Parish Council has formally objected to this planning application, and SODC has expressed its concerns about its potential impact on the landscape to the applicant, who is considering next steps. Should a revised application be submitted the Parish Council will be formally consulted on it, and will have an opportunity to comment again, as will residents.

The following outstanding planning matters were considered:

Work has been undertaken on an area of grass verge opposite the row of cottages on Ives Gate Lane adjacent to Pitts Green with a view to create a parking area. The Parish Council understands that under application P14/S2675/FUL planning permission was granted to renovate the semi-derelict Coach House, the initial application for which included access from Ives Gate Lane along with a hard-standing for parking. However following representations from residents and others a revised submission was required and made. Permission for this revision was granted subject to various conditions, the most relevant being condition 6 which stated:

Prior to the first occupation of the development hereby approved a turning area and car parking spaces shall be provided within the curtilage of the site so that motor vehicles may enter, turn round and leave in a forward direction and vehicles may park off the highway.

After representations to the applicant work has now ceased: no remedial work is currently required, and a new planning application will be submitted in due course.

A full bank reconciliation was received along with the quarterly accounts and the latest bank statement signed. The reconciled bank balance as at 5 November was £28,935.64.

#### Budget for 2019-20

The final draft budget was discussed in detail. Expenses totalled £21,520, an increase of 10% compared with the previous year. Income from sources other than the precept was  $\pounds$ 3,510 compared with £2,540 in the previous year while the precept was

forecast to rise 6% from £16,990 to £18,010. It was noted that the General Reserve stood at approximately £17,000. It was agreed that this level of reserves was reasonable and should be maintained. After discussion it was RESOLVED that the draft budget for 2019-20 be accepted and approved.

#### Precept for 2019-20

In light of the agreed budget for 2019-20 and after discussion it was RESOLVED that the precept for 2019-20 be set at £18,010.

#### Parish Clerk's update of matters in hand

The bus shelter at Milton Common has been given its annual 'refresh'.

A survey of the village's trees on common land/village greens revealed no major concerns with their condition, just some minor trimming and other maintenance required.

Drainage grips on Thame Road, Lower End, Sworford Lane and The Forties will be cleared and dug out shortly.

#### Other matters

#### Oxford-Cambridge Expressway update

Two corridors are now favoured, one to the west of Oxford and one to the south. If chosen, the corridor to the south is highly likely to bring the Expressway (essentially a motorway) very close to the village, crossing Sworford Lane at some point. Village representatives recently attended a consultation meeting hosted by the Highways Agency to seek information and relay their concerns. There is still little detailed information to report at present: a selection of possible alignments is expected to be announced in Spring 2019.

There was no significant progress to report with regard to the leasing arrangements for the tennis court.

Several different options for stile replacement have been received from OCC's Countryside Access team. Replacement of three stiles has been suggested to ensure significantly enhanced accessibility. Funding sources will be explored, and discussions will be necessary with landowners to confirm arrangements for maintenance once the new stiles have been installed.

Estimates for the village mowing provision have been requested and received from three contractors. After evaluation and moderation Green and Growing will continue to mow the village greens and common land for a further two years. All potential contractors have been informed of the outcome.

The latest iteration of South Oxfordshire District Council's Local Plan features the addition of three new sites on the outskirts of Oxford (Grenoble Road, Northfield and Bayswater Brook), all of which are in the Green Belt as it currently stands. Chalgrove Airfield remains, as does Wheatley Campus. Harrington (near M40 J7) has not been

added, though it could still come forward as a speculative application.

The potholes in the road around Pitts Green (the triangle adjacent to Milton Lodge) have been filled: the Parish Council is grateful to the local resident who arranged this. Residents around Pitts Green are to discuss the possibility of a fully metalled surface in due course.

The proposed dates for GMPC meetings in 2019 were agreed as follows: 21st January 18th February 18th March 15th April 20th May 17th June 15th July (Revision/cover possible dependent on Clerk's holiday arrangements) No meeting in August 16h September 21st October 18th November 16th December

The meeting closed at 7.50pm. The next meeting of Great Milton Parish Council will be held on Monday 21st January starting at 7.30pm in The Pavilion.

#### **Oxfordshire County Council December Update**

#### **Council Budget**

The council's initial proposals for the 2019/2020 budget will be reviewed by the Performance Scrutiny Committee during December. A key element is the plan to invest up to £120m in roads and schools – a 'growth dividend' as more households mean more Council Tax revenue in future years. Tough decisions in the past have created a route to financial stability at a time when other councils face financial threats. There are new 'Transformation' plans being developed to completely redesign the council to reduce running costs. Making financial savings will enable OCC to support the growing number of vulnerable children and adults – more vulnerable children are coming into council care, both locally and nationally, creating financial pressures. Protecting children remains OCC's top priority.

#### Housing and Growth Deal Infrastructure Programme

The Oxfordshire Growth Board has published details of the infrastructure projects to receive funding in Year 1 and Years 2-5 of the Oxfordshire Housing &

Growth Deal, signed in April 2018. The total £150 million of Growth Deal funding has been earmarked for specific projects. This forward funding is helping unlock projects that will benefit from developer contributions, delivering schemes valued at over £480 million in total, excluding costs of the major rail projects, which are still to be confirmed. The following projects will have a direct impact on this Division:

#### Year 1 Infrastructure Projects Watlington relief road

Construction of a relief road for Watlington providing an alternative route from the B4009 east and B4009 west, respectively to the west and north of the parish. This will provide a long term solution to air quality problems in Watlington; an alternative route for LGVs and HGVs. This, in turn, will help create better conditions for walking and cycling in Watlington and improve bus journey times. By providing improved highway infrastructure the scheme releases capacity to support housing growth in Watlington and the surrounding area. Approximately 400 dwellings are planned and allocated through the neighbourhood plan to be delivered in the next 7 years. The project will be part funded by the development.

District: South Oxfordshire Estimated Growth Deal spend: £1,200,000 Full cost of scheme: £12,000,000

#### Benson relief road

The relief road will provide traffic with an alternative route from the A4074 and B4009 to the north of the village, particularly for HGVs. There will also be capacity improvements at the A4074/Church Road junction and improved pedestrian and cycle facilities in and through Benson. The road will help unlock development sites to the north of the village along the new route, delivering around 600 new homes, with the Growth Deal forward funding enabling the work ahead of significant developer contributions.

District: South Oxfordshire

Estimated Growth Deal spend: £1,200,000

Full cost of scheme: £12,000,000

#### Occ Calls for Public Inquiry on Thames Water's Reservoir Plan

Residents' interests come first – that was the resolute message from OCC last month as its cabinet called for a public inquiry on Thames Water's plans for a new reservoir. The council has concerns about the size and need for the proposed reservoir to the southwest of Abingdon, between Steventon, East Hanney and Marcham. It is also concerned about the length of time Thames Water has set itself to reduce leakages. Further clarity is sought from Thames Water on whether other potential sites have been fully assessed across the southeast region. Only when these details are provided in the form of a regional water resource plan for the south east, will the council be able to decide on whether to back the principle of having a reservoir at this location. This is the second consultation held by Thames Water – the county council and others demanded earlier this year that a further consultation should take place and Thames Water agreed to this in the summer.

#### **Highways Defects Update**

As reported last month, the county council has increased the amount of relatively small-scale work it does to put right local roads that are suffering from potholes, cracks and worn out tarmac. The number of completed defect repairs between January and October this year is 37,219.

#### A Pilot Scheme for a Car Service to Existing Bus Service 280

The 280 bus from Oxford to Aylesbury stops close to the end of Sworford Lane, but too far from the village for most bus users to be able to access. A small group from Great Milton are proposing to set up a voluntary system of lifts to and from a Wheatley bus stop so that residents of Great Milton can access the 280 bus.

#### What we need:

- A group of volunteers prepared to use their own cars to drive bus users from their homes to a designated bus stop and/or collect from the same place. (It need not be the same driver for both journeys).
- Two 'contacts' who would be prepared to take phone calls and coordinate 🛛 🕝

with the volunteers via a group email list.

#### How it would work.

Potential users of the scheme would ring or email one of the two contacts and say which bus they would like to catch AND which bus they would be returning on. At least 2 days' notice must be given.

The contact would circulate the details and find one or two people to make the journeys (clearly it will not always be possible for the same driver to do both journeys).

A small charge would be made to cover petrol costs (£2 per journey).

Users would complete a short registration process and agree to the following:

- The service would operate between 9am and 4pm Monday to Friday. As it would be a pilot scheme to identify need, it would be easier to offer lifts only between 9 10 am, 12 1pm and 3 4 pm.
- The user is responsible for informing their driver if there is any change in the arrangement (e.g they miss the return bus or the bus is delayed.)
- The scheme should not be used for regular trips such as for going to work or shopping at Asda.
- Adequate notice must be given to the coordinator, Ideally a week, but a minimum of 48 hours.
- Initially the scheme would be open to users over 21 years of age. Users must be able to get in and out of the car and on and off the bus without assistance.

A pilot scheme will run from March to June, subject to volunteers and co-ordinators being forthcoming.



#### **View from Views**

I hope all the festivities went well for all our readers and that now all the mince pies are eaten, (not in our house as they are no favorite of mine), and you are all keeping to your "New Year's resolutions".

As I reflect on 2018 my mind turns first to Brexit, we should all know more about it by the time this is read, (maybe not!!) at the moment it is still a worry as to know which way



we are going. The farming year has had its ups and downs but on the whole quite a respectable outcome, enhanced by the fall in the value of the pound making our commodities worth that bit more. And this was followed by an almost text book Autumn I hesitate to actually say it has been perfect but certainly suited our farm. In the last few days of November it started to rain and although not a great deal it seems to have made the land exceptionally wet and water logged. What is of great concern is the mounting pressure being put on us, both in the media and physically, by misinformed pressure groups, making spurious remarks about what and what not, we ought to be doing, but worse than that actually in certain circumstances taking violent action. Then there are conflicting reports about Agricultures carbon emissions, one says we must keep less livestock, then another (a report early December) says that in order to save our soils we must have more grassland and feed livestock so where do we go? Of course the Vegan lobby are making great play on the side of the great contribution we are making to Global Warming thus skewing the argument. I must make it clear that it is the rearing of livestock in yards, or feed lots, like in America, that have this great effect on Global emissions not the grass fed ones, that is why we have to be concerned a little in the free trade that David Davis is pushing for, with America as they will insist that we import their food.

Then for us here is the debate where is the Ox-Cam Expressway going to go? Which corridor, and do we need it? With the state of the traffic and lack of local public transport this can only get worse, and of course we need it as we are pushed further and further into our own transport. There is much talk locally about road improvements, seems Watlington is to get a bypass, A40 to be improved yet again, but no mention of Little Milton which also needs a bypass. Any improvements I suspect will be piecemeal, as before, and after spending millions with no real improvement when finished. Fancy coming from Witney to the Pear Tree Roundabout having to go via the Wolvercote Roundabout, and this is after at least 3 improvement schemes which have cost millions to no real effect Then the development we will have to put up with 100,000 new homes in that corridor. This we are told is to provide more employment in this area, surely if it is employment we need to encourage then this logically should be in the north where the unemployment is high. If we carry on in this vain as some have already mentioned we will end up with very little of our green and pleasant land left for tourists to come and see.

Comments I have made with reference to lobbying or protesting, about this or that road, or development are being confirmed in letters I have read and articles in the media, where correspondents despair that the authorities take no notice, and blithely go on with their pet scheme whether we like it or not. Local plans were supposed to give us more power, but it seems that if they are not liked we have to alter them. Then alarmingly I read in the paper that and I quote "The company behind the HS2 is gaging local authorities with Non-Disclosure Agreements that keep local residents in the dark".

However it is not all doom and gloom in the Great Milton archipelago, loads of small farmland birds seem to think this is the place to be, as I have said before I am not sure exactly what they are but I think a mix of finches, Chaff', Gold, and Green',

Yellow Hammers, Sparrows, Great and Blue Tits, Corn Buntings, and recently the Field fares seem to have arrived. It also appears that the Deer population has suddenly more than doubled, we usually notice about 3 or 4 about but the other day another 7 were sighted, there are pluses and minuses with Deer, but non-the-less nice to see. Still very few Hares which is very sad, I have read that they are now succumbing to a form of Myxamtosiss. I think it is more likely the effect of Hare coursing, as on farms where this is a problem, it would not surprise me if the owners are controlling them themselves to deter the coursers, actually here we have luckily not had a big problem.

I have recently learned that the Wheatley surgery is offering its patience's an online service, so that patients can book appointments, request repeat prescriptions, and have access to their medical records. It seems to me this is a great step forward which will hopefully enhance the already good service we get from our surgery, and help the NHS in cutting costs. The only problem is for those of us who are not too conversant with the internet, is that it is something else old brains have to get round.

Dreaming of a green Christmas? Residents are being given some simple tips by Oxfordshire County Council to help reduce the environmental impact of festive waste.

Christmas is a busy time for Oxfordshire's bins – residents generate nearly 2,500 extra tonnes of waste over the festive period – that's the same weight as 400 elephants... or around 25,000 reindeers!

Oxfordshire County Council provides services that enhance quality of life in the community and protects the local environment.

Its Waste Recycling team works on initiatives to reduce waste and encourages

recycling. It manages the treatment and processing of household waste collected by district councils. Oxfordshire has seven Household Waste Recycling Centres (HWRCs):

Alkerton household waste recycling centre Stratford Road, Alkerton, Near Banbury, OX15 6HZ

Ardley Fields household waste recycling centre Brackley Road, Ardley, OX27 7PH

Dix Pit household waste recycling centre Linch Hill, Stanton Harcourt, OX29 5BB (Postcode for Sat Nav - OX29 5UX)

Drayton household waste recycling centre Steventon Road, Drayton, Near Abingdon, OX14 4LA

Oakley Wood household waste recycling centre Old Icknield Way, Crowmarsh, Near Wallingford, OX10 6PW

Redbridge household waste recycling centre Old Abingdon Road, Oxford, OX1 4XG

Stanford in the Vale household waste recycling centre Faringdon Road, Stanford in the Vale, Faringdon, SN7 8L

From turkey to sprouts, the county council encourages residents to put anything that can't be eaten into their food caddy for recycling.

Bones, dairy products, vegetable peelings and all other cooked and uncooked food can be recycled; used to generate electricity for 9,000 homes and fertiliser for local farms.

Unwanted presents can also be given a new home through the county council's Reuse scheme at all the Household Waste Recycling Centres (HWRC). This includes the newly launched scheme at Dix Pit, near Witney. Before placing reusable items into the skips, speak to a member of staff for advice.

Oxfordshire County Council's top-tips, to help reduce waste and recycle more during the festive period, are part of its Thriving Communities initiative. They include:

Buying charity gifts or vouchers for events or experiences. They come without any packaging.

- Buying your new outfit for a Christmas party from a charity shop, and returning it afterwards. This will save you money, you'll be supporting a good cause, and avoid the need to throw away a garment you might never wear again.
- Many shop-bought decorations come with lots of non-recyclable packing and will have travelled thousands of miles. Why not make your own? There are plenty of online tips for anyone who isn't an arty-type.
- Home-made cards and presents are much more personal, so keep the Christmas ribbons, paper and cards you receive this year and re-use them next year as gift tags, or make them into cards again.
- Look out for Christmas trees that can be replanted, but if yours can't, take it to any recycling centre so it can be composted.
- Artificial Christmas trees that need a new home can be donated to a charity shop, or if no longer in good condition, can be taken to a Household Waste Recycling Centre.
- If your recycling bin is struggling to cope with all the extra bottles, cardboard, plastic and paper, put any that can't fit into the bin in a clear plastic sack or cardboard box. Place it next to your bin on collection day.

Don't forget that your bin collection day might change due to the bank holidays. Check with your district council to make sure you don't miss it!

The HWRCs will close at 3pm on Christmas Eve and New Year's Eve and be closed on Christmas Day, Boxing Day and New Year's Day. Otherwise they will be open as normal from 8am-5pm.

Becky Kenton-Lake, from Oxfordshire County Council's Waste Recycling team, said:

"More and more people tell us they are planning to have a 'greener' Christmas this year, so we hope these tips will be useful and help to reduce the huge amount of extra waste generated during the festive period.

"Reducing how much we throw away and recycling food that can't be eaten are some of the easiest things we can all do to help the environment."
