Apologies were received from Cllrs C Deacon and G Bennet. Tim Darch (Clerk) was in attendance.

After a unanimous vote Councillor Steve Harrod was elected unopposed as Chair of Great Milton Parish Council for the coming year, and duly signed the Declaration of Acceptance of Office.

After a unanimous vote Councillor Bill Fox was elected unopposed as Vice-Chair of Great Milton Parish Council for the coming year, and duly signed the Declaration of Acceptance of Office.

The memberships of the various committees and other bodies affiliated to the Parish Council were reviewed and any changes noted. There were no comments or issues raised.

Business was conducted in the order determined by the agenda. No declarations of interest were received in matters on the agenda.

No reports or updates were provided by the County Councillor, and no correspondence had been received since the previous meeting.

Proposed alterations to the existing rear extension, the intended proposed works are: a new side dormer window to the rear extension together with first floor bathroom wall replacement and refurbishment to first floor bathrooms and a new rear roof light to the main roof. Replacement of non-original side and rear casement windows and doors. Permission has been GRANTED for the development proposal described above.

P21/S0482/FUL (Lynday Thame Road Great Milton OX44 7NY). Change of use of existing dining room to a hair salon. Permission has been GRANTED for the development proposal described above.

### **Rector's Pint**

I love wild places; I am not alone in this of course.

Eleven years ago, I was privileged to take a three-month sabbatical, a time of refreshment and recovery after many years of sustained ministry. I couldn't believe what I managed to pull off; a spiritual tour of England, Wales and Scotland, and all on a newly-bought, but very second-hand motorbike, after I had taken a break from biking for a few years.

Apart from my time alone, I visited Christian communities; a bikers' church in Swansea and a monastery in Southern Scotland. I spent time with an Orthodox Priest I know in Lincolnshire who has converted his garage into an Orthodox church!

I called the whole thing 'Revved up Britain'! Looking back, I see I headed to wilder

places, North Devon, the North Norfolk coast, South Wales, and Anglesey, and the whole thing was crowned with a trip to Northumbria and into Scotland, through the Cairngorms, and up to Torridon. The trip ended with a visit to Mull and across to Iona before the long ride home, over three days, to a very tame Buckinghamshire! There is so much I could recollect, alas I do not have the space to do any of it here.

I know of course that in Britain, our wildernesses are not really wilderness, the hand of man is everywhere. But standing all on my own, on the top of a lesser-known mountain with an un-pronounceable name, a near - Munro (only a few feet short of 3000 ft), with no other evident human presence in any direction, it felt wild enough!

May saw us celebrating Pentecost, and with it the beginning of a cautious return to our churches. I do wonder though; do we try to tame the Spirit of God? the Pentecost account is really pretty wild! A sound from heaven like a rushing mighty wind and tongues as of fire - that doesn't happen every day. God is unpredictable, Jesus pointed out that the wind blows where it chooses - "So it is the same with the Spirit" (John 3: 8). This last year has forced us to adapt to the unpredictable, at times it has felt like a bit of a wild ride. I have really enjoyed putting together and hosting our zoom services, even with their moments of unpredictability. I have loved the spirit that has actually brought many of us together, even when we have had to be apart, and that it has really mattered that we carry on, that we did something to be together however we could.

I fear that we may lose that spirit, as once again we return to our three separate churches and become comfortably parochially minded and inward-looking. This pandemic has forced us out of our churches to follow the lead of the Spirit, I believe into a more united place. We now need to make sure that we don't force the Spirit back inside!

I think that I might need another wilderness experience... Simon

### **Road Closure**

### Lower End/Sworford Lane, Monday 21st to Wednesday 23rd June

A short stretch of Lower End/Sworford Lane will be closed for road repairs from Monday 21 June. The closure is expected to last one day subject to no unforeseen issues, but could extend to 23 June.

The closure will prevent access in and out of the village from the Wheatley direction, though access will be maintained for emergency service vehicles. The official diversionary route is via Windmill Hill, A329, Church Road, The Green and Lower End. The Forties will also be closed (except for residential access) to eliminate any potential issues that may result from unsuitable levels of additional traffic.

Many parents travelling from outside the village to Great Milton School will need to turn their vehicles and leave in the direction from which they arrived. The number of vehicles needing to perform this manoeuvre at the same time may cause some issues, but the Parish Council will liaise with representatives of the school to try and ensure that this takes place as safely as possible and with the minimum of disruption.

### Darjeeling Children's Trust

Great Milton, Little Milton and Great/Little Haseley Benefice's major role in funding oxygen concentrators in Darjeeling, India

Some of you will know that I am a trustee of the Darjeeling Children's Trust. A few weeks ago the Trustees had a desperate plea from residents and the Edward Foundation in Darjeeling for help with funding oxygen concentrators (so as not to have to rely on oxygen tanks) to help treat covid patients. It is a 3 hour journey down the mountain to replenish oxygen tanks and the monsoons with the accompanying landslides were further hampering this. They were desperate. Our charity offered to set up crowdfunding with a target of raising £10,000 to fund oxygen concentrators.

I shared this at our Benefice service and the response was astonishing. We met our target in just a few days and we have been amazed by the support we received. We have purchased 10 concentrators and they are already in use in Darjeeling. I believe that our Benefice funded approximately 3/4 of these. ### **View from Views**

In the last months I have mentioned that Hares seem to be on the increase, now I can say with confidence there are more than I thought having seen 5 all at once, this is good news as there will be others, I have also been told this is the case on other farms. The Blue Tits that have taken up residence in our newly located nest



box, must have bred quite a number of young judging by the comings and goings early in the mornings, not sure how other birds will have fared with the advent of wetter weather, these heavy storms will not be good for little ones. Another bonus for us are Grey or English Partridge, a species that is struggling to survive, in spite of all our efforts over the last few years we have never been able to see an increase. However now there are pairs all over the farm which to me is an indication that at last they seem to be breeding in useful numbers. This can be due to our grass margins providing the food they need, fingers crossed they are not found by the resident Foxes or Kites, or the wet .

The Winter Barley now in ear, where it is a good plant it has moved very fast in spite of the weather, like all plants/crops it has been suffering from cold rather than moisture, has certainly now perked up after the rain and slightly warmer weather. However I think that the diagnosis of BYVD is probably the cause of the lack of plants and backward growth, this presents us with a problem as it is usually caused by a carryover from the previous crop, on the green material residues referred to as a "green bridge". We have not encountered this problem as we have not followed Barley with Barley, especially winter after Spring Barley, due to the fact that Winter Barley comes to harvest at least a month before Spring Barley, (so there is less time between harvest and planting the next crop), in reality can happen in any situation where there is a chance that the Aphid can be carried over from a previous crop. I mention

this as it possess one of those awkward questions, "do we or don't we", and either way it could be wrong. We are being encouraged, not to plough or cultivate, as this releases carbon in to the atmosphere, so how do we control this green, do we spray with Glyphosate, which will kill this green bridge but is likely to be banned for health reasons, or do we cultivate.

A lot have been saying that it is lack of moisture that is causing this late spring which is at least 2 to 3 weeks late, I personally think it is the cold as immediately we had warmer days and nights without frost things began to grow. Just to follow on from my TV interview the soiled grass from the winter's flooding, was still showing up to about the 10th May, and by the 16th may it was fairly evident that there was little chance that the 17 acres of River Meadows would not be worth grazing, at least not with anything like the livestock we would normally feed, meaning that other grass fields will have to be more heavily fertilised to compensate for this lost area, thus adding to possible pollution.

I gather that HS2 is beginning to tunnel under the Chilterns, I have great concerns this will upset the natural water courses with some streams and springs drying up. (on the day that this was announced this caption appeared by a picture in the daily press "Responding to reports that the eastern branch of the HS2, which would connect Leeds to London, is at risk of being axed, Dr Richard Wellings head of transport at the Institute of Economic Affairs, said the whole HS2 scheme is a vanity project which makes no sense from an economic perspective") Never mind the construction teams have mitigated this by planting THOUSANDS OF TREES! How this is going to help I don't know, but of course they know best. As usual Government policy to bulldoze through everything has to be right! like all the housing, planning laws, and many other issues that are wrecking or country and countryside without a second thought.

This Year we are planning if allowed to run the "Chilton Vintage Tractor Run" in aid of the "Thames Valley Air Ambulance", on the 4th July, I hope as many of you as in the past, whether or not we are able to make the run, support me in raising funds for this invaluable cause. Although cancelled last year due to corvid, I still managed to collect over £1,000 through the generosity of readers and others for which they were eternally grateful. Just a comment on Covid we learn that the Indian variant is a worry, "why oh why"! are we still allowing travel from that country????

### **New Voices in Oxfordshire**

A cheating government minister, an abandoned wife and a scheming press agent who turns on his boss: Sound familiar? Any similarity is entirely intentional. These are all characters in @emele, a comic opera by Wheatley-based composer Roger Simmonds.

@emele is the first production by Oxfordshire Contemporary Opera, a new charity formed to provide a platform for new work combining young professional talent and community involvement in the county. The show will receive its world premiere in July with a stellar professional cast, including Jessica Wise, Naomi Rogers and bass Aidan Smith who plays the boosterish, philandering politico.

@emele is a contemporary satirical twist on Handel's opera Semele. In this light-hearted comedy, the heroine is an Instagram influencer and her lover, Jupiter, is in disguise as a government minister who aims to be 'King of the world'. His vengeful wife is Juno and Mercury, the messenger God, becomes a Cummings-esque figure who twists the press and public opinion. Comedy, plotting and intrigue abound until Jupiter gets his come-uppance in a #metoo ending.

Roger Simmonds has written seven operas, which have been performed across the UK including the Young Vic and has written music for television. His speciality is composing music that draws on many influences from Handel to rock and roll, and can be performed both by professionals and by members of the community. @emele also features a semi-chorus of some of the best amateur singers in Oxford. ### **Great Haseley and District Horticultural Society**

It is that time of year again when the greenhouse is full to overflowing with plants which are growing fast, flowering and desperate to grow more. Each morning I open up and move outside as many of the plants as I can to get some fresh air and begin to acclimatise to the big outside world. I think that by the weekend they will be good to stay outside for the summer. I note that a frost is likely very early on Thursday morning so we will need to be especially careful on Wednesday evening to protect anything very tender.

This has been a very unusual spring with April very cold and dry and recording many nights of frost. Our Wisteria sinensis on the courtyard wall looked fabulous and was overwhelmingly perfumed. The perfume was added to by Rhododendron fragrantissima with its highly scented pinky white bell-shaped flowers. It has been frosted completely each spring for several years now so I had threatened it with the compost heap; it responded well! Sadly, yet again, our potted standard Wisteria in a pot has had its buds entirely frosted. I think that too is living on borrowed time.

May has followed on with what is likely to be the wettest weather on record and it is still cold. Many plants are well behind in their development. We have a lovely little Malus floribunda which was about two weeks late into flower for only the second time in its almost 25 year life. It still looks lovely except where it has received the attention of the pigeons which seem to delight in simply picking off the buds as they do with Wisteria where whole flowering stems lay on the ground unopened. There are far too many pigeons, in my opinion, especially when they do so much damage without even eating what they damage. Farmers must really struggle due to their bizarre protection under the law. Our lawyer son looked at the law after we informed him that, no, we couldn't do anything about them, and had to agree we were correct.

On another bird happening, we rarely see starlings in the garden, but this year we have a nesting pair which sit on the Wisteria taking the morning sun. Their iridescent feathers look magnificent; they are indeed stunningly beautiful birds. My daughter-in-law could not believe her eyes when she saw a murmuration near Chearsley

The deer, which make the meadow look like African savannah, have decided our garden is an all you can eat buffet. Then there are the rabbits and the squirrels....

Down in the vegetable garden, things are coming on well. We have eaten asparagus and early salad leaves. The beans in the main greenhouse have flowers which is exciting. Outside beans are not even in the ground – far too early down there with its much cooler microclimate. There are rapidly growing gooseberries which I need to keep on top of so we get to eat them rather than the birds. The rhubarb is huge (it's loving all the rain)! I am hoping that we might actually get some Victoria plums this year. Every previous year birds have eaten the buds or frost has destroyed the young fruit. This year, maybe there are too many and the tree too large. I have no hopes for the cherries, but the trees are pretty in themselves and at least the cherries get eaten and not just wantonly destroyed. When my son and his family lived in London, they had more cherries than they could eat. When I asked why the birds hadn't eaten them all, he said "Have you seen a bird? There aren't any because the cats have eaten them all!"

### John Howell MP writes...

This month will bring with it a major step forward in the COVID19 recovery programme, which is welcomed. I know that many people have been enjoying the opportunity to meet up with friends again outdoors, but the weather has, quite literally, put a damper on that! The new opportunity to meet indoors and, to be able to stay overnight with people, is good news. The progress that has been made to enable this is also good news. With the virus deemed to be supressed in most of the constituency I know that many people are looking forward to a more normal way of life. The vaccination programme has, of course, played a huge part in this and my thanks to those who have come forward to take up the vaccination. However there are still many people who have yet to be offered the vaccine and so I encourage everyone, including

those who have already been offered the vaccine, to remain vigilant and follow the guidance for the sake of these people.

The State opening of Parliament marks the start of a new session of Parliament and many MPs, including me, have taken this as a signal to return to the parliamentary estate rather than continue to work remotely. Restrictions do remain in place but simply being on the estate and being able to meet with colleagues informally is of great benefit.

One thing that I have very much missed during lockdown and under COVID restrictions is being able to meet people within the constituency. Prior to the pandemic, along with all other MPs, my Fridays and sometimes weekends were filled with visits to schools, businesses, charities and meetings with individuals and groups to discuss a wide range of issues and concerns. Some of this has continued through virtual meetings but I am looking forward to getting out and about more and seeing what is going on for myself. Once all restrictions are lifted, hopefully in June, I will be looking to schedule visits and meetings. Please do get in touch is there is something you would like me to come to.

One thing that I plan to continue is virtual surgeries. This has been one very positive thing that has emerged from lockdown. The constituency is geographically spread and, although I move surgeries around, people wanting to meet with me would sometimes have to travel some distance to discuss something that did not take long to talk about to enable me to take an issue up for them. With online opportunities we have been able to save people much time and at the same time reduce car journeys. Face to face meetings continue to have an important place in our communications but in future we can determine the best way to meet according to the time needed and the travel involved, which I hope will bring a benefit to many people.

With the beginning of the new parliamentary session we have some important new legislation coming forward. Much of the detail is yet to be published but as information is available I would welcome, as always, views on proposals. Although I have been going to the Westminster office at present my team continues to work remotely and email remains the quickest form of communication. 




