#### Draft parish notes

Apologies were received from Cllrs S. Harrod, C. Deacon and G. Bennet. The minutes of the Parish Council meeting held on Monday 20th November were signed and approved as an accurate record.

It was noted that Ian Melton has updated the property list and map on the parish noticeboard near the shop.

#### **Planning Applications**

The following planning applications received from SODC were considered:

P17/S4227/O: Land on the South Side of London Road Adjacent to 'Great Expectations', Milton Common. Erection of up to eight dwellings with associated access, parking and amenity space. Consultation with neighbours has yielded a variety of views on this site, but most were keen to see housing built at this location. It was RESOLVED that the Parish Council held no strong views on this application.

P17/S4021/HH: The Annexe at Sands Cottage Stadhampton Road Great Milton OXFORD OX44 7PE. Extension to The Annexe at Sands Cottage, and internal remodel of Sands Cottage.Consultation with neighbours has yielded no objections to this proposal. It was RESOLVED to recommend approval of this application.

The following planning decisions have been received:

South Oxfordshire District Council hereby gives notice that consent is GRANTED for the execution of the works referred to below:

P17/S3081/FUL (Crofts Furlong Farm Lower End Great Milton OX44 7NJ)

Amendment to Full Application: construction of private tennis court (as amended by drawing P20A which has moved the tennis court away from the hedge).

No further comments were received on this application.

P17/S3180/CC (Oxfordshire County Council Ref.R3.0064/17: Great Milton C of E Primary School, High Street, Great Milton, Oxford, Oxfordshire, OX44 7NT).

Demolition of an existing one and a half classroom prefabricated modular building and the installation of a two classroom prefabricated modular building, to include drainage and creation of fire appliance hard-standing access where the existing prefabricated modular building.

Following the award of planning permission for the proposed development, Cllr Bill Fox has contacted the County Council to remind them that leases need to be in place before further progress can be made. The land pertaining to the application is defined as 'school playing field': a 'change of use' application is therefore required. Cllr Fox has authorised the County Council to submit a change of use application on behalf of the Parish Council: further news is expected early in 2018.

#### **Financial Resolutions**

Cllr Steve Harrod. Reimbursement for purchase of Community Christmas Tree: £50

#### Budget for 2018-19

The final draft budget was discussed in detail. Expenses totalled £19,530, an increase of 3.9% compared with the previous year. Income from sources other than the precept was £2,540 compared with £4,970 in the previous year while the precept was forecast to rise 5.6% to £16,990. It was noted that the General Reserve stood at approximately £17,000. It was agreed that this level of reserves was reasonable and should be maintained. After discussion it was RESOLVED that the draft budget for 2018-19 be accepted and approved.

#### Precept for 2018-19

In the light of the agreed budget for 2018-19 and after discussion it was RESOLVED that the precept for 2018-19 be set at £16,990.

A full bank reconciliation was received and approved. It was noted by the Clerk that the bank statements relating to the reconciliation should be presented for signature each month. The bank balance as at 5 December was  $\pounds 24,760.28$ .

#### Parish Clerk and Councillors' update of matters in hand

The Transparency Fund grant has funded purchase of a Parish Council laptop.

However 'Office' programs are required. It was RESOLVED to authorise the Clerk to investigate upgrading the Parish Council's BT subscription from £6 per month to £9 a month, to include access to Office programs which are not currently included in the subscription.

#### Village maintenance.

Thanks were expressed to the property owner for cutting back overhanging branches opposite Priory Bank. It was RESOLVED to accept the quotation received from Green and Growing for various small jobs around the village, and to additionally request a costing to remove the collapsed ivy on the footpath between The Green and Fullers' Field.

Proposed fencing at Milton Common (opposite SVS). Oxfordshire County Council

is yet to comment on the proposed addition of fencing at this location: additionally no quote has yet been received from the village handyman for this work.

Lower End footpath (refurbishment of bridge across brook by landowner). It was RESOLVED to defer further consideration of this item to the January meeting of the Parish Council.

Those present at the meeting expressed disappointment at Red Rose Travel's decision not to divert service 275 via Great Milton, though its consideration of the Parish Council's suggestion was appreciated. In the absence of further obvious opportunities to restore bus services to the village it was RESOLVED to await the outcome of a meeting proposed by Oxfordshire County Council's Cabinet Member for Transport to discuss rural public transport.

Thanks were expressed to the Chairman of the Parish Council for his response on its behalf on SODC's Local Plan 2033.

The village's postal delivery arrangements may be reviewed. The Great Milton round may be split in two, with one half of the village being included in the Great Haseley round, and the other half in the Cuddesdon round. Ian Melton reported that the current village postman is pessimistic that input from the Parish Council will influence Royal Mail's decision: additionally the Post Office and Royal Mail are separate entities so no intervention is possible from the village's post office. It was agreed that a single round covering Great Milton is preferable and more logical than a split round, and it was RESOLVED to lobby Royal Mail once the correct person to write to has been identified.

Salt supplies for the village have been deposited in a single location (The Old Garage). It was RESOLVED that the Clerk will investigate the possibility of supplies being delivered to locations adjacent to the salt bins in future, and to look to move some salt from the Old Garage to the salt bins now.

Councillor Harris reported that 360 copies of the Bulletin are currently printed. The only fixed cost is a £50 editing fee: other costs are determined by the number of sheets that need to be printed. It was RESOLVED to reduce the number of copies printed but with no decision yet on whether distribution of the Bulletin will continue on a selective basis or whether copies will be solely available in the village shop.

It was RESOLVED to agree a proposed increase in the Clerk's salary from SCP16 (£9.054 per hour) to SCP19 (£9.743 per hour) to reflect previous experience in local government that is proving beneficial to the role.

#### 'DRY' – A Human Story Theatre Production

DRY by Oxfordshire playwright Gaye Poole is a new one hour drama about parenting, disappointment and middle-aged drinking.

The Wilsons may be middle class and middle aged but there is nothing middling about their alcohol intake. Can they keep the 'toxic' out of 'intoxicated' and keep the family together, or is it a case of sorrows drowned?

Hot off the heels of becoming a charity, Human Story Theatre are launching their latest play DRY in January. After two successful productions earlier this year, Flat 73 (supported by the Samaritans) and The Fourth Dog (supported by Against Breast Cancer and Maggie's), Oxford-based Human Story Theatre are premiering DRY at Arts at the Old Fire Station, Oxford, in January, and then touring Oxfordshire and beyond for 'Dry January' 2018. Venues include village halls, community centres, village pavilions and libraries as well as theatres. Human Story Theatre are continuing their 'pop up' small space approach and tickets at non-theatre spaces are 'pay what you can'.

Commissioned by the NHS to write a play about alcoholism, DRY is a one-hour play with music about parenting, disappointment and middle-aged drinking. Written by Human Story Theatre's Gaye Poole, music composed by Arne Richards (Oxford Concert Party - Flat 73) and directed by Anna Tolputt. Cast: Bryonie Pritchard, Paul Ansdell and cellist Rachel Watson.

DRY is supported by Turning Point who deliver the Oxfordshire Road to Recovery service for people who want to make positive change in their lives, and other local counseling services. Like with all Human Story Theatre productions there will be a Q&A after each show with guest professionals from Turning Point and other organisations to discuss the issues dealt with in the play and the impact of alcohol on our communities, as well as to signpost people to services.



#### **View from Views**

Another year! I cannot believe how quickly it's another one, anyway again I would like to wish all readers a very happy one, I also hope that you had the sort of Christmas we all look forward to. Last year as I have said many times before or at least eluded to, was really a non-event in our area being short of rain and sun would apply to the whole year, the rainfall I recorded shows that we are well below average



taken over the whole year, except for the snow in December and the following days rain amounted to some 28mm over an inch, I just hope that this short and sweet cold snap is not all the winter we will get. On a brighter note our crops look on the whole very well having had almost perfect weather since planting, in spite of the inclement weather early in December.

I would like to illustrate one of the minutia regarding our annual subsidy claim that we have been battling to sort out with the "Rural Payments Agency", this is the fact that the aerial photos have picked up one of our cattle pens in a grazing filed. This does not comply with our grazing area, so this area has to be measured and deducted, I guess an area of some 40 square meters which has grass on it and is actually grazed as the cattle can have access to it. This anomaly only picked up in the run up to the payment date now has to be resolved before any payment is considered. How petty can you get this pen has been there at least 20 years.

I am pleased to say the Barn Owls are still about down by Cuddesdon Mill, and I think I heard a short eared Owl during the night in late November, otherwise so far this season there seems to be plenty of the usual birds about. At the moment we here have a problem in the garden with feeding the small birds, as we have a family of rats about taking the food, and us humans being reluctant to feed the rats instead of the birds, one day we will win the battle, either with a bang, the snap of a spring or poison. Pigeons are certainly flourishing on the Rape now especially after the snow.

Here on the farm this is the time of year when very little can be done on the land that our thoughts turn to maintenance, such jobs as Hedging and Ditching not that we have many Ditches on Views Farm. Also it is time to take stock and make plans for the future, one such plan, or decision, is as most will by now know that sadly we have decided to give up the Chickens (no more Views Farm Eggs). The main reason for this being that we had always felt that this would make a nice little part-time job for someone and that once we had got it up and running we could hand it over, but in reality that person did not materialise. We tried to make a go of it ourselves but

with the pressures of the rest of our business activities it was not getting the attention needed. It is especially sad to the whole family, as it was a small enterprise that we had set up providing our locals something that they really liked!

Just lately it has been heartening to see that the question of plastic waste has taken a much higher profile in the media, and as I write there is an international conference on the matter taking place in Kenya. Takes an African country to show us all up, at the same time it is depressing to read that from March onwards the Chinese are going to be more selective in what of our rubbish they take, this seems a bit odd that we as a country, who are supposed to be so advanced in technology that we have to send our rubbish half way round the world to get rid of it. This is only a matter building some more incinerators like the one at Ardly which will solve several problems, getting rid of plastics and generating more energy. Whilst on the subject I read with interest Trevor Ford's letter in the last issue of the Great Milton Bulletin, re fly tipping, Trevor you hit the nail right on the head, my sentiments entirely.

I have mentioned several times as well as, above petty beaurocracy, how about this one, we have an incident over the bridge on the main and well used footpath from the village, which was in serious need of repair before someone got hurt, and that to leave it for the authorities to fix would have meant we would be still waiting now, with the path closed. With this in mind we decided to repair and reinstall said bridge ourselves, and then see if we could get some financial help from the public purse, seeing that it is of no benefit to us. The whole issue is complicated by the fact that it traverses a ditch which is our boundary, who is responsible for it's maintenance? I naively thought as it was a public amenity perhaps the County or Parish Councils would be prepared to support some of the costs (we are only talking £300), as it happens Roger White did give a very generous donation. The PC said no and the county informed me that actually they are responsible for all bridges on foot paths, and that they would as a matter of their responsibility but as this path is not in the right place according to the official map, (it has been there for the 45 years) and that the path would have to be altered they would then put in another bridge, not sure of the economics of this at times when we are cutting so many council services. So now we are faced with the expense of having the map changed, or the county putting in a new bridge and realigning the path either way a cost considerably greater than a small donation to help us defray the costs. Silly me – I should have kept my mouth shut!

#### Waste has never Bin so easy with a New Smartphone App

Waste collection information is now just a screen tap away in South Oxfordshire and the Vale of White Horse. The two district councils have launched a brand-new smartphone app, which is available free of charge for iPhone and Android phones right now. The app is called Binzone – by simply tapping their postcode in and selecting their address, residents can find out which bin is being emptied this week, and what day it's being emptied.

The app will also send users a notification if their waste collection day changes due to a bank holiday – very handy for keeping track of what day bins will be emptied over the Christmas period.

It will also let residents know if collections are disrupted by snow or icy conditions.

That's not all though – residents can also use Binzone to look up what bin their rubbish goes in. Ever been confused as to what bin an empty aerosol can goes in? Not any more – residents can simply search for it in Binzone and find out. It's the green recycling wheelie bin, by the way.

Councillor Charlotte Dickson, cabinet member for waste at the Vale of White Horse District Council, said, "The app is so easy to navigate and will save residents time by having all the information needed right at their fingertips, especially the changes to collection days around bank holidays."

Councillor Tony Harbour, cabinet member for waste at South Oxfordshire District Council said, "If the weather worsens again this winter I think the Binzone app will come into its own by keeping our residents informed on what is happening to their collections. It is very handy to have the information in one place."

Binzone is available to download free of charge on the iPhone Appstore and the Google Play Store.

As the nights get colder and darker, the chances of severe weather increase. Storms, floods and other extreme conditions can cause damage to network infrastructure and disrupt your energy supply.

To Be Winter Ready, you should:

• Know your free emergency numbers – in a power cut dial 105 or, for a gas emergency, dial 0800 111999.

• Prepare your home – keep a torch handy and get your appliances serviced by a Gas Safe registered engineer to prevent carbon monoxide poisoning. Vulnerable households can get extra support by signing up to the Priority Services Register. Contact your gas or electricity network to find out more. Visit www.energynetworks.org to find out who your network operator is.

• Keep your eyes open – keep an eye on the weather forecast and, if you have a power cut or a gas emergency, check on your neighbours.

In recent years the chances of unplanned problems with electricity and gas supply have reduced dramatically. Since 1990, network companies have invested £80bn in improving the reliability of local energy networks in the UK. As a result, on average, electricity customers have a power cut just once every two years and gas distribution customers will have their gas supply interrupted without advance notice just once every 40 years.

Despite this, our gas and electricity networks can be affected by natural events, with severe winter weather potentially causing significant damage. The gas and electricity network operators are urging the public to Be Winter Ready. Make sure you're prepared in case you have a power cut or gas emergency.

#### **Great Haseley and District Horticultural Society**

The arrival of snow more than a week ago was a delight for many, particularly as it came at the weekend. It was certainly earlier than we usually have snow and the cold weather has meant the resulting ice has hung around for a long time. I was talking to one of the society's previous chairmen the other day and he commented that he thought the snow 'heavy' and I agree that, for the amount that fell, the snow has caused a lot more damage in our garden than I would have expected. I think the main

problem was that it fell at night so that by the time it was light the damage was done.

A number of evergreen shrubs were bent to the ground, as you would expect, and despite brushing the snow off, recovery was only partial. My tallest Daphne 'Jacqueline Postil', which is around 10 feet tall and covered in buds already showing colour, is now bent right over the narrow path it is growing by; we will allow it to flower and then it will need a major prune. Pruning of Daphnes is renowned to cause death and indeed Daphne 'Everlasting Fragrance' seems to get sick and die following pruning. However, we have a number of plants of this variety and all but this one have been pruned without incident so we will go ahead confidently. We also have an established Rhamnus alaternus 'Argenteovariegata' which was also about 10 feet tall and beautifully shaped; it is now bent right over and will probably not look so good after the necessary pruning which will have to take place.

Our most difficult problem is the Italian Cypresses which are now tall enough to be well out of reach. Unfortunately, the snow has splayed the tops out and they don't look nearly so good now. Maybe it will be time for a change. Death in the garden is always an opportunity to try something new. I buy very few plants these days and mostly acquire new ones from other gardeners and various village fetes. You will find gardeners are generous people with their plants. I know I cannot resist potting up bits and pieces so I always have new plants on the go.

I have to admit there are still bulbs in the shed awaiting planting. When I have a free moment after the soil has thawed I will get started. They should be fine. Much to my surprise I have just had Anemone coronaria, which I planted as corms to flower for our daughter's wedding (they didn't!), flowering as well as a small yellow day lily. Gardens are full of surprises!

On a final note, the moles were busy putting up hills while the snow was on the ground. Is there no end to this?


