Draft Parish Notes

Present at the Parish Council meeting held on Monday 16th September were Cllrs W Fox (Vice-Chairman), P Allen, C Deacon, and G Harris, plus Tim Darch (Clerk), Cllr Caroline Newton (SODC) and 9 members of the public. Apologies were received from Cllrs S Harrod (Chairman), G Bennet and P Fewell.

The minutes of the meeting of the Parish Council held on Monday 15th July were signed and approved as an accurate record of proceedings.

The County Councillor's monthly report was received by the meeting and is available via the Parish Council website. The County Councillor's monthly report for September was received by the meeting and can be viewed on the Parish Council website. Cllr Caroline Newton (SODC) reported that a decision on adoption or otherwise of the SODC Local Plan had been deferred until next month. There are concerns about the loss of approaching £500m for infrastructure that would result from the adoption of the housing proposals that are included in the current iteration of the Plan. Failure to adopt a Local Plan may lead to increased 'speculative development' without appropriate transport and other infrastructure. A new SODC Climate Change Committee has been appointed following the declaration of a Climate Emergency in the district, and a new SODC Homeless Strategy is to be published later this year.

Planning applications

Cllr Peter Fewell declared an interest in his absence in Planning Application P19/S2605/FUL (Mount Pleasant Farm, Thame Road, Great Milton). The land upon which the proposed housing will be constructed is partly owned by Cllr Fewell.

The following planning applications received from SODC were considered:

P19/S2358/HH (Brannock Lower End Great Milton OX44 7NL). Removal of the single-storey ground floor kitchen and bathroom. New build replacement ground floor kitchen with utility, with new bedroom and bathroom over. Additional door to west elevation. Internal alterations.

Consultation with neighbours revealed no issues or concerns. As a result, the Parish Council agreed to FULLY SUPPORT this application.

P19/S0677/FUL Coach House Milton Lodge Lower End Great Milton OX44 7NJ. Amendment dated 26th July 2019. Remove condition 6 from application ref P14/S2675/FUL and to create the new hard standing for the parking of cars (as amended by revised plan and letter from Agent received on 26 July 2019 altering the design of the parking area and including a pedestrian access).

This application was discussed at length, with the applicant's Planning Consultant, residents of the Coach House and Milton Lodge and neighbours with concerns all

present. The major areas of concern expressed were the fact that the application in its current form followed a breach of the initial application (which was granted on the basis of a parking area being created within the curtilage of the building) and the setting of a precedent both in terms of the use of verges to create formal parking spaces and resulting 'urbanisation'. The applicant's representatives stated that the space was created for convenience, to avoid the need for a circuitous walk while carrying shopping (for example), and that the parking space in the revised application was designed to resemble a rural track, with 'wheel tracks' either side of grass growing through a cellular grid. It was noted that some neighbours were supportive of the proposal, and that historical access to Chilworth Farm by large agricultural vehicles via Ives Gate Lane should not be obstructed.

After much deliberation the Parish Council agreed to OBJECT to this application, on the grounds that there has been no material change in circumstances to require additional, permanent parking on Ives Gate Lane, which was restricted by the original application and which this amendment seeks to overturn.

P19/S2462/FUL and P19/S2462/LB (1 Monkery Farm Church Road Great Milton OX44 7PB)

Variation of conditions 2 (approved plans), 3 (EPS License), 5 (External Materials), 6 (Contamination Report) and 9 (Protected Species Mitigation Strategy) of planning permission P18/S3645/FUL for the conversion of a grade II listed barn into a dwelling

There has been an objection lodged by neighbours to proposed solar panels on the roof of the property. The Parish Council agreed that it had NO OBJECTIONS to the application subject to the agreement of the Countryside Officer into this aspect of it, along with the EPS licence and bat mitigation.

P19/S2605/FUL (Mount Pleasant Farm Thame Road Great Milton). Erection of two 4-bedroom dwellings with double garages.

This development is on the corner of Thame Road and Chilworth Road (Green Hitchings). Concerns were raised by neighbours regarding the Design and Access statement, which apparently contradicted the drawings as surrounding hedges were described as remaining, although the proposed houses will not physically fit within the space available without their removal. The removal of the hedges was also described as being detrimental to the setting of Mount Pleasant Farmhouse (a Grade 2 listed building). Some documents were also reported as not present on the SODC website. Additional comments received were that the site is within the Green Belt and in a conservation area, the proposed junction was a hazard to pedestrians, and that the rear gable ends of the garages would offer a visually unappealing frontage onto Thame Road. It was suggested that a Landscape Strategy should be requested as a

condition of approval, and that smaller affordable houses might be more beneficial and desirable than further large, expensive houses.

The Parish Council agreed that it had NO OBJECTIONS to development at this location, but queried the position of the Chilworth Road boundary which includes a roadside ditch and substantial hedge, suggested that consideration be give to smaller houses for which there is a significant need in the village, requested that hedgerows are retained and proposed that the garage arrangement should be redesigned so that the gable ends do not present to the Thame Road frontage.

P19/S2612/HH (3 Brookside Cottages Church Road Great Milton). Demolition of small brick lean to. Erection of new single storey stone brick extension with slate roof. Replacement of windows and new French doors.

The Parish Council agreed that it had NO OBJECTIONS to this application subject to a condition that two windows which overlook a neighbouring property should be glazed with frosted glass.

P19/S2685/FUL (Lobb Farm, Access Road to Lobb Farm, Tetsworth South OX9 7BE) and P19/S2686/FUL (Lobb Farm, Access Road to Lobb Farm, Tetsworth North OX9 7BE) Gas Fired Electricity Generating Facility with the ability to generate up to 49.99 MW of electricity. A low carbon flexible generating facility using gas reciprocating engines. The facility will generate electricity principally for the regional distribution network in times of generation shortfall and/or high demand.

Henry Venners, Planning Consultant for the applicant, outlined the current position with the power station application (which has been re-submitted with amendments following SODC's two previous objections), the justification for the application (to mitigate the supposed vulnerability of renewables for a period of 25 years while other technologies develop sufficiently) and the rationale behind the location (on a confluence of the national electricity and gas network).

A local resident argued that better, more sustainable technologies were available in the form of battery storage, which can come on stream more rapidly that the 5 minutes that gas-powered generation can take. The outage in August was reportedly not attributable to the vulnerability of renewables but to a software glitch, and was a freak event. Additionally it was felt that the views of Milton Common residents had not been sufficiently considered despite being among the closest to the proposed site, and that the visual screening suggested in the application could take 9 or 10 years to be effective given the size and number of the large structures associated with the sites. The resident noted that applying for two sites of 49.99MW each may be a means to circumvent planning law which prevents applications for sites of 50MW or greater, and that the pre-existence of noise from the M40 should not be used as

a justification for the noise that the proposed facilities may produce, which is likely to differ in nature to the noise produced by traffic and still be apparent as a result. The site would be burning fossil fuel and generating a significant increase in carbon emissions locally in a district that has declared a 'Climate Emergency: additionally, much of the information from the previous application had apparently been copied across, including the previous application numbers.

The Parish Council agreed to OBJECT to the application as it had to previous applications for power generation facilities in this location, agreeing with the views of local residents as conveyed above and with no additional evidence provided to suggest that this rural location is in any way suitable for the large-scale industrial development proposed.

The following planning decisions received were reviewed:

P19/S1864/HH (Midsummer Cottage, Church Road, Great Milton). Demolition of unused garage and erection of single storey garden room outbuilding.

Planning permission is GRANTED for the works described above.

The monthly reconciliations, accounts and bank statements for July and August were received and signed. The reconciled bank balance as at 4 September was £25,361.15.

Clerk's update of matters in hand

- The Clerk will seek an update from the school on progress with initiatives to improve the parking situation in the village, as proposed earlier this year. Although recent communications indicate that consideration has been given by the school to this matter the Parish Council agreed to invite the school's headteacher to a future meeting for further discussions.
- The bus shelter in Milton Common has received a much-needed refurbishment. The Perspex panels have been replaced, the roof cleared of vegetation and rubbish and all metalwork steam-cleaned.
- A site meeting has taken place at Sworford Lane involving the landowner, Parish Council, OCC and SODC to diagnose the cause of the flooding near the railway bridge after heavy rain, and to ascertain responsibilities for resolution. The various interested parties have agreed to address the various issues identified, with

- a view to resolving this issue as soon as is practical.
- The defibrillator is now fully functional after some initial technical issues which necessitated its return to the manufacturer.

Other matters

Two residents attended the meeting to express strong enthusiasm for the creation of a shared-use path to enable walking and cycling to Wheatley, and wished to seek the support of the Parish Council in advance of further investigations. The Parish Council fully supports the suggestion and is happy to provide whatever support it can.

The potential installation of CCTV in the village has been suggested by a resident considering recent instances of criminal activity. However, it was agreed that the lack of street lighting, GDPR and privacy issues, the likely high cost of installation and maintenance and the fact that individual domestic systems are widely available at relatively low cost meant that the Parish Council would not be pursuing this suggestion.

The Parish Council agreed that £5,096.21 of CIL contributions (and any further sums due) resulting from the housing development currently under construction in Milton Common should be held by SODC until a suitable use for them is identified.

A requested donation towards a prize for presentation at Wheatley Park's prizegiving event in October was discussed. As last year, a £50 donation was agreed.

There was an accident involving a motorcyclist at the junction of Windmill Hill and The Forties on Monday 2 September. Attempts to obtain more detailed information via official channels have been unsuccessful but it is understood that there may have been a fatality. A police investigation is ongoing. The Parish Council will respond appropriately once the exact circumstances surrounding the cause of the accident have been established, but it was agreed to ask the landowner to trim the hedges to the right of the junction of The Forties and Windmill Hill to improve visibility.

The next meeting of Great Milton Parish Council will be held on Monday 21 October starting at 7.30pm in The Pavilion.

From the Registers

Ramblings from the Rectory

The Inter Village Tug of War championship between Great Milton, Little Milton and Great Haseley held in Great Milton on 30th September was an astonishingly good occasion. I wasn't sure what to expect and how a full afternoon could be built on the event? I needn't have worried, apart from being roped in at the last minute to invigilate! The afternoon grew in fun and a spirit of healthy competitiveness developed between the women's and men's teams. The children had a couple of goes as

well. Everyone enjoyed themselves, even I think those poor souls on the rope who entertained the rest of us, some of them had nine pulls!

The whole thing was thought up by Laura Putt in Great Milton who wanted to do something to pull the villages together and also to raise money for the church buildings, all are in desperate need of help for the fabric. Whichever village hosts the event, the profit from that goes to the church in that village towards help with the fabric. Our overall total was nearly two and a half thousand pounds which will go towards St Mary's in Great Milton. This was a remarkable result. It was also a wonderful way to bring all three villages together .

I have written at length about the issue with the buildings in all three villages. It is very serious and we have to raise serious amounts of money. At St Peter's and St James we have had to cordon off areas due to the danger of loose stone or falling tiles. We now find that on top of everything else the Chancel roof at St Peter's needs replacing and the condition at St James is worse than we had at first thought. We don't though just want this all to be just about Church stonework however. In Great Milton hopefully enough people took away our leaflet about the whole development project, which includes the repair to the Tower alongside what we want to do inside the Church to make the building a far better community space. We have already begun this in St Peter's in Great Haseley with the building of an excellent kitchen and loo and the development at the back of the church as a gathering space and an area for children. Whilst any money raised from local events will be enormously helpful, the greater sum has to be found from the application for grants. I have made it very clear that I do not believe that the burden for all of this can fall on the shoulders of the relative few who commit to worshipping in the Churches Sunday by Sunday. It is obvious that the grant bodies agree! One of the most important things we have to demonstrate to have any hope of gaining grant money is that there has been community engagement. Events such as the Tug of war therefore go far beyond their worth in purely monetary terms. The Tug of war in Great Milton was therefore a big tick for community involvement. We will need more such events. Hopefully, if it can be organised next year it will be the turn of Little Milton to host the Tug of war. There is much to fight for!

I wrote a letter to our MP John Howell about the action of Mr Johnson with his prorogation of parliament. It was a personal letter and so I will not reproduce it here in full. I will though reproduce a part of it. It was of course my personal view, I do not look for universal agreement! As I write the issue of whether the Prime Minister acted legally has been referred to the Supreme Court.

'As a member of the Clergy in the Church of England, I frequently take a service of Holy Communion from the Book of Common Prayer. At the beginning of that

service are two prayers for the monarch, the second contains this sentence. 'We humbly beseech thee so to dispose and govern the heart of Elizabeth thy servant, our Queen and Governor, that in all her thoughts, words, and works, she may ever seek thy honour and glory, and study to preserve thy people committed to this charge, in wealth, peace and godliness:'

This prayer was written before the civil war was fought, and of course that bloody conflict rightly determined for ever that the monarchy itself does not have executive power. The Queen is the symbolic head of state, just as she maintains a role as the head of the Church. It must surely though continue to be the role of an elected parliament to meet this duty, to 'preserve thy people committed to this charge, in wealth, peace and godliness.' I pray that prayer, both for the monarch as the symbolic head of state, but also for her elected representatives in parliament, and that includes you! To have the role of that parliament threatened is a deeply worrying development'.

I will say that I had a very gracious reply. Understandably Mr Howell has had many emails! Whilst he sent back a general response forwarded to all who have communicated with him about the present situation he also took the time to offer a personal word to me for which I was grateful. Again I will not reprint in full but he did write this:

'On the issue of Parliament and the Church, each day the sitting of the House of Commons begins with prayers led by the Speaker's chaplain. In the prayers used there is a line which says:

"May they never lead the nation wrongly through love of power, desire to please, or unworthy ideals...." I think this an important prayer and reminder of our role and whether MPs have a Christians faith or not I honestly do think that most come to Parliament believing that they are doing the right thing. The issue is, of course, that there are many different views on what is the right thing.'

I would like here to give advance notice about a new venture we want to try. It is a service of commemoration and thanksgiving for the departed. It will be a time to remember loved ones who have died, 'Those whom we love but see no longer.' We will sing four well known hymns, say some prayers, hear a brief (I promise!) address and read out names of our loved ones and light candles in their memory. The service will be on Sunday 17th November at 4.00pm at St Mary's Great Milton. I am sure it will be followed by teas and cake!

This will a service for the whole benefice, the combined parishes of Great Milton, Little Milton and Great Haseley. I am sorry that I cannot do one of these at each of the Churches. However if it proves to be popular we will then look at rotating the service annually around each of the Churches in turn. In my last parish this service proved to be very popular and well attended. It won't matter it the people we remember

have never in fact lived in the villages, what matters is that we who have lost people we have loved have an opportunity to give thanks and commemorate them. I will be remembering my own mother and father. There will be more details next month but if this interests you please note the date.



View from Views

Now all the speculation as to the outcome of our harvest is now in the barn, at about 7pm in the evening of Thursday 22 August the combine swooped in, and swooped out at 5pm on Saturday 24th. Now all is safely gathered in, and all straw either cleared and in a stack ready for sale. The Barley that I optimistically thought would be a great yield turned out somewhat disappointing, @ 2.5tonnes to the acre. This was



because it had suffered little weather damage, which with Barley straw being rather weak means that with the heavy grain and the crop standing up, instead of falling over which barley usually does the heads of grain had fallen to the ground making it impossible to gather. The wheat however exceeded all my predictions by yielding a good average of 4.5tonnes to the acre. Years ago we always reckoned a good crop of Barley needed to lodge or fall over, this would cause problems with harvesting, but with the modern machines, if it is tangled and close to the ground the machines could get under it to sort of peal it off the ground. Now with modern methods and variety it seems to stand up better so now can to lose it, that's the gamble we have to take all the time. You may wonder why I make such a song and dance about harvest but it is the one and only form of income from our land so to us it is very important.

As I write the weather is still on the dry side which has enabled us to plant our next years crop of Oil Seed Rape and the cover crops to feed some sheep through the winter, this also means we have crop cover which in turns helps the environment by not left bare for any length of time. We are told this is very important in that it will like any growing thing capture carbon, and if we can do this without the plough so much the better. I feel that in defence of Agriculture I must just comment on the recent utterances or embellishments of the statement by the International Committee on Climate Change or

whatever it is called, the media particularly the BBC did not report the actual wording of the statement, "that we should eat less red meat when it comes from intensive farming", no mention of the fact that grass fed meat as produced in the UK, was not a problem. It is interesting to note also that the Organic Certification body I am involved with (OF&G) has been approached to certify the fact that beef carrying a certificate will have been largely feed on grass and grass products, to give the consumer the knowledge that they are buying genuinely grass feed beef, that is not harmful to the environment. It is the intensively produce beef that causes the pollution and that is why there is such a song and dance about importing from the USA as that is how most of their beef is produced. The trouble is that Farming is a soft target for everyone to blame, there is little mention of Air travel (or the use of private jets that has hit the news lately) or the Cruises that are so popular nowadays, leave alone transport, MADE WORSE NOWADAYS FOR US IN THE COUNTRY BY THE LACK OF PUBLIC TRANSPORT. It is all very well for those high and mighty living in towns and cities saying we should not use our cars, how on earth are we expected to get around without.

It would be wrong of me not to mention Brexit, even though I have not got a clue a, what is going to happen or what the affect will be when and if whatever does, if that makes sense! What does worry me is that since this new regime has taken over no mention has been made by all the nice words we had from Michael Gove about the environment do not seem to be mentioned of late. We have been gearing up in preparation for this great deal that would be good, but since this SLIGHT change in direction, and slightly dictatorial administration all seems quiet on that front. We were given to believe that DEFRA had spent a lot of time and effort (makes a change for a government department, but we have to believe it, if we wish to maintain our sanity), so let's just live in hopes that this is not also prorogued!

I have just read something interesting from research in Australia, in that Triticaly, a hybrid cereal, (a cross between Wheat and Rye) used mainly for animal feed, and I understand is somewhat drought resistant can be used in making beer, if this is true and it is really drought resistant, and given we may have drier years in the future this may be ours and beer drinkers salvation.

Sadly I have to report that after all my/our efforts to get some sort of action from the County Council to calm the traffic both on our road and through Great Milton we have had a fatality, maybe now they will listen to our pleas

Great Haseley and District Horticultural Society

I have just read up my article submitted last year for October and discovered that most of my observations for last year could simply be repeated other than the fact that we did not go to the south of Spain in August (although we did spend a few days in the south of France!). Weather patterns repeat themselves.

I am loving the cooler weather with lots of sun; it allows me to get on with putting

the garden to bed for the winter. For most people this is too early, but for me I do need to keep clearing perennials as they fade or I end up with too much to do later on. If I am not at least partly on track, the spring comes and growth of everything, especially weeds, gets away from me and I never catch up.

We seem to have a new animal in the garden. One morning we noticed that there was a trail of lawn damage from the drive in a straight line down the track into the back garden where there was widespread lawn damage. I think it must be a badger which came in from the road. We have had rabbits wandering the garden for years so that doesn't fit and a flock of birds wouldn't have produced a single trail from the drive. We will wait and see.

The recent dry, warm conditions have resulted in our water supplies, in storage, running out. In past years we have carried water, but this time we have decided to let things be and see what happens. The forecast on my phone is for rain every day next week, but I will only believe it if it happens; recent weather forecasts have often promised rain which has mostly not arrived and when it has it has been in too small a quantity to make any difference.

Last winter my tender fuchsias stayed outside all winter and have been terrific this summer when I assumed they would have simply died. A mild attack of capsid bug resolved without intervention and they are still flowering strongly. My plan is to overwinter them in a sheltered place under the eaves where they will stay largely dry and we will see what happens next year. I haven't repotted or added new compost and have only occasionally fed them so they owe me nothing at all!

Enjoy the last of the summer and keep up with the weeding; you will find it much easier next year if you do (I know from bitter experience what happens if you don't – especially with spreading perennial weeds like nettles). When we do get rain, the weeds will take off and soon cover the dry parched earth!

The Flu Vaccination

Who should have it and Why

Flu vaccination is available every year on the NHS to help protect adults and children who are most at risk from flu and its complications.

Flu can be unpleasant, but if you are otherwise healthy it will usually clear up on its own within a week.

However, flu can be more severe in certain people, such as:

- Anyone aged 65 and over
- Pregnant Women
- Children and adults with an underlying health condition (such as long term heart or respiratory disease)
- Children and adults with weakened immune systems

The flu vaccine is routinely given on the NHS each year to anyone in these risk groups. It is the best protection we have against an unpredictable virus that can cause unpleasant illness in children and severe illness and death among at risk groups, including older people, pregnant women and those with an underlying medical health condition.

John Howell MP writes...

The House of Commons Chamber is a lively place, where Members on all sides often feel passionately about the issues being discussed and there are longstanding procedures in place to ensure the chamber remains respectful. However the way in which some senior colleagues have behaved of late is not befitting of the high office that they hold. Some behaviour has been insulting to colleagues and is far from the usual respectful way in which the business of the House operates. I am also dismayed at the recent behaviour of the Speaker which again is unprecedented. The Speaker should be politically impartial, and a key task is to maintain orderly debate in the Chamber. The habit of the current Speaker of insulting MPs has not set a good example. Both in the House and outside I have always maintained that people should be able to disagree without resorting to personal insult and abuse. We are all human and none of us gets it right all of the time but I am pleased when I can have robust discussion with constituents where we disagree but find no need to be rude to one another.

One of the problems with recent debate is the way in which people of different sides of the argument have been labelled and stereotyped. This is true both inside and outside of the House. I know from letters and emails sent to me that there are many complexities to views held and reasons for retaining or relinquishing our membership of the EU. There are many gracious people who seek to understand the view of others and indeed there are those who will only listen to voices which speak the same view as them. Even the Archbishop of Canterbury was caught up in a problem with language when he said "We have to take seriously the fact that the majority voted Leave. We may not like it, but that is democracy; and that means we have to stop whingeing about it and do something about reuniting the country." When criticised for the words 'stop whingeing' he apologised and said "What I was aiming to say was that in this political situation, just talking in increasingly hostile language does us no good. Nor is it helpful to only look backwards." I think this is a constructive reflection from the Archbishop.

Over the summer period I spent quite a bit of time knocking on doors in various communities across the constituency simply get a feel for the national, international and local issues that were on people's minds. In this period of prorogation I will continue with this as well as pursuing a programme of local meetings which would normally happen in the conference recess which usually happens at this time. I look forward to the opportunity for many more conversations. My office remains open during this period and I am still able to raise issues with Ministers and government departments as appropriate.
