

Draft Parish Notes

Present at the meeting of Great Milton Parish Council held on Monday 23 July 2018 were Cllrs. S Harrod (Chairman), W Fox, P Allen, G Harris, G Bennet and C Deacon, with Tim Darch (Clerk) and 3 members of the public also in attendance. Apologies were received in advance from Cllr P Fewell.

The monthly County Council report and OCC Highways update were received by the Parish Council.

The minutes of the meeting of the Parish Council held on Monday 18th June 2018 were signed and agreed as an accurate record of proceedings.

General correspondence and public discussion

A letter from a resident to John Howell MP on the subject of bus services was recirculated to the Parish Council, along with Mr Howell's response. Cllr Harrod stated that the County Council has had to make some difficult decisions based on financial restrictions, including the complete removal of bus subsidies. Attempts

to provide public transport for the village by Heyfordian Travel (with a limited commercially-operated 103 service) and the Parish Council (with a Wednesday-only Comet service) had not succeeded due to limited use, and unfortunately there is little that the Parish or County Council can do to force the issue. It was suggested that the Managing Directors of Stagecoach in Oxfordshire and Oxford Bus Company/Thames Travel were contacted to seek their views on any potential provision.

The Parish Council was reminded by a resident that the County Council had suggested that the road markings on The Green would be repainted in the warmer months. The Parish Clerk will pursue this.

Concerns have been raised about HGV movements in the vicinity of The Yard on Thame Road, which may have contributed towards recent damage to the road surface in the area. It was agreed to discuss this matter in detail at the next meeting of the Parish Council in September.

Planning applications

The following planning applications received from SODC were considered:

P18/S2182/FUL (Welcome Break Oxford, Thame Road, Waterstock). Extension to existing HGV park and associated works.

It was noted that the additional spaces proposed by this application may remove HGVs from the lay-bys on the A418 between the A40 and M40, near the Services. The Parish Council decided that it FULLY SUPPORTED the application as submitted.

No planning decisions have been received since the meeting on June 18th.

Financial resolutions

The following cheques were signed and authorised for payment:

Tim Darch. Salary, Tax and Expenses. £426.43.

Green and Growing. Grass cutting July. £1002.00.

SODC. Dog Bin emptying. £65.48.

BT. Transfer of phonebox ownership. £1.

A full bank reconciliation was received along with the monthly accounts, and the Parish Council's bank statements were signed. The bank balance as at 21 July was £27,004.97.

The Exercise of Public Rights period (4 June to 13 July 2018) for the Council's AGAR return has concluded. No requests to view the accounts were received during this period.

The Santander Business Account has been closed, and the final balance of £10,207.19 transferred to the Lloyds Bank current account.

Update of village matters

Recent issues with mowing have been referred to the contractor, who has taken

comments received relating to the quality of work on board. An improvement in the quality of mowing has been noted this month.

Corners on Chilworth Lane where visibility was compromised by verge growth have been mown. An offer has been received from a local resident to either fund or arrange the mowing of verges on Chilworth Lane from Spring 2019: this offer was noted by the Parish Council and further discussions will be held.

The contract for the transfer of ownership of the telephone box from BT to the Parish Council was signed at the meeting.

A resident of Lower End has noted that vehicles are parking routinely in the bus stop, even though the bus stop is still in use by school buses. The Parish Council has referred to OCC about possible enforcement action, but their position is that enforcement is difficult with no scheduled public bus service in operation. The Parish Council will place polite notices on vehicles parking at the bus stop advising owners that the stop is still in use for school transport.

Discussions continue with Oxfordshire County Council about the potential fencing-off of land at Milton Common which is used for informal parking.

The leases for the land upon which the new modular classroom will be located have been signed and completed: the classroom is now scheduled to be installed on Friday 27th July. The management arrangements for the tennis court now need to be addressed, as the current HSPA committee wishes to step down in its entirety as their children no longer attend the school. Cllr Fox will discuss the matter with the HSPA committee, the Friends of Great Milton School and the school itself to try and facilitate an agreement.

In lieu of expenses, Matthew Hale, the Council's Internal Auditor, has requested that an appropriate donation be made to the Oxford Animal Sanctuary on his behalf. Mr Hale's work took approximately one day. It was agreed to make a donation of £100.

Wheatley Park School is seeking sponsors for its Prize-giving event in October 2018. Each recipient receives a Book Token for £15, for which the school is seeking sponsorship. The Parish Council agreed to contribute £50 towards the awards.

The Parish Council wishes to express its sincere thanks to Michele Block for standing in as Parish Clerk for two weeks: this was much appreciated and as expected Michele did a sterling job.

The meeting closed at 8.30pm.

The next meeting of Great Milton Parish Council will be held on Monday 17th September starting at 7.30pm in The Pavilion. The Clerk remains available if needed during the two-month hiatus between meetings.

Ramblings from the Rectory

I am not a fan of football, I would rather watch a game of rugby. But the world cup somehow draws us all in and so yes I did watch England matches. Well played, it is indeed the beautiful game. The semi - final was excruciating and it would have been fantastic for England to have got through to the final, the first time since 1966, and yes I can remember that and the excitement, I was six at the time.

I was tempted to go to the Pub, pick up the atmosphere but I resisted, all those jocular comments to the vicar about 'putting one upstairs' for a good result. It happens at the fetes too of course, for good weather. I actually fought the temptation whilst watching the match 'Oh come on, please may England win'. Is that how prayer works? I don't think so, and anyway what about my Croatian counterpart doing the same thing? I don't think such prayer deserves the name, rather it is superstition. I wonder what Mr and Mrs Williams have done in the past when both of their daughters are facing against each other at an important tennis tournament final, maybe they root for one each! God though is not an Englishman, nor Croatian for that matter!

As I write, I have just returned from a holiday. I am the product of a generation who were fortunate to be taken on an annual two week holidays. That sadly seems to be lost on a new generation. The habit though has stuck, indeed for my own state of mind that two weeks is really important. I don't have weekends free, and no, Sunday is not the only day I work! ('How original', I say to myself whenever I hear that one, a bit like the one about influencing the Almighty for good weather at parish fetes!) Having two Sundays in a row when I don't have to deal with delivering this weeks message, normally three times on a Sunday, all in different ways as I rotate around the Churches, organise prayers and hymns is a real treat. It can be difficult to organise and find cover, I am very grateful to those who do step in to allow us parish clergy to take some time off. We had a great holiday, one week in the Lake District where we met up with our daughter Becca who is working at the YMCA lakeside on Windermere as an instructor and one week back on Ynys Mon, Anglesea, near Beaumaris where we have been going for years, drawn back time and again by those those breathtaking views of the mountains across the Menai.

We did many things but one of the stand out moments was climbing Blencathra with Becca in the evening. We set out at 7.00pm to avoid the heat of the day, this was the really hot fortnight, the roads in the Lakes were melting. We got up and down all in three hours, taking in Sharp Edge, a nice little scramble towards the top of the mountain. I felt heroic, until we met a fell runner at the top who five minutes later was hundreds of feet and a quarter of a mile below us, we timed it, it

took us fifteen minutes to walk the same. The sun was setting as we came down with the mountain silhouetted against the crimson sky, and the prospect of a cold lager (sorry real beer fans, it was really hot, only something really cold would do). I know our British mountains would look like hummocks in the Alps, but close up they are plenty big enough, too many people go abroad for their holidays but we really have world beating landscape and coast so much closer to home. Of course, betting with the weather being good can be a bit of a risk, especially in the wilder places that we love to visit. I need the high hills, and somehow have to get my annual fix. 'I will lift up mine eyes unto the hills from whence cometh my help?' the psalmist writes, and yes I will have to concede that it does read better from the old prayer book. Of course the question is answered, 'My help cometh from the Lord who have made heaven and earth.' It is not the hills that we find our help and strength from, but from God, but there is nothing like the grandeur of the mountains to stir something deep inside us, something that reminds us to reach out to the awe of God, I would like to think that the Psalmist felt that too.

The task of registering all the graves in the churchyard continues. Alan Simpson (of the Oxfordshire Family History Society) is responsible for the work and would welcome any help -10.30 am on a Wednesday morning.

It is interesting work and recently a small stone was uncovered which is the resting place of Elizabeth Stanton who died in 1685. This is the oldest outside grave found at St Mary's so far. She came from Forest Hill and married a Great Milton man, Philip Stanton. All 3 of their children were baptised in our Church.

View from Views

Last month I started by saying "who'd have thought", then referring to the time of year, now the same could apply to the long hot dry spell. Up to early in June when I last wrote the weather had been on the wetter side of normal and everything was fairly late, I also mentioned that we had managed to get our Barley planted, we then went away for a fortnight to Scotland, on return our thoughts are turning to



harvest. Whilst we travelled to Scotland it was evident it had been drier up there as the countryside got progressively browner as we drove north, however once at the tip of the country things became more normal, coats became a necessity, then when we returned in late June the tables had turned as it had been as hot as you know what since. I feel more optimistic that our crops look to be coping better this year than I would have expected, as last year the very hot weather could have come that much earlier as the crops although have suffered the heat and dry don't seem so stressed, not really sure, surprising how one forgets. Perhaps the crops this year are more robust than last due to the difficult winter, anyway we will see when we actually get to harvest, that's when reality kicks in.

I have purposely not mentioned Brexit before as I frankly do not understand it or it's implications, it seems to me that the EU is just twiddling us around it's little finger, we voted to come out surely it is nothing to do with them if we want to leave the club, it is not for them to tell us how we do it, or the terms that's our business. Unfortunately now with the PM's latest idea and the resignation of some prominent politicians it is looking more like a fudge than ever, by the EU's attitude, thus encouraging disarray

in our parliament. This to me illustrates the importance of leaving, on the down side I have just learnt that if we wish to join the WTO their rules do not allow environmental payments to farmers, which will upset all that Gove has preached.

I like many who read these pearls of wisdom am sure it important that we recycle as much of our rubbish as we can. Unfortunately it is difficult to understand, which is and is not recyclable, as many labels & advisory seem to differ or use different terminology making this extremely difficult. For example, not long ago we had milk delivered that came from the same dairy (Muller), but a slightly different brand one said "bottle plastic recyclable: cap widely recyclable", the other said "bottle plastic widely recyclable; lid check with local recycling", apart from being somewhat confusing who is going to bother to ask, whoever, whether a milk bottle top is recyclable or not, labelling must be clearer. Also why do different authorities, even within our own county, use different colour bins for different things, with different rules, we need much better information and direction to get it right, as get it right we must. I do not think it fair at the moment to criticise people for putting items in the wrong bin.

A big worry for our industry at the moment is the fact that apparently population growth is falling, in spite of what we are told, if this is the case why build so many houses? The theory is that this will cause food surpluses creating falling prices for us, which at the moment are unsustainably low, making it difficult to continue to produce the high quality food that we are able to do and expect. Add to this the amalgamation and cooperation between some of the bigger supermarkets putting even greater price pressure on to producer's returns, this again will be at the cost of lower quality. We cannot continue to produce food at ever lower prices without cutting corners to the detriment of quality, and health, of ourselves and the land/wildlife and so on. This would inevitably lead to the use of more chemicals larger units, using larger equipment clogging up our roads travelling further distances, add to this concern the fact that the new Argentinian government is encouraging their agriculture, and thus exports of beef again.

We have learned of the terrifying wild fires, in the north, mostly caused by arsonists I believe, I cannot imagine what sort of person would do such a thing. However fingers have been pointed at various people from farmers to grouse shoots for allowing the moors to get in such a condition to make them flammable. It has been pointed out on good authority that this is largely because the government listened to those with big mouths saying we need to re-wild these areas. Landowners have been stopped from controlled burning during winter months which used to be done on a rotational basis thus removing all dead flammable material. Some other areas were cleared for sheep grazing which would also have helped as fire breaks, I understand landowners who had managed the

land without this problem for hundreds of years advised against this form of action but no the conservationists knew best, the "Game and Wildlife Conservation Trust" also supports this view. This will have contributed to tremendous emission of carbon apart from damage to wildlife, and terrifying conditions for those fighting the fire.

Great Haseley and District Horticultural Society

I do hope that by the time you read this that the weather will have broken and we will be having some welcome and much-needed rain. I am old enough to remember clearly the summer of 1976 when the dry weather lasted much longer, but I was a student and had no interest in gardening in those days so it didn't really have much impact on me.

It is now several weeks since I started to cut back sad-looking plants which just were not coping with the heat and the dry soil. This is sometimes called The Hampton Court Hack after the garden show taking place around the same time. Usually this

results in some good regrowth and everything looks tidier; this year the drought has prevented regrowth. We then had 10 days away and returned to a desiccated garden, but with a fair number of plants still looking pretty good. Our pots still look great thanks to Anne and John (beyond the call of duty). I have a general policy of watering only new additions to the garden and a few favourites that need a little more water. This summer I have extended the favourites watering a bit further, but most of the garden has had no water at all and it is certainly showing. I think there are likely to be some sizeable gaps by next spring so planting opportunities will abound; there is always a plus side to everything!

The weather has encouraged pests, but also pest predators so largely there doesn't seem to be a much worse problem than usual. Our aubergine plant (we have only one in the greenhouse bed which is sufficient for us) was completely covered in aphids; there didn't seem to be a clean leaf. I do virtually no chemical spraying these days, but thought instead I would use some simple soft soap spray which works on contact. However, life got in the way and by the time I got around to doing it, the plant was covered in ladybird larvae which are large scary-looking creatures which do not resemble ladybirds other than in colour. They have a voracious appetite for aphids and the plant was clean. It is now producing an amazing quantity of aubergines which have a much better flavour than shop bought ones. You just need to be patient in most cases as ladybirds and other predators (including wasps which love aphids until they turn to sugar in late summer) will usually show up in time. The other pest which is enjoying the heat is red spider mite which is hard to spot until the plant becomes speckled and looks sick; by then webs can be seen particularly around the shoots of plants. This is usually a problem in greenhouses, but I can see it is affecting a couple of Salvias deep in the border. I can't do much about it other than spray with water which the mites do not like. In the greenhouse, you could use a predator which you can buy online, but that is not practical out in the open.

I'm sure that, like ours, your lawn is straw coloured and looks dead; there is no need to worry, with the first good rain regrowth will begin and all will be well. You certainly do not need to water it and in rapidly approaching water shortages this would be antisocial. The weeds in the lawn are now very visible so I do intend to use a spot weed killer on dandelions as it is easy to use very small amounts when everything is so clear. We don't ever 'feed'n'weed' our lawn which is simply mown field as that just results in more mowing and my other half has plenty of that already! Also, I like having daisies and other wild flowers appearing between cuts. Just enjoy the luxury of not mowing while it lasts.

Keep watering to a minimum concentrating on pots, which will add colour

to the desert, and your fruit and vegetables. Enjoy your harvest.



John Howell MP writes...

At this holiday time, when many people are flying off for a well-earned break it seems a good time to write about airplane issues which are often raised with me. Many people in the constituency make their living from aviation either by flying as air crew, by travelling themselves or by working in support functions in and around Heathrow and the other major airports. There is a balance to be struck. Whenever I go to Heathrow to fly with my job I invariably meet constituents.

From time to time I receive emails complaining about aircraft noise over the constituency. In the south-east corner of the constituency the complaints are usually about air traffic from the major airports. Wind direction plays a key part in this as when Heathrow is on 'easterly' operations planes come in to land over the constituency. Also at busy times planes can circle in a holding pattern and the turning increases the noise at ground level. In addition, in the holiday season there seems to be an increase in planes from Luton making their ascent over the constituency. Over the years I have raised these issues with NATS, the UKs leading air traffic control service and I have done so again recently. NATS acknowledge the issues but confirm that there has not been any particular change that would have increased these issues recently. I continue to be in touch with them.

The issue of a third runway has been a hot topic too, as indeed are all national major infrastructure projects. There are, of course, many factors to consider. One issue that I wanted to look at is how the provision of a third runway would take away the need for stacking of planes waiting to land in holding patterns. Stacking creates pollution and noise as aircraft circle in wait. I expect a third runway to do away with stacking so planes will be able to land straight away. It is also important to see local communities brought in to the debate to discuss these and other issues.

In other parts of the constituency I receive complaints on light pleasure aircraft practising their acrobatics over and over. This can create a noise nuisance as they circle round in the same airspace. We sit between the restricted airspace around Heathrow and Oxford airports, and in this unrestricted space this activity is permitted. Some constituents complain of the nuisance caused to a large number of people. I acknowledge that this is a problem and also that some people want somewhere to do this leisure activity. I am also aware that Oxford Airport would like to increase the restricted space around it which would narrow the free corridor and could potentially make this issue worse.

There is a European wide review of use of airspace which we should aim to participate in to ensure that our needs and views are taken into account. We also need to

be heard as the project for the new runway develops to ensure that mitigation factors affect us in a positive way. Both of these are processes I have already started to be involved in, including within the House of Commons by asking questions of the Secretary of State himself. These issues will be on the agenda for some time and I would be interested to know the views of constituents on them. 

Always question unsolicited requests for your personal or financial information in case it's a scam. Never automatically click on a link in an unexpected email or text.



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
